Obituary

It is with deep regret that we record the death in action of Lcpl. BENSEMANN D.I. RNZIR.

Lcpl. Bensemann was killed in a clash with the Viet Cong in Phouc Tuy province, South Vietnam, on 16 November, 1968, while serving with V Coy. of the ANZAC Bn.

A member of Barrowclough Class he joined Cadets in January 1965 from Kaikoura D.H.S., as a full time military trainee. By the end of 1965 he had attained the rank of Cadet Sergeant. In 1966 Lcpl. Bensemann was employed as a Cadet Instructor during the basic training period, and was then attached to the School of Infantry for Corps training.

In September 1966 he was promoted to Cadet RSM and in this capacity commanded the December Graduation parade. He graduated as an Instructor RNZIR on this parade.

Prominent in team sports, Lcpl Bensemann represented the School at Rugby in 1965 and 1966 and at Tennis in 1966.

His record of achievement, and his outstanding personal qualities, will be remembered by all who knew him.

The sympathy of the Staff and Cadets of Cadet School is extended to Lcpl. Bensemann's family.

The Army, like any large and important organisation — like the United Nations — has developed its own system of short forms of address and labelling. This system generally based on the use of initial letters, is often quite incomprehensible to anyone outside the Service, and so a glossary is presented below to which you may refer in cases of bewilderment.

Firstly, the organisation of the Army itself can cause confusion. The Service is divided into Corps, each with its own function, badges and history. In all cases the titles of the Corps are prefixed with RNZ signifying Royal New Zealand whatever it is. (Only those Corps which are directly connected with RF Cadet School are dealt with below).

Secondly, the rank structure of the Army can cause some contractional confusion. Distinction is made obvious by the position of the insignia denoting rank, an officer wearing his in a sequence of stars, with or without a crown on the shoulder, while the non-commissioned officer (NCO) wears indication of rank on the arm.

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THE CADET SCHOOL BADGE

THE CREST

The Dixon crest, worn as the badge of the Regular Force Cadets, has had long associations with The Army Schools. During his period of office as Governor-General (1910-1912) the Rt Hon John Poynder Dixon-Poynder, KCMG, Baron Islington DSO, granted permission to General Headquarters NZ Army for his family crest to be used as the badge for the Senior Cadet Officers (Unattached, List B). In 1921 when the Senior Cadet Officers were absorbed into the Territorial Infantry Regiments the use of the badge lapsed.

In 1927-28 the badge was brought into use again by the GHQ Training Depot, Trentham. Again in 1932 the badge was used in the first wing of the Regular Force Recruits and its use was continued with subsequent wings. Approval for the badge to be reserved as the Training Depot badge was given on 25 November 1933. In May, 1936, as there was no official record of Lord Islington having granted permission for the use of his crest, his consent to the use of it as a badge for Regular Force recruits was sought and obtained. The crest was used from then on for this purpose. The company of Regular Force soldiers formed in 1938 for garrison duties on Fanning Island also used this badge.

After the war, Regular Force recruits at The Army School of Instruction continued to wear the badge until actually posted to corps — a custom which lasted until 1950.

When the Regular Force Cadet Unit was formed at The Army School of Instruction in 1948 its members, like other recruits, therefore wore the Dixon Crest. Up to this time it had always been in brass, but when the Cadets provided their first Guard of Honour their badges were chromium plated, and from this time forward the Cadets wore a silver crest while other recruits continued to use the old brass ones. In 1950 the crest (now silver) became the exclusive property of the Cadets. In 1952 it was felt that while the badge was given to the Cadet Unit and could well remain as their badge, it could at the same time be used as the crest for Army Schools as a whole, since the Cadet Unit was the most permanent unit of Army Schools. This proposal was adopted, but the distinction in colour still remains. The crest as used by Cadets is in silver; as used by Army Schools, in gold.

The crest may be seen as a portion of Lord Islington's Coat of Arms hanging in the main entrance hall of Government House, Wellington.

THE MOTTO

To the crest has been added on the badge a scroll bearing the motto 'FORTES FORTUNA JUVAT'.

The form of this very frequently quoted proverb comes from the writings of the Younger Pliny (A.D. circ. 61-114). The proverb will be found in this form in the sixteenth letter of the sixth book of Pliny's Epistles, one of the two famous letters in which Pliny describes to his friend Tacitus the eruption of Mount Vesuvius which obliterated Pompeii in A.D. 79. Pliny's uncle, Pliny the Elder, was a very important civil servant in the Admiralty who wrote a huge work on Natural History which was still the nat-uralists' Bible in the Middle Ages and even later. He was at the near-by dockyards when the eruption began, and resolved to go out to sea to make scientific observations and take notes. He received a message that friends of his in a villa under the mountain were in danger, and cut off irom all retreat save by sea. In the Earl of Orrey's translation the Younger Pliny says (para. 10) "He commanded the galleys to put off from land, and embarked with a design not only to relieve the people of Retinae, but many others in distress, as the shore was interspersed with a variety of pleasant villages. He sailed immediately to places which were abandoned by other people, and boldly held his course in the face of danger, so composed, as to remark distinctly the appearance and progress of this dreadful calamity, and to digest and dictate these remarks.

He now found that the ashes beat into the ships, much hotter and in greater quantities; and as he drew nearer, pumice stones, with black flints, burnt and torn up by the flames, broke in upon them: and now, the hasty ebb of the sea, and ruins tumbling from the mountain, hindered their nearer approach to the shore. Pausing a little upon this, whether he should not return back, and instigated to it by the pilot, he cries out 'Fortune assists the brave' — 'fortes fortuna juvat'

Professor H. A. Murray of the Department of Classics, Victoria University of Wellington, who gave the above information, goes on to comment: "That gentle and even timid soul, the Younger Pliny, was an enormous attunatic man who slept little, read enormously and took copious notes. I should have great respect for his accuracy. Possibly the Schoois have adpted this form of the proverb because of its brevity. The Earl of Orrey says that Plmy was quoting Virgil Aeneid 10, 284, 'audentes Fortuna iuuat', but if so, as a typically undemonstrative civil servant with a taste for concise language, he no doubt adapted the proverb to the occasion in brief prose form.

"A book called "Die Sprichwoerter under Sprichwoertlichen Redensarten der Roemer' by Dr A. Otto contains no less than twenty Latin variations of this proverb and five Greek ones. The quotation from the Phornno of Terence is in thick print as being the most popular form — 'Fortes Fortura adiuuat'. But it must be remembered that Terence and Virgil wrote verse, whereas Pliny is not necessarily condemned to metre.

"One last point which you will consider fussy; there is no 'U' capital in the Roman alphabet, and no 'v' small, only 'V' and 'u'. If you could persuade people to spell 'FORTES FORTVNA IVVAT' or 'Fortes Fortuna Iuuat', I should be indeed gratified." (end of Professor Murray's comment). ENTRY TO THE SCHOOL

Cadets enter the School in January of each year. Here are one or two of the specific requirements:—

- (a) **Medical:** Be physically fit on an average standard comparable to your age.
- (b) Age Limit: Be 15 years but under 17 years 6 months of age on or after 15th January each year respectively for apprenticeship trades and 17 years for non-apprenticeship trades.
- (c) Nationality: Be a British subject, born or naturalised, or must have applied for naturalisation.
- (d) Produce parents' or guardian's consent to enter.

OUTFITTING

Uniforms, except for No. 1 Civilian Dress, are issued free initially and replaced as required during Cadet service. Most items of sports wear are provided free, as are all text books, exercise books and trade tools.

PAY AND ALLOWANCES

Cadets are paid fortnightly each receiving \$7.00 pocket money, the balance being paid into a Pest Office Savings Bank or Thrift Club Account to encourage savings.

Pay rates for Cadets increase with age, the basic weekly rates being:—

ACCOMMODATION

Barracks and most other buildings at Waiouru are steam-heated and comfortable. Ample bedding is provided and each Cadet has the use of a wardrobe and lowboy. Good meals, designed to meet the needs of growing boys, are provided.

LEAVE

The annual leave entitlement for Cadets is 22 days, plus statutory holidays.

Three free return travel warrants per year are provided for each Cadet to travel to his home. The leave is taken at times that approximately correspond with normal school holidays. A ration allowance is given during leave.

MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICE

Free medical and dental services are provided within Waiouru Camp.

AMENITIES AND SPORT

Facilities for almost all sports are good, and besides teams being entered in local competitions, a number of matches are played against other secondary schools. Fishing, ski-ing, tramping, deerstalking and mountaineering are popular pastimes.

In off-duty hours the Cadets have the use of a library and recreation room, and periodic dances are arranged for them.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

One hour each week is set aside for religious instruction in the particular denomination of the Cadet, so helping towards the highest possible moral standards. In addition, the normal Sunday religious services are held.

PERIOD OF TRAINING

This varies from one to three years depending on the age on enlistment. All Cadets do at least one year's training and thereafter graduate at the end of the term in which they turn $17\frac{1}{2}$ years, i.e., May, August and December each year.

It is the object of the School that Cadets complete their Basic All Arms Soldier Training within the first three months but this is not always possible due to the commencement of University Entrance, and School Certificate Classes and some apprenticeship training. Those who are suitably qualified and keen to do so may take full-time education aiming for School Certificate and University Entrance Examinations. Some of those who are accepted for apprenticeships do school work integrated with the trade training, while some of the remainder take a general education course leading to Army Education Certificate Class II, and then commence their trade training.

Some non-apprenticed cadets go straight on to full-time military training in the Training Wing of the School, or at Corps Schools.

All Army trades are open to Cadets, but in the main they are trained as:

- a. Potential instructors in all Corps.
- b. Apprentices, in the automotive, radio, electrical, plumbing and building trades.
- c. Administrative personnel.

PROMOTION

A Cadet who shows leadership qualities has the opportunity for promotion to various ranks up to Cadet Regimental Sergeant Major. The Ranks of Cadet Sergeant and above bring an increase in Pay. Any rank gained whilst a Cadet is relinquished on graduation.

CADET SCHOOL STATISTICS

The Cadet School began its existence on the 15th July 1948 when the original 90 Cadets marched into Trentham Military Camp. In the twenty years since then, 1,925 Cadets have attended the School, while the School roll has steadily increased to the stage where the strength in January 1968 was 261 Cadets. Ardagh Class of 1968 numbered 145.

Of these Cadets approximately 100, or one in twenty, have been Commissioned. Furthermore ex-Cadets have won the Sword of Honour at Duntroon, twice; and Portsea five times.

Examination passes while at the RF Cadet School's Education Wing include forty Cadets who have passed University Entrance and 179 who have passed School Certificate. Trade examination passes have been especially high with 106 of the 124 who sat in 1967 passing.

Ssgt Bramley HL RNZIR

I Force, the force which went to Japan as part of the allied occupation force after World War II was Ssgt Bramley's first introduction to the Army. He joined this force in 1946 and took his discharge on his return from Japan in 1947. However, the Army life called him back and in 1957 he rejoined and was posted to Malava for the next

Most of the disappointments concerned the University Entrance candidates, only one of whom, from the four who sat, passed. This was Cadet Hughes, with the creditable mark of 244. Two of the less fortunate Univer-sity Entrance Candidates gained high marks in Technical Drawing: Cadet Hubner 80 and Cadet Mc-Kay 68. Sixteen of the twenty six School Certificate candidates passed, Cadet Houltham with the highly commendable total of 305,

Cadet Humphries with 289, and Cadet Young with 268. For School Certificate, it was "a good year". This year for the first time some members of the General Education Class will be sitting Chamber of Commerce examinations in English, Mathematics, Office Practice, and Handwriting. The Junior Apprentice class were again prepared for their trade examinations in English, Trade Calculations, Technical Drawing and Science.

At the end of last year we bade farewell to three members of staff. Capt RC Wrighton MA, RNZAEC (editor of last year's magazine) is now teaching at Slim School, Terendak Malaysia; Lt D Roy RNZAEC has returned to civilian employment; and WOII McRae IA, RNZAEC was posted to Army HQ Wellington. We have been joined by one new member of staff, WOII Cherrington H, BEM, RNZAEC, on his return from Malaysia.

An interesting event of the year was the visit of the University Entrance class to the River City to debate against Wanganui Collegiate School on the subject "Hamlet is a tragedy of indecision". The Cadet team (Humphries, Hollander and Hopkins) took the negative side and lost narrowly by 178 points to 196. Cadet WOII Humphries BP was especially commended by the adjudicator. Our hosts showed very great hospitality and we share their Headmaster's hope that such a debate will become an annual event.

The School Certificate class again has an interesting and instructive break from the class-room on a four day geography field trip of the Volcanic Plateau, led by Captain H Duncan RNZ-AEC. The Omuri Hut proved a pleasant base of operations, and among the centres of interest visited were the NZ Forest Pro-ducts at Kinleith, the Wairakei Geothermal Project, and the farm of Mr Bruce Dick, the Turangi Hydroelectric station, the Maori Land Development Block at Hinana, and Tongariro the National Park.

To those sitting external examinations this year we extend our wishes for success, and hope that their results will crown an active and pleasant year.

PT WING

This year has been an eventful one, as this was the beginning of the new PT scheme put forward by Sgt Pitt J, the School PTI. Subjects covered in the new PT programme are Weight Training, Circuit Training, Boxing, Unarmed Combat, Judo, Repetition Running, Endurance Running, Confidence Course Training, PT Tables, Cliff Scaling and Gymnastics. Some initiative tests are included, such as surmounting a six-foothigh wall without touching it, or taking a loaded stretcher over a twelve-foot-high wall; both team efforts.

In gymnastics, the Incentive Award scheme has been in operation for 1968. One hundred and fifty passed their Iron Badge, fifty passed their Bronze Badge, three passed their Silver Badge, four passed their Leaders Badge and two gained their Leaders Bronze Badge, of which there are only fifty in New Zealand.

The orders form will be familiar to many old soldiers, but the contents are more likely to be some of the thoughts crossing the Cadet School Training Officer's mind at the beginning of a new Training year. With the completion of the settling in period for new Cadets in mid January, the Training year in Cadet School begins in earnest. Lt JW Brown MC RNZIR and his six man training wing staff have spent many hours in preparation of Training Programmes, Range and Instructor allocations, and many other details. Few and far between are the Staff members who are not allocated a Training task of some sort. It is not unusual to find Engineer apprentice wing instructors preparing Rifle Ranges for firing, or Company Clerks marching squads.

The RF Cadet basic, which every Cadet must complete before graduation covers a period of ten weeks. It is designed to give a Cadet the same basic knowledge in soldiering that is given to all Regular Force soldiers. Because of various Trade and Educational commitments within the Cadet School, the recruits basic is divided into three phases:

Phase I: of two weeks duration is designed to give each Cadet a very basic grounding in Military knowledge. This phase is completed by every Cadet on entry.

Phase II: of six weeks duration is an extension of Phase I and ensures that each Cadet is proficient in all Drill movements, and the handling and firing of basic weapons which include the 7.62 Self loading rifle, the Light Machine Gun and 9mm Sterling sub machine gun. Map reading, First Aid, Field Craft and Current Affairs are also subjects given great prominence during this Phase.

Phase III: of two weeks duration is the section of the Basic looked forward to by most Cadets. This Phase spent entirely in the "Bush" includes 'Living off the Land', Bush Craft, Watermanship, and the art of living comfortably with little equipment in Jungle type surroundings. Many are the "Warries" told on return to Camp, as many as the frowns and comments about long hair and battered equipment from the SSM and CSMs.

With Basic completed, Corps Schools recommence their trade training. Those Cadets who have opted for a non apprentice trade, acquire a new name "The Soldier Trainee".

The Soldier Trainee is the Instructor, the Signalman, the Gunner, the Driver, the Storeman and Clerk. Since the Corps Schools are generally responsible for individual Corps Training, the Training Wing does not provide this. The Wing produces a Cadet with a sound background knowledge prior to Corps training and an osprit de corps in his soldier trade. With this aim in view Training Wing provides a series of courses loosely termed the Basic Infantry Course.'

Initially Cadets attend a Signals handlers course, where they are taught how to use Basic Infantry Radio sets and voice procedure. RNZASC School then employ the course for three weeks on a Basic Drivers course. This is a very popular phase as it enables most of the Cadets to gain their Light Trade driving licence. A Weapon handlers phase completes the course, and this provides handling and firing experience on the General Pur-pose Machine Gun, the two inch Mortar and 3.5 Rocket Launcher. Minor Tactics and Jungle Warfare subjects are also covered during this phase, and Cadets generally enjoy the invigorating tours over the Waiouru Training Areas both by night and by day using the latest form of transport, ie calf length boots. To climax their training, the soldier Trainee provided enemy for two exercises, against 161 Battery RNZA, and later against C Company NSTU. Both of these exercises give opportunities to confirm their minor tactic training and introduce them to anti guerilla operations. The Helicopters of 3 Battlefield Support Squadron used with C Company, proved an interesting and a proud first for the Cadets. A sidelight of these exercises was that Capt JR McGregor RNZIR who was the Officer Commanding C Company NSTU was so impressed with the standard of the Cadets, he asked for an immediate posting to Cadet School - and got it!

The Basic Infantry course completed, those Cadets considered to have Instructor potential commence a Pre Instructor's Course. The remainder begin their training at Corps Schools. Many of the Cadets training at Corps Schools attend NSTU courses with a good measure of success, and it is the Corps School's boast that all their Trainees

Graduate with at least one Star in their Trade, probably two. The Schools involved with this Training have had a good selection this year, and during the year seven have Graduated after training at School of Artillery. two have trained at School of Armour, ten at the Army Service Corps School, and a total of seventeen at School of Signals, which included two Cadets who assisted in operating the Waiouru Command Communications Centre. Four Cadets gained passes in a Physical Training Course held in Waiouru and one of them Cadet Ssgt Talbot has been employed at the Regular Force Depot Gymnasium for the greater part of the year.

Those Cadets who have been selected to attend Pre Instructors courses very soon realise that the day is far too short for the number of tasks to be completed. Three of these courses have been run this year, and they have proved invaluable to those Cadets who have been selected to attend a Basic All Arms Instructor's Course at the Regular Force Depot. The courses are designed to give the Cadet sufficient con-fidence and knowledge to compete successfully with the Regu-lar Force NCO attending the Instructor's course. That the Aim has been achieved has been amply proved by the high percentage of passes gained by Cadets. Of nine Cadets who at-tended Basic All Arms Instructor's No 55, eight gained passes and one a partial pass. Nine cadets are attending course No 56, and a further fifteen are awaiting results of the current Pre Instructor's course.

Two of the senior Cadets who have already gained a pass on the Instructor's Course, RSM Hutchinson and Sgt Pederson are at present attending the Infantry Section Leaders Course at the School of Infantry. A pass on this course will qualify them as Infantry Instructors Two Star on Graduation.

The Training year has been notable for a number of High Points and highlights, some humorous, some not. A firing and flying demonstration by the American Huey Cobra Gunship, made a number of Cadets Graduating to Infantry wonder if the wearing of the GREEN BERET was worth it after all. Five of the Cadets Graduating to Army Service Corps decided it was a long way to fall whilst riding in a RNZAF Mercules on the Air Despatchers course they attended at Whenuapai.

The Signal Handlers course was provided with a tailor made final exercise, when they were called on to provide communications for Fire Fighting Units in one of the more remote Training Areas behind Waiouru. Proof of the Pudding — everyone that wanted communications got them.

The Junior Services Rugby Tournament, provided another highlight, when the Cadets who pride themselves on their Shooting, instructed the Air Force team on the Self Loading Rifle which they had not used before, then in the Inter Service Shoot organised by Training Wing, watched with dismay the same Air Force team steadily pile on points to win the shoot comfortably. Mortifying to say the least.

In a more humorous note there is one Cadet, who shall be nameless, who being the last man in a patrol in thick bush discovered to his dismay that a Staff member had attached himself to the back of the Patrol. It has been rumoured that the same Cadet is investigating the possibility of a detachable pair of eyes for the back of his head.

The Training Wing Staff have also become very efficient firemen after Cdts Cooney and Gobbie demonstrated the art of setting fire to a Basha during the Field Phase. It is understood that the Officer Commanding was not at all impressed when on the next Field Phase three other Cadets joined the Fire Lighters League.

All in all a successful year which taxed the many and varied skills of the Training Wing to the Full. A motto which the Staff of the Wing have again fulfilled "YOU PROVIDE THEM WE WILL TRAIN THEM".

SCHOOL OF ARTILLERY

The School's main task over the past twelve months has been the training of reinforcements for 161 Bty in Vietnam. This entails a continuous stream of Gunners passing through the School, learning new trades, doing refresher courses or gaining a higher qualification in their current trades.

A large number of Cadets and ex-Cadets have either attended, or are attending, courses here at the School. Those who have recently attended courses include: Gnr Nock (Andrew VC), Gnr Mortensen (Barrowclough), LBdr Waddell (Bennett), and Bdr Duggan (Gentry).

Courses currently being run and involving Cadets include:

Battery Survey: Cdt MacMillan (Ardagh), Gnr Bell (Andrew VC).

3 Star Gunners: Bdr O'Connor (Parkinson), Gnr Carr (Andrew VC), Gnr Waters (Crump), Gnr Lenihan (Crump), Cadet Dreaver (Ardagh).

Incidentally the Gunnery Section can now train on an American M2A2 105mm gun which is the weapon used by the Gunners in Vietnam.



The establishment of the School includes a Meteoroligical Branch, which can be divided into two distinct sections, the civil section provides weather information which is included on the national grid; and the military section, which provides meteorological information used to ensure greater accuracy when the guns are fired. Another aspect of work which is carried out by the military section, is the training of Meteorological Assistants, Radar Operators and Formation Surveyors. Currently working for the Meteorological section is: Sgt Newth (Sinclair-Burgess), Gnr Mortensen (Andrew VC), Gnr Gilroy (Andrew VC), Gnr Searle (Crump), Gnr Soper (Crump), and Gnr Hitchiner (Andrew VC). There have been many changes in the School Staff this year due to postings to Vietnam and the normal internal postings. Ex-Cadets currently serving on the staff are Sgt Swane (Weir), Sgt Route (Shuttleworth), and Gnr Hulme (Crump).

RF DEPOT

Regular Force Depot in the past was responsible for all Regular Force Cadet training. However, since the majority of this is now carried out by Training Wing of the Regular Force Cadet School, the requirement today is that of Training Instructors.

During 1968, 17 Cadets attended Instructor training courses at RF Depot. The courses were run by WOI JE Baird RNZIR, WOII Tocker T, RNZA, and staff of RF Depot. Twelve Cadets qualified as Basic All Arms Instructors, and five achieved partial qualification. Nine are attending the current Instructors course.

At the conclusion of this course there is a requirement to carry out further training in the field. This Field Phase is conducted in Fiji where conditions for jungle training are ideal.

Although Cadets bring home many stories of "night starvation" and the thunderous rains, one also hears of the hospitality and of the "beauties" of Suva Town.

Cadets will do well to remember lessons learnt there.

Instructors in PT are also trained by RF Depot under the guidance of WOII Doherty RNZIR and Sgt Taia RNZIR (an ex-Cadet). Seven Cadets were trained on Assistant P & RT Instructors Courses alongside their Regular Force and Malaysian counterparts. The results have been very heartening and several of these Cadets have been employed as P & RT Instructors both with Regular Force and National Service Trainees.

RNZASC SCHOOL

During the previous 12 months a total of 95 Cadets attended various courses at the RNZASC School. The curses attended were: Cadets attended. RNZASC Basic Course — 5 RNZASC Cadet Driver 1 Star Course — 59 Cadets attended.

Basic Air Despatcher Course at Whenuapai — 5 Cadets attended.

Army Apprentice Course — 22 Cadets attended part I.

RNZASC Driver 2 Star Course at Linton — 4 Cadets attended.

Also 4 Cadets have been attached to the Supply Depot for further Clerking and Supply Depot training.

MT Wing

This year 2 Cadet 1 Star Drivers' Courses have been held. 39 Cadets attended the June Course (34 qualifying and gaining their trade light licence) and a further 20 were on the September-October course. It is the aim of the RNZASC School to have RNZASC Cadet Drivers pass their HEAVY TRADE LICENCE Test before graduation. However this is not always possible because of the time factor and the availability of courses.

Catering Wing

This year 22 Cadets were apprenticed into the Catering Trade; 19 to be Chefs and 3 to be Stewarding Supervisors. All of these apprentices have qualified for their first star.

Progress is being made on the Joint Services Catering School to be established at the Catering Wing RNZASC School Waiouru.

Catering Training will be from the City and Guilds Institute of London syllabus, which is now the examining body for all Apprentice Chefs. Our courses will be City and Guild's 147 Basic Cooking and the 151 Craftsman's examinations. The Cookery and Fod Association of which most of the apprentices are Members will still be New Zealand's formost Catering Association. It is an act of Parliament in the United Kingdom that has caused the amalgamation of all the examining bodies to be brought together under the City and Guilds Institute of London.

The NZ Army Catering apprentices system is now in its 21st year. Many of the ex Cadet apprentice chefs have been appointed to senior catering positions throughout the NZ Army. Since the introduction of the Cookery and Food Association examination over 140 apprentice chefs have taken on the course. Their conditions and training are excellent. It would open the eyes their cooking apprenticeship with of the Cadets who started in Miles Company in 1948 to see the progress the Army has made in the Catering World.

Having an administration Warrant Officer with the Guard proved a great success and on arrival at Trentham the Guard settled into barracks without any delays.

An intensive training programme commenced at Trentham on the 24 June and as the big day drew near the performance of the Guard reached a very high standard of drill and bearing. All members of the Guard were very keen and morale was high.

During the training period anxious ears had been tuned to local radio stations as it appeared a large demonstration was going to be staged in conjunction with the ceremonies for the opening of Parliament.

At last the 26 June arrived, and as the Guard settled into their buses ready to move to Wellington it was evident that all the hard work of training had been worth while.

As the buses neared Parliament Buildings a large number of demonstrators could be seen, and it was necessary to divert the Guard into a side street where final preparations could be completed. At 1400 hrs the Guard of Honour for the 1968 Opening of Parliament formed up, and even though the demonstration was still in progress we all had hopes of the Guard continuing.

But at 1420 hrs the bombshell came! The guard would not go on, not because the demonstrators could not be moved from below Parliament steps, but because it was felt that the sight of 100 men marching with bayonets fixed could incite the demonstrators to violence. After an initial period of disappointment all realised that the correct decision had been made.

Instructions were then received that the Guard would be mounted at Government House for inspection by the Governor General.

At approx 1530 hrs the Guard and Band were formed up at the rear of Government House, and on the arrival of the Governor General a Royal Salute was presented, and the Governor General was able to carry out his inspection of the Guard and the Band in accordance with the established tradition.

His Excellency in writing to the Minister of Defence expressing his appreciation, said: "I thought the Guard paraded with great credit to themselves and their service, and I should be grateful if you would tell them so."

Fiftieth Anniversary Of The Signing Of The Armistice Ending World War I

On November 8th a contingent of twenty-six New Zealanders arrived in Paris to attend the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Armistice signed on November 11, 1918. Two Cadet School Staff members were chosen for this.

Lt JW Brown MC, himself an ex-Cadet was the standard bearer. Like the other member to attend, Cpl Walker WG MID, he is one of the more distinguished soldiers on the staff, having won his MC in Borneo during confrontation with Indonesia.

Cpl Walker while serving in South Vietnam in 1966 as a member of the Australian Task Force, gained his MENTIONED IN DESPATCHES (MID) when employed as radio operator for Maj M Stanley MBE in a Forward Observation Post during the battle of Long Tan. The whole unit was granted a presidential citation by President Johnson for its part in this battle.

Who issued breathalizers to the Orderly Sergeant?

The 1968 Class Patron Brigadier Patrick Augustine Ardagh CBE, DSO, MC, ChB, FRCS, NZMC

Brigadier Patrick A. Ardagh who was born at Ngapara near Oamaru in 1887, was educated at Waitaki Boys' High School and the Otago University Medical School, where he was a member of the Officer Training Corps. On graduation from the Otago University he served on the staff of the Auckland Hospital, and later commenced a successful medical practice in Christchurch, which he left in 1916 to volunteer for overseas service. In 1917 he served at Headquarters in London until posted to France as a Captain in the New Zealand Medical Corps. He was appointed to the 3rd Field Ambulance and later as the Regimental Medical Officer of the 1st Battalion The Auckland Regiment, a post he held throughout the remainder of the First World War.

Brigadier Patrick A. Ardagh during his service in France from 1917-18, was awarded the Military Cross and an immediate award of the Distinguished Service Order. He was subsequently mentioned in Sir Douglas Haig's dispatch on March 16, 1919.

At the outbreak of the Second World War, Brigadier Patrick A. Ardagh entered camp in May 1940 as Lieutenant Colonel, Commanding the Surgical Division of the New Zealand General Hospital. In 1942 he was promoted to Colonel and appointed Assistant Director of Medical Services to the New Zealand Division. He was subsequently mentioned in despatches for gallant and distinguished services in the Middle East during the period 1 May— 22 October 1942.

Brigadier Patrick A. Ardagh at the request of General Montgomery was promoted to Brigadier in February 1943 and appointed as Deputy Director of Medical Services for 30 Corps.

In October 1943 Brigadier Patrick A. Ardagh was created a Commander of the Order of the British Empire (C.B.E.) and selected by General Montgomery to join the planning team for the invasion of Normandy. It was whilst employed on this mammoth task that Brigadier Patrick A. Ardagh died in London on April 6, 1944, at the age of 56, a respected figure greatly missed by the D Day planning staff and all who had known him.

In a message to New Zealand in 1944 General Freyberg said of Brigadier Ardagh:

"His great professional and administrative ability was unsparingly given to our Division durng its most difficult campaigns. He left us to take a position in the British Army at the express wish of General Montgomery and General Reese whose complete confidence he had. His kindness, enthusiasm and cheerfulness will never be forgotten byus!"

The Citation for the award of the Military Cross to Brigadier Ardagh reads:

"He worked in the open all day under very trying conditions, and at times under heavy fire. Hearing that the personnel of another battalion's aid post had been blown out, he went to the place and worked for several hours under shell fire until he had cleared the wounded. By his energy and disregard of danger many lives were saved!"

The Citation for the award of the Distinguished Service Order to Brigadier Ardagh reads:---

"Forced to place his dressing station in a spot constantly shelled by the enemy, for 36 hours he continued to dress the wounded while shells fell on the station. He attended not only his own battalion wounded but men of three other battalions, and worked continuously without sleep the whole time. He displayed high courage and resource and was the means of saving many lives!"

RUGBY

1st XV Notes

Local Competition

With the return of 11 of last year's First XV, and an influx of several useful Junior class footballers, the 1968 season proved to be the most successful for some years. The 1st XV again played in the Combined Ruapehu-Taihape 3rd Grade and dominated this competition to the extent of being unbeaten in 15 competition games.

Big mobile forwards, thrust and speed in the backs, contributed to the cricket-like scores often meted out to the opposing teams. Fourteen members of the team played at least one game for the Ruapehu 3rd Grade Representative side, but because of leave commitments players were not selected for King Country. Results later in the season against leading Club sides from other Sub Unions in King Country proved, however, that many were worthy of selection.

School Games

Five inter-school matches were played. The first two against Taumarunui and Pukekohe High School being the only two defeats suffered by the first fifteen all season.

Against Taumarunui High School played at Taumarunui, a very depleted and very much below form XV were handed a rugby lesson 27—13 by a well drilled and keen Taumarunui side. At Pukekohe in a game played in such atrocious conditions that all other club games in Auckland were cancelled, Cadets were defeated by 6—3 in a very close and tough struggle. The third school match against Taupo-Nui-a-Tia College resulted in a runaway 34—3 victory to Cadets. A much lighter Taupo side strove hard but found the weight and speed of the Cadets too much.

A close game against Whakatane High School resulted in a win to Cadets 9—3 and set the scene for the annual game against St Stephen's. This game, the highlight of the Cadet School rugby year, developed into a thriller with Cadets at half time leading 6—3, a field goal and a try to a penalty. A very determined St Stephen's side came into the second half prepared to inflict a severe defeat on Cadets. An inspired Cadet side magnificently led by their captain RSM Hutchinson fought back and the best St Stephen's could manage was a further penalty. When the final whistle blew after a great game two very tired teams left the field. St. Stephen's to return to Auckland feeling a little relieved at forcing a draw. Cadets who for the first time in the history of the School had not been defeated by St Stephen's, to ponder the justice of a draw (one field goal and a try to two penalties). A game which will not be forgotten in Cadet School for many years.

Junior Inter-Service Tournament

With the result of the St Stephen's game in the books the first XV began preparing for the Junior Inter-Service Tournament, this year held at Waiouru. In blustering conditions Air Cadets defeated Navy 12—3 in a close fought game leaving Army as hosts to play Navy in the second game of the tournament. A fast moving game featuring a hard forward struggle. An intercept runaway try by Navy and some excellent forward-back linkups by Cadets resulted in a deserving 12—8 victory to Cadets.

The Air v Army final on the last day of the tournament was played in cool conditions which favoured a running type of game. Cadets provided this type of game and with plenty of ball the backs used it to advantage and scored some fine tries. Air Cadets without ball could not use what appeared to be a speedy backline and constant pressure in the second half resulted in lapses in defence. The final result was Cadets 19 (4 tries, 1 penalty, 2 conversion), Air 3 (1 penalty). An enjoyable tournament for both spectators and players ably refereed by Messrs C Pedley, D Illston and C Bosher.

Although no junior services representative game was played a team was selected. Congratulations to Cooney, Forrester, McCracken, Paenga, Chambers A, Chambers D, Stowell, Parsons and Powell, the nine Cadets selected.

King Country Premier Third Grade Club Competition

August leave appeared to end the playing season but with the return to Camp in early September came the news that as winners of the Ruapehu Sub Union Trophy we were entitled to play Ohura (Taumarunui Sub Union), the holders of the McQuaglan Trophy for the premier 3rd Grade side in the King Country Union. This game was played at Ohura on 7th September. In a close game Cadets, a little slow after three weeks layoff, defeated Ohura 12—9. Waitti Club from Maniapoto Sub Union challenged the following Saturday. In a fast moving game a determined if rather unfit Cadet side defeated them 11—3. Otorohanga and Tongariro defaulted leaving Cadets with yet another trophy.

Summary

With the season finally over the first XV after probably its most successful season ever could count its spoils. A grand total of 26 games for 22 wins, 2 draws and 2 losses. 591 points scored for and 110 against.

In order to select teams for this competition at the start of the season, a Cadet knock out competition was held at the end of which Cdt Munro L emerged as the top singles player, and Cdts Lonergan and Morgan as the top doubles combination.

Inter unit competition was then begun with one team in the A Grade and three in the B Grade. With the entry of Ardagh Class Cadets in January, the number of Cadet players rose, despite losses through graduation. This meant that an increased number of teams was now available for inter unit tennis. To cater for them the tennis club promoted a C grade competition

Against Whakatane the tennis team played its best tennis of the season. Although they only managed to draw, at three games all, the standard of tennis was such that this was a remarkable performance. Cadet Belcher was the outstanding Cadet player winning both his singles and doubles matches.

Once more the Cadets played in the Ruapehu Associations Championships, this year at Raetihi. Here Cdt Langdon and his partner reached the final of the mixed doubles to be beaten py the Wawatai combination. Cdt Langdon's CSM certainly had the last laugh here. The other Cadet to do well was Cadet Munro L. who reached the semi-final of the singles.

The end of the season's activities included a well organised club barbecue.

SOFTBALL NOTES

The softball for 1968 got under way with 8 teams being formed, from over 90 players.

The first team started with a very strong lineup, having five of the 1967 team, including the team captain Kelly WB, to provide a basis for the new team. Several new players soon established themselves as regular team members to make up a very strong combination. However, the problem of courses outside the Cadet School limited the numbers of players available for regular competition and brought about the introduction of players from the lower grades. At the beginning of the year the first team competed in a knockout tournament which they won. However, the lack, later in the season, of a regular competition and the lack of strong opposition, forced the team to look further afield.

The highlight of the season was the game played against Waikune, who won narrowly by 12—10. In this game the cadets were matched against a team which provided three of the King Country team who later played the All American San Antonian team.

Two members of the Cadet team went on to win the honour of representing Waiouru Command in the softball team which competed in the annual Inter-District Summer Sports held at Trentham. These were Cadets Stowell LD and Waihi R.

The annual Inter-School games were marred by the loss of team captain Kelly WB, Nock E, and Pederson L who were in Fiji on an Instructor's Course. The St Stephens game gave Cadets a victory 24—8, but the Whakatane game resulted in a narrow loss 15—16.

Finally, special mention must be made of Sgt Nepia's efforts as a coach. Much of the team's success was due to him.

ATHLETICS

The 1967-68 Athletic Season has been the most outstanding season ever, for the School. With a large squad of 30, Sgt Pitt J and Sgt Nathan LW started the season by using the Athletic Five Star Test, thus enabling the coaches and athletes to have a guide towards the most suitable event for each individual. As a result, some firstclass results were achieved towards the end of the season.

On Tuesday evenings the team competed at the Taihape Athletic. Club Twilight Meetings and had good outings to Wanganui, New Plymouth, Palmerston North, Inglewood and the West Coast North Island Championships Meetings. Cdts Dow DA, Ryan AR, Holden D, and Dangerfield WL were selected to represent the West Coast North Island against Waikato with Cdt Ryan winning the 880 yds event. In the West Coast North Island Championships, Cdt Dow gained 2nd placing in the 100 yds and the Broad Jump event. The School's 4 x 110 yds Relay Team (Cdts Bowler D, Parsons TW, Stephens RL and Dow D), had an equal placing and time of 46.4 secs. This was a tremendous race, and a fine result for the School.

At the Taihape Championships the School scooped the pool, setting six new records with Cdt Dow being the Colt Champion and Cdt Parsons being the Junior Champion.

One of the highlights of the season was the Huntly Centennial Torch Relay, for which the School supplied 10 runners on the Wajouru to Turangi leg. It should be noted that this was the worst stretch of road in the relay, and when the first Cadet received the Torch the relay was $3\frac{1}{2}$ minutes behind schedule. However, when the last Cadet handed the Torch over, the relay was 10 minutes ahead of schedule. The organisers were amazed by this feat, and commented on the fitness and enthusiasm of the Cadet runners.

In March Cdts Dow, Holden and Ryan were selected to represent the Army in the Inter-Service Athletic Meeting, with Cdt Dow going on to represent the Combined Services Athletic Team. To finish a great season, Cdt Dow ran 48.8 secs for the 440 yds at Hastings; this was the fastest time recorded in New Zealand for a Colt and put him in the top ten fastest in New Zealand for all grades. This effort and performance speaks for itself. With most of last season's athletes returning for the 1968-69 season, we can expect another good year and maybe, who knows, a New Zealand Champion for the 1970 Commonwealth Games at Edinburgh, Scotland, the land of porridge and the mighty.
