#### THE CREST

The Dixon crest, worn as the badge of the Regular Force Cadets, has had long associations with The Army Schools. During his period of office as Governor-General (1910-1912) the Rt Hon Poynder Dixon-Poynder, Iohn KCMG, Baron Islington, DSO, granted permission to General Headquarters NZ Army for his family crest to be used as the badge for the Senior Cadet Officers (Unattached, List B). In 1921 when the Senior Cadet Officers were absorbed into the Territorial Infantry Regiments the use of the badge lapsed.

In 1927-28 the badge was brought into use again by the GHQ Training Depot, Trentham. Again in 1932 the badge was used in the first wing of the Regular Force Recruits and its use was continued with subsequent wings. Approval for the badge to be reserved as the Training Depot badge was given on 25 November, 1933. In May, 1936, as there was no official record of Lord Islington having granted permission for the use of his crest, his consent to the use of it as a badge for Regular Force recruits was sought and obtained. The crest was used from then on for this purpose. The company of Regular Force soldiers formed in 1938 for garrison duties on Fanning Island also used this badge.

After the war, Regular Force recruits at The Army School of Instruction continued to wear the badge until actually posted to corps — a custom which lasted until 1950.

When the Regular Force Cadet Unit was formed at The Army School of Instruction in 1948 its members, like other recruits. therefore wore the Dixon Crest. Up to this time it had always been in brass, but when the Cadets provided their first Guard of Honour their badges were chromium plated, and from this time forward the Cadets wore a silver crest while other recruits continued to use the old brass ones. In 1950 the crest (now silver) became the exclusive property of the Cadets.

In 1952 it was felt that while

the badge was given to the Cadet Unit and could well remain as their badge, it could at the same time be used as the crest for Army Schools as a whole, since the Cadet Unit was the most permanent unit of Army Schools. This proposal was adopted, but the distinction in colour still remains. The crest as used by Cadets is in silver; as used by Army Schools, in gold.

The crest may be seen as a portion of Lord Islington's Coat of Arms hanging in the main entrance hall of Government Hcuse, Wellington.

#### THE MOTTO

To the crest has been added on the badge a scroll bearing the motto 'FORTES FORTUNA JUVAT'.

The form of this very frequently quoted proverb comes from the writings of the Younger Pliny (A.D. circ 61-114). The proverb will be found in this form in the sixteenth letter of the sixth book of Pliny's Epistles, one cf the two famous letters in which Pliny describes to his friend Tacitus the eruption of Mount Vesuvius which obliterated Pompeii in A.D. 79. Pliny's uncle, Pliny the Elder, was a very important civil servant in the Admiralty who wrote a huge work on Natural History which was still the naturalists' Bible in the Middle Ages and even later. He was at the near-by dockyards when the eruption began, and resolved to go out to sea to make scientific observations and take notes. He received a message that friends of his in a villa under the mountain were in danger, and cut off from all retreat save by sea. In the Earl of Orrey's translation the Younger Pliny savs (para .10) "He commanded the galleys to put off from land, and embarked with a design not only to relieve the people of Retinae, but many others in distress, as the shore was interspersed with a variety of pleasant villages. He sailed immediately to places which were abandoned by other people, and boldly held his course in the face of danger, so com-posed, as to remark distinctly the appearance and progress of

this dreadful calamity, and to digest and dictate these remarks.

He now found that the ashes beat into the ships, much hotter and in greater quantities; and as he drew nearer, pumice stones with black flints, burnt and torn up by the flames, broke in upor them: and now, the hasty ebb of the sea, and ruins tumbling from the mountain, hindered their nearer approach to the shore. Pausing a little upon this, whether he should not return back, and instigated to it by the pilot, he ories cut 'Fortune assists the brave' — 'fortes fortuna juvat'

Professor H. A. Murray of the Department of Classics, Victoria University of Wellington, who gave the above information, goes on to comment: "That gentle and even timid soul, the Younger Pliny, was an enormous asthmatic man who slept little, read enormously and took copious notes. I should have great respect for his accuracy. Possibly the Schools have adopted this form of the proverb because of its brevity. The Earl of Orrey says that Pliny was quoting Virgil Aeneid 10, 284, 'audentes Fortuna iuuat', but if so, as a typically undemonstrative civil servant with a taste for concise language, he no doubt adapted the proverb to the occasion in brief prose form.

"A book called "Die Sprichwoerter under Sprichwoertlichen Redensarten der Roemar", by Dr A. Otto, contains no less than twenty Latin variations of this proverb and five Greek ones. The cuctation from the Phormio of Terence is in thick print as being the most popular form — 'Fortes Fortuna adiuuat'. But it must be remembered that Terence and Virgil wrote verse, whereas Pliny is not necessarily condemned to metre.

"One last point which you will consider furgy; there is no 'U' capital in the Roman alphabet, and no 'v' small, only 'V' and 'u'. If you could persuade people to sell 'FORTES FORTVNA IVVAT' or 'Fortes Fortuna Iuuat', I should be indeed gratified." (end of Professor Murray's comment). Obituary

# MAJOR GENERAL SIR STEPHEN WEIR, KBE, CB, DSO

It was with deep regret that the School learned of the sudden death of Sir Stephen Weir KBE, CB, DSO and Bar at Tauranga on 24th September.

Sir Stephen was the reviewing officer and guest of honour at the School's Twenty-first birthday parade and celebrations where he made a lasting impression on the Cadets both by his speaking and presence at all functions. Sir Stephen had planned to review this year's December Graduation Parade and was also intending to make an informal visit to the school.

Sir Stephen was buried with full Military honours. His funeral was attended by dignitaries both from New Zealand and overseas.

Included were the Minister of Defence, the Honourable DS Thomson, MC; the Chief of the Defence Staff, Sir Leonard Thornton, KCB, CBE; the Chief of the General Staff, Major-General Dawson, CBE, DSO; the Chief of the Naval Staff and the representative of the Chief of the Air Staff.

As well there were representatives from both the Thai and Vietnamese Governments.

A guard of honour, made up of Artillery and SAS, was present at the church service and at the graveside. A thirteen gun salute was fired by gunners of 161 Battery.

The School was represented by the OC Major H. R. Burt, two Ardagh Class Cadets (RSM Brown and CSM Rivett) and two Weir Class Cadets (Cpl. Wilson and Sgt. Rangi).

All present were impressed by the solemnity of the occasion. It was both a moving and a fitting farewell to a great soldier.

# The 1969 Class Patron Major General Sir Stephen Weir,

KBE, CB, DSO.

Major General Sir Stephen Weir graduated from the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, in 1927 and after service with artillery formations in the United Kingdom returned to New Zealand in 1929. In September, 1939, he was appointed a battery commander in the 4th New Zealand Field Regiment.

He was appointed from command of the 7th Anti-tank Regiment to the Command of the 6th Field Regiment in February 1940. He became CRA, New Zealand Division, in 1941 and was later CCRA, 10th Corps, Eighth Army, in Italy.

When General Freyberg was injured in an aircraft accident in September, 1944, Sir Stephen (then Brigadier) took command of 2nd New Zealand Division with the temporary rank of Major General.

He was appointed to command the 46th British Division then fighting alongside the New Zealand Division on Italy's Adriatic coast. He commanded the Division in Greece, through the closing stages of the Italian campaign and as part of the Army of Occupation in Austria. In 1946 he returned to the United Kingdom on attachment to the War Office and to attend courses at Aldershot and Salisbury.

Sir Stephen returned to New Zealand in January 1948, and

was Commander, Southern Military District, until he left for the United Kingdom to attend the 1950 course at the Imperial

Defence College. After a further period on attachment to the War Office he returned to New Zealand in 1951 and became Quar-General. He termaster was appointed Chief of the General Staff Committee in 1956. He relinquished these appointments in September 1960 to become Military Adviser to the New Zealand Government, in which capacity he remained a member of the New Zealand Chiefs of Staff Committee.

In October 1961 Sir Stephen was appointed New Zealand Ambassador to Thailand and South Vietnam, relinquishing the appointment in December 1967.

Major General Sir Stephen Weir was awarded the DSO in 1941, a bar to the DSO in 1942, the CBE in 1944 and the CB in 1945. In 1960 he was made Knight Commander of the British Empire. He also has been mentioned in despatches six times and holds the Cross of St. Andreas (Greece) and the United States Legion of Merit, Degree of Commander.

Sir Stephen died at his home in Tauranga on 24 September, 1969.

Regular Force Cadet School representatives at the funeral were Major H. R. Burt, Cadet RSM Brown KR, Cadet CSM Rivett R, Cadet Sgt Rangi WRT, and Cadet Lepl Wilson PG.

## A COY NOTES

The writer of this article, who joined the School in June 1969 has now had an opportunity to have a good look at the system and in particular the Soldier Company. It is obvious that there are opportunities aplenty for promotion next year, and of course there will be opportunity for promotion amongst next year's class as well.

## TRAINING WING NOTES

1969 has been a busy and successful year. We can look back at an impressive tally of courses with a certain amount of satisfaction.

At the start of each training year we are always faced with the old problems of where we will get the essential equipment and qualified instructors from. The problems always get solved eventually with the assistance of our friends in Q Stores and the help from the Barrack Commanders and Apprentice Wing. This year, due to the increase in numbers of the new intake, additional instructor assistance was grate-fully received from 1 Bn Depot who supplied fixe Ex Cadet instructors to help us over this trying period. Next year RF Depot are going to give us considerable assistance in training a number of the increased new intake.

With Basic Training completed and most of the cadets scattered to the Education Wing, Apprentice Wing and Corps Schools, we were able to get on with the Continuation training for our Soldier Trainees — this year with a difference.

Initially we received assistance from 1 Ranger Sqn NZSAS and on the 9th April a party of 30 Soldier Trainees moved to a camp site in the shores of Lake Roto Aira to learn some of the basic skills taught to SAS soldiers. The subjects covered were Floatation, Cliff Climbing, Small Boating, Ambushing Techniques and Navigation. instructed on the various methods of moving themselves and their equipment across rivers etc., ensuring that the equipment was still dry and serviceable on reaching the other side. Depending on the individual swimming



ability, this phase provided some either humorous or anxious moments.

The Cliff Climbing phase, although rather terrifying at the start proved a great boost to self confidence. After a few practices in the various methods taught, the Cadets found that their fear of heights had almost vanished.

Probably the most popular phase was small boating. Although the conditions on the lake were most unfavourable all the

SAS Cook, who, with the assistance of four Cadet cooks turned out the best meals one's ever eaten in the field.

In April another new phase of training was introduced in the form of an A & Q Admin Course conducted by the School of Army Administration. This course proved highly successful and provided the soldier trainees with a background knowledge of Army Administration which will prove invaluable to them in their future careers. For this reason we hope to include this course in future programmes.

Other courses prepared and run by the Training Wing were three Pre-Instructors courses, two Signals Handlers courses, two Infantry Weapons courses, a Minor Tactics course and additional phases of the Basic course, for those Cadets who completed Phase one only, in January. The Training Wing also assisted with two Basic Driver's Courses run by RNZASC School and supplied enemy parties to NSTU, OCTU and the School of Infantry. Finally, due to the good impression given by the Cadets at Lake Roto Aira, a party of 19 includ-ing 4 RF Staff took part as the enemy in a 1 Ranger Sqn exercise in the Te Puke area. As with the previous experience with the SAS, the ten days period proved not only beneficial but also very enjoyable to Cadets and the Staff members alike. In fact, the general opinion was that no one wanted to come back to Waicuru! It was most gratifying for the Staff members to hear so many comments, about the RF Cadets from those 'hard bitten' soldiers of 1 Ranger Sqn. It is obvious that we have some hidden SAS soldiers in our midst. To mention but one, Lcpl Ngaheu left a lasting impression on one SAS Op Group who are probably hoping that the Viet Cong are not so observant as RF Cadets.

During the year a large number of Cadets have attended various courses at Corps Schools, and the results have been pleasing. Probably the most rewarding course run by the Wing is the Pre-Instructors Course conducted at the end of each Continuation Training Phase.

The potential instructors from

this course go on to RF Depot to attend the RF Basic All Arms Instructors Course. Cadets attending a course of this magnitude would normally be at a disadvantage due to lack of experience, but with a Pre-Instructors Course behind them the results have been good. During 1969 eleven Cadets attended the BAA Instructors Coursc.

All in all we feel that the Training Wing has more than fulfilled our aim during 1969, which is to produce a Cadet with a sound background knowledge in his soldier trade prior to graduation into his Corps. The aim would never have been achieved without the teamwork and assistance from all members of RF Cadet School Staff.

## EXERCISE "FLAT STICK"

In the early hours of 8 Oct 69 and in the pouring rain, a party of nineteen from the School departed for the Rotorua/Te Puke area. This move was the result of a request from 1 Ranger Sqn NZSAS that the Cadet School supply an enemy for their exercise 'Flat Stick'.

The exercise was conducted to give final training for reinforce-

ments due to depart for Vietnam in the near future. Our part was to play the role of Viet Cong during the patrol exercise phase from 12 to 17 October. The request from 1 Ranger Sqn was very welcome for the two ex SAS Officers on the staff and the Cadets, some of whom had been lucky enough to participate in the SAS Training at Lake Roto Aira in April.

After a cold four hour trip and some anxious map reading by OC A Coy, the party arrived at the SAS Base Camp on Fletchers Road in the Mamaku Forest. Being the 1 Ranger Sqn HQ, the base was well set up and our party was welcomed with good food, tented accommodation and 'spot-on' administration.

Anyone who thought that the exercise was going to be easy had their hopes dashed next morning as the enemy moved out of base camp to recce and set up patrol camps. Being typical New Zealanders, everyone was carrying far too much in their packs and the party had not moved far down the Brimstone Track before the heavy loads were apparent.

To the uninitiated, the area in which we were working consists of mainly secondary growth native bush. The area was milled during the period from 1931 until

1941, and as a result is covered in heavy secondary growth, felled timber and tree stumps. The topography is relatively flat with few streams and occasional rock outcrops. The whole area is interlaced with old tracks and tram lines used during the milling period. The tracks are of varying width, state of repair and meander off to all points of the compass for no apparent reason. Needless to say, the maps of the area are completely unreliable. Into this mess we plunged to set up our patrol camps.

Every effort was made to simulate Viet Cong Camps — at "Rimu Falls" was located the HQ Section under Lt Withers. Also at this location was WOI "Shorty" Jamison MM who directed the enemy activity. Rimu Falls was presumably named after our water point which consisted of a pathetic dribble of tea coloured water which drained from a fairly extensive swamp. Further to the east, at "Kauri Grove" was the camp of one section under Sgt Bob Christie. They cunningly set up their camp and promptly shifted to a more desirable spot on a tiny island on the edge of a lagoon. Although tactically a death trap, very wind-blown and cold, they maintained their camp was wonderful - probably because of the water availability. Sgt Tiny Manuera and two section set up their craftily concealed camp at "Willow Gulch". They suffered from a chronic shortage of water and had to rely completely on jerry cans of the stuff carried in from the SAS Base Camp. (carried by the boys, not the SAS). To the West, some hours' march away Lcpl Bob Davies set up his camp in company with WOI Pat Shaw DCM, MM of the SAS Directing Staff.

After the initial recce and setting up of Camps we all returned to the SAS Base camp for a much needed wash, fresh meals and a comfortable sleep. We returned to the bush on the 12th October and started our activities as enemy. Our Patrols were designed to give the SAS Op Groups who were observing our movements, the impression of reinforcements and supplies moving from East to West and casualties and unladen carrying parties moving back from west to east.

Because of the nature of the exercise we did not see much of our enemy during the period. They were there to see but not to be seen. Cadet Scoullar however, made the first contact. HQ and Two Section were waiting on an LP for the arrival of Chief Viet Cong Maj Burt when Scoullar heard some noises from the bush. He moved up to the edge of the bush and peered in - but could see nothing. He then glanced down and noticed a cigarette butt near his feet, just inside the bush. Beside the cigarette butt was a pair of boots! Logically he allowed his eyes to move upwards and found himself face to face with a grinning, hideously green painted and bearded face. The face said "BOO" and then retreated. Scoullar's nerves are OK now, and quite back to normal.

# RNZE APPRENTICE WING

Since the establishment of RF Cadet School at Waiouru in 1952, the RNZE Apprentice Wing has operated as a sub-unit of the School. This is brought about by the fact that there is no RNZE Unit in Waiouru Command and the small number of RNZE Apprentices undergoing training does not warrant the establishment of a separate Corps School. With 5 Instructors and only 9 Apprentices training at the present time, RNZE Corps representation is indeed very small in this Command.

Captain B. Brighouse RNZE, now Lt-Col and Chief Engineer, was Chief Instructor of the Apprentice Wing until 1957 when he was succeeded by Captain R Treanor RNZE. When the separate apprentice company was formed in late 1963, the dual appointment of Company Commander B Company and Chief Instructor RNZE Apprentice Wing was filled by Captain DG Petherick RNZE, and from 1967 by Captain GW Boxall LTCL, RNZAEC.

At the present time, RNZE Staff comprise Sgt Nathan LW, Accounting Officer, Sgt Sowerby RJ and Cpl Futter DR, Carpentry Instructors, Sgt Nepia TeOMT, Plumbing Instructor, and Cpl Inwood R. B., Electrical Instructor.

Apprentice numbers at the beginning of this year were at a healthy level with 16 Carpenter/ Joiners, 4 Electricians, and 2 Plumbers receiving training. Nonconfirmation of apprenticeship and graduation have since considerably reduced their number.

The standard of theory work and the examination pass rate continue to be high, with one apprentice gaining 90% for a First Qualifying Examination paper sat last November, and a 96.1% pass rate for the Wing overall.

The Staff wish this year's candidates the same degree of success, and extend good wishes to Cadets graduating from the Wing this December.

## EDUCATION WING NOTES

At the time these notes are written each year, the University Entrance and School Certificate examinations are just around the corner, and it is usually more pleasant to reflect on the results of the previous year than ponder with the inevitable pessimism on the results which are shortly to come.

Therefore to begin with last year's results. One student passed the University Entrance examination; a total of sixty five School Certificate subjects were passed by twenty five full-time and five part-time candidates: and fourteen candidates gained eighteen passes in the Chamber of Commerce examinations. One Higher School Certificate and seven Endorsed School Certificates were awarded. Altogether seven candidates sat University Entrance. twenty six School Certificate, and nineteen Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber of Commerce course was introduced for the first time last year, and proved a valuable incentive to the General Education class. Sixty five Army Certificates of Education Class II were awarded.

This year three Cadets are studying for the University Bursaries Examination, commuting daily to Taihape College for the purpose. Ten students commenc-University Entrance ed the course, of whom three have been discharged during the year. Seven will sit the examination. Thirty seven students will sit School Certificate examination, mainly in four subjects each, three taking five subjects and four part-time students taking one subject each. The single-subject School Certificate scheme has meant that some of our students, who have already gained passes in previous attempts, stand to finish with up to six School Certificate passes. Thirty eight students will be attempting Chamber of Commerce examinations.

The staff saw perhaps more than the usual number of changes during the year. Major D. M. Campbell, our maths teacher, is now bringing a wee breath of heather to the eastern clime of

Malaya, and has been replaced by Flight Lieutenant G. K. Masters, whose blue uniform reminds us that education seems to be leading the way in tri-service integration. Next year Flight Lieutenant Masters will take over the Physics department, and Captain K. A. Sanders, who arrived in the third term from Slim School in Malaya, becomes our senior mathematician. Lieutenant WP Dreyer arrived at the beginning of the year to become one of our geography experts. We were sad to farewell our Education Assistant at the Wing, Lieutenant H Cherrington, but we congratulate him heartily on his promotion to commissioned rank and appointment to the responsible post of Staff Officer Education at Army Headquarters. Congratulations are also in order to Captain and Mrs H Duncan on the birth of a daughter (and to the Traffic Department in connection with Captain Duncan's consequent trips to Wellington). The gap in our Commercial Practice department caused by Lieutenant Cherrington's posting at the end of the second term is being ably and attractively filled by Mrs M Masters.

Next year we look forward to two new appointments to the Wing, one in the much-needed science department, and we trust that the Wing will be more fully staffed than it has been for many years — a necessary measure in view of an anticipated increase in the student roll. It is hoped too that if we have a Bursary Class next year it will be pos-

sible to provide the instruction at the Education Wing.

The repainting of our buildings last year was followed up this year by the laying of new linoleum. We hope that the new furniture on order will shortly complete the Wing's accommodation "regeneration".

The Wing's particular thanks are due to Lieutenant Colonel IT Gill at Army Headquarters, a former Chief Instructor, especially for his efforts in obtaining new staff: to Warrant Officer McRae. also late of the Wing and now of Army Headquarters, for visiting the Wing to aid correspondence students with laboratory work for chemistry; to the tutors of the Correspondence School for their efforts with twenty of our students this year who took subjects which could not be taught at the Wing; to the Officer Commanding, Headquarters, and A Company Staffs of the Cadet School for their interest and cooperation which have greatly contributed to the educational programme; to Mrs Masters for coming to the rescue in Commercial Practice; to the Headmaster and Staff of Taihape College for their work with our Bursary students, and to Miss Hollis, who has gracefully coped with our indecipherable writing and tremendous typing requirements. The Education Department Inspectors again proved very helpful in their guidance and suggestions.

To those Cadets who when they are reading this magazine will have sat their final examinations and awaiting results, the very best of luck!

## P.T. WING

A feature of the syllabus has been the inclusion of initiative training. This has been designed with the object of developing not only initiative, but also team work. There is no doubt that both qualities are needed to carry a loaded stretcher over a wall twelve feet high.

The Wing Gymnastics Team has been active and has participated in displays at a number of College Galas and St. John Ambulance Days. The aim for the future includes plans for a display at the Auckland Military Tattoo.

## RNZASC SCHOOL

The Royal New Zealand Army Service Corps School is organised with a Headquarters and a number of subordinate instructional wings. Its main role is to train, to a uniformly high standard, selected personnel in those aspects of organisations, command, operational techniques, and other skills required of the Corps in both peace and war.

#### MT Wing

Driver training is of course, the most appealing to the young soldier. What can be better than sitting behind the wheel of a heavy truck, slapping it into gear and then letting all systems go.

Teaching Cadets to drive is the most educational of all instruction. It is extremely exciting, emotional and above all harrowing. The trick if you can, is not to watch the Cadet but watch the instructor. You will see more colours and facial expressions than either the rainbow or Sammy Dav's Jnr can produce.

The Cade's are first taught to drive land'overs and also the servicing of that vehicle.

Cadets being young fellows have a great habit of growing up very quickly on this vehicle. After one hour's driving tuition, they will inevitably turn to their instructor quite pleased with their effort, and say, "Can I go onto the big truck now, Sir?"

One can imagine the effect this innocent request has on the instructor, whose adrenalin has by this time been used up in the previous hour's tuition.

The primary aim of training at this stage is to bring the Cadet to a standard of driving which will enable him to pass his HT licence test, plus an efficient and responsible attitude to the handling and servicing of a Landrover.

The Cadet then progresses a further stage by commencing driver training on the 3 ton RL Bedford which culminates in their attending an RF OR Basic RNZASC 1 Star Course held at the School. Generally by this stage they have passed their licence test for heavy trade vehicles. At this time they also qualify as Drivers 1 Star.

The Cadets again progress by attending the courses which allow them to qualify for their second star. These two courses which are held in our District Training Wings are RF OR Driver (All Arms) 2 Star, and Aircraft Loaders.

Between courses the Cadets are employed in the School Transport Office and taught the operating procedures of such an office with vehicle repairs of a minor nature also given. They may also be employed as drivers with Waiouru Company in maintaining the normal domestic requirements for Waiouru Command. Employment is also available at the Central Servicing Station in which the use of power operated servicing equipment is of extreme importance.

The programme is quite interesting and rewarding for the young chap who is willing to put his best foot forward.

Comes the day of graduation for the Cadets and we find that those who have passed through the quiet and humdrum atmosphere of the MT wing have attended and qualified on courses to the standard required for 2 star grading with background experience in some cases up to 3 star level. Some Cadets have even prepared themselves to attain the higher goal of MT Instructor RNZASC.

## CATERING WING

The apprentice cook scheme was introduced with the RF Cadets in 1948. Miles Coy had four apprentice cooks (Cadets Harris, Hill, Web and Woods). Today there are 100 apprentice chefs who have received their trade training through the RNZASC School Catering Wing.

In 1962 the NZ Army accepted the Cookery and Food Association of London Trade Certificate Examinations and from 1962 until 1969, all apprentice chefs have been examined to the C.F.A. Standards.

The trade certificate examinations offered by the C.G.A. of London were:

The Basic Catering Certificate. The Craftsmans Catering Certificate.

The Higher Trade Certificate. Representatives of the C.F.A. conducted the practical and theory examinations at the Catering Wing. Theory papers were sent to London for marking. In 1964 a C.F.A. examiner, Mr G. U. B. Martin, BEM, came to New Zealand and has since been responsible for the marking of theory papers. Three papers of each examination are still sent to England after Mr Martin has marked them. This ensures that the trade certificate standard is being maintained.

In 1967 a British Parliamentary Act made the City and Guilds of London Institute responsible for all trade examinations.

This year fourteen apprentice chefs all qualified in the City and Guilds 147 Basic Cookery examination for the Catering Industry trade certificate examinations. All have also qualified for their Army 1 Star.

The best junior class Cadet Chef this year was Cadet William McLennan.

All of the 1968 class gained their Army 2 Star qualification this year and will be sitting the City and Guilds 151 Cookery examination for the Hotel and Catering Industry trade examination in May 1970. The best senior class Cadet

The RNZASC School are proud of their apprentice chefs and look forward to 1970 when they will have twenty-four chefs and six Supervising Stewards Apprentices.

1969 has been a good year for Ex Cadet Apprentice Cooks and Chefs.

Ex Cadet MCA Harris of Miles Company (1948) was commissioned Lt and QM.

Ex Cadet MT Campbell of Gentry Class (1962) is doing his Officer Training at Portsea, and it is understood that he is doing very well and holds a Senior Officer Cadet Appointment.

Ex Cadet J Gruber of Russell Class (1960) has been an instructor at the Catering Wing and is now the Catering Manager of the RF Cadet Kitchen.

# SCHOOL OF ARMOUR

#### General:

This year has been a quiet one at the School as we have commenced preparation, for conversion to the M113 series of vehicles. These are Armoured Personnel Carriers which are used by the US, Australian and other Western Armies. The vehicles are fully tracked, amphibious and air portable. They are used extensively in South Vietnam where they form the basis of the Cavalry formations in the theatre.

This re-equipment process has meant a playing down of the training aspects at the School. However, our basic requirement to produce trained Armoured Crewmen has not been forgotten or neglected. To this end four Cadets (Bennett DW, O'Brien LR, Fisher KR and Hobbs DC), have attended courses at the School.

#### Gunnery Wing:

One Cadet (O'Brien LR), at tended the Gunnery Course on the M41 tank. This tank has a variety of weapons. The main armament is the high velocity 76mm tank gun. Also carried are the .50in machine gun and the .30in machine gun. Learning how to operate and maintain these weapons is only part of the course. Care and use of optical equipment from binoculars to periscopes is all part of a gunner's job and the course provides a thorough grounding in the skills required by a tank gunner.

#### Radio Wing:

There were three Cadets (Lowe, Reihana, and McKissock) on the Signaller's course. This course is designed to teach students to operate all the radios used with the RNZAC. Radio operators in an armoured crew are very important as our units depend so greatly on communications. The range of subjects covered by the course is very wide and it is easy to maintain a high level of interest.

Driving and Maintenance Wing: This Wing runs courses to train drivers for all types of vehicles used within the Corps. Three Cadets (Hobbs DC, Bennett and O'Brien), attended the Ferret Driver Course. This vehicle is a light wheeled armoured scout car. Armoured vehicles have complex systems and require a high standard of maintenance and operating skill. The Cadets on this course successfully completed it and are now able to take their place in an armoured team.

The School of Armour wishes them well for their future in the Corps.

## REGULAR FORCE DEPOT

1969 has been a rewarding year for Cadets on course at the Regular Force Depot. Seventeen Cadets attended Instructor's Courses.

The value a Cadet should get from attending an Instructor's Course is extremely beneficial in many fields - not simply in obtaining a qualification for military purposes. The course helps to instill confidence in the individual and to develop his personality. He quickly develops or consolidates his ability to adjust to a particular environment and to become used to working with people beyond his own Cadet environment. The value obtained from the military point of view must be obvious, but certain factors must never be overlooked such as development of leadership qualities, competence gained from a thorough knowledge of the subjects covered and the development of that factor so special to the Army teamwork.

In adition, the Cadet meets soldiers from most Corps and Units in the New Zealand Army on the course and therefore he may establish lifelong friendships and he will certainly have a much more intimate knowledge of how the Army operates.

When a Cadet has qualified on an instructor's course he should be a confident, disciplined and knowledgeable instructor, well established as a potential senior NCO — an example to others.

The current instructor's courses last for fourteen works of which six weeks are spent on drill and duties, five weeks on weapon training and three weeks on tropical orientation in Fiji.

## R.N.Z.E.M.E. SCHOOL

The 1969 training year got away to a good start with 16 first year apprentices joining the 19 senior apprentices. Of these, 30 now remain either as Cadet or graduated apprentices. The other five left for various reasons, and we can but wish them luck in whatever occupations they choose in civilian life. We remind all apprentices and wouldbe apprentices of the high standards set by previous apprentice classes and also of the high standards required not only by the Army but in all apprenticeships. These standards are rising each year, and we can not afford to waste time and money attempting to train apprentices who are not prepared to accept the high standards required or are not prepared to make the most of their comparatively short time here at RNZEME School.

Once again, this year has seen a number of staff changes at the school, but we are still managing to obtain the services of a high percentage of ex-cadets on the staff. The Chief Instructor, Major PQ Horgan (Puttick Class) will leave in November with his family for Thailand. The 2IC, Capt BH Munro, is on a five-month TOD to U.S.A. as the New Zealand Army Technical Adviser on the M113 APC Project. Ssgt Mitchell CW (Sinclair Burgess Class), and Sgt Burrell PJ (Shut-tleworth Class), arrived during the year as replacement vehicle mechanic instructors, Sgt Neil DC (a former staff member), is our new welding instructor, and Col Smart G is our new clerk. Finally, WOI Higgison from 1 Base Workshop Trentham took over as the new Accounting Officer, replacing WOI Cumberland. The new arrivals bring the number of ex-cadets on the staff to a total of twelve out of twenty.

Most of this year's apprentices are in the motor trades and under instruction from Ssgt Lynch GL (Young Class), a hard but very able taskmaster. At this stage of training (October) following a number of trial exams, several outstanding apprentices have emerged whom we confidently expect to top the New Zealand Trades Certification Board exams. Engineering classes are very small this year, and students are expected to show the benefits of more personalised coaching. Overall we expect a 100% pass rate for the first time in several years.

During the average time of two years that an apprentice spends at RNZEME School, the theoretical grounding received should be more than sufficient to ensure that every apprentice, providing he continues his studies in his own time, has little difficulty in passing his Advanced Trade Certificate in future years. In addition to this initial training the School runs a number of specialist courses in each trade for tradesmen. These courses enable tradesmen to refresh their memories on the theoretical side, as well as keeping them abreast of new developments in their trade. We look forward to seeing as

many ex-cadets as possible back at the School on such courses.

Finally, the staff of RNZEME School would like to take the opportunity of wishing all graduating Cadets every success in their chosen trades and careers, and best wishes for the festive season.

## SCHOOL OF ARTILLERY

During the past twelve months the main task of the school has once again been the training and testing of reinforcements for 161 Battery in Vietnam.

A large number of Officers and ORs have passed through the school during the year including several ex Cadets. Ex Cadets and Cadets currently attending courses are:

2-3 Star Battery Survey Course, Bdr Broomhall (Gentry), Bdr O'Connor (Parkinson), Lbdr Searle (Crump), Lbdr Soper (Crump), Gnr MacMillan (Ardagh), Gnr Whyte (Andrew VC).

The school is now equipped with two 14.5mm Field Artillery Trainers. This is a German weapon and will be used to train personnel in the Observation of Fire. It fires a round which produces a puff of smoke at ranges of up to one thousand meters. A miniature range for this equipment has been built in the Makiokio Valley area.

The school staff includes the following ex Cadets, WOII Rout (Shuttleworth), Sgt Dwane (Weir), Sgt Biggwither (Kippenberger), Gnr Gilroy (Andrew VC), and Gnr Hunter (Ardagh).

## INFORMATION ABOUT THE REGULAR FORCE CADET SCHOOL

The aim of the RF Cadet School is to produce soldier tradesmen and Junior Leaders of a high standard, thereby providing the Army with its main source of long-term Regular Warrant Officers and Senior NCOs and a limited number of its Regular Officers.

#### ENTRY TO THE SCHOOL

Cadets enter the School in January of each year. Here are one or two of the specific requirements:

- (a) **Medical:** By physically fit on an average standard comparable to your age.
- (b) Age Limit: Be 15 years but under 17 years 2 months of age on or after date of entry each year.
- (c) Nationality: Be a British subject, born or naturalised, or must have applied for naturalisation.
- (d) Produce parent's or guardian's consent to enter.

#### OUTFITTING

Uniforms, except for No. 1 Civilian Dress, are issued free initially and replaced as required during Cadet service. Most items of sports wear are provided free, as are all text books, exercise books and trade tools.

#### PAY AND ALLOWANCES

Cadets are paid fortnightly each receiving \$8.00 pocket money, the balance being paid into a Post Office Savings Bank or Thrift Club Account to encourage savings.

Pay rates for Cadets increase with age, the basic weekly rates being:—

#### ACCOMMODATION

Barracks and most other buildings at Waiouru are steam-heated and comfortable. Ample bedding is provided and each Cadet has the use of a wardrobe and lowboy. Good meals, designed to meet the needs of growing boys, are provided.

#### LEAVE

The annual leave entitlement for Cadets is 22 days, plus statutory holidays.

Three free return travel warrants per year are provided for each Cadet to travel to his home. The leave is taken at times that approximately correspond with normal school holidays. A ration allowance is given during leave.

#### MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICE

Free medical and dental services are provided within Waiouru Command.

#### AMENITIES AND SPORT

Facilities for almost all sports are good, and besides teams being entered in local competitions, a number of matches are played against other secondary schools. Fishing, ski-ing, tramping, deer stalking and mountaineering are popular pastimes.

In off-duty hours the Cadets have the use of a library and recreation room, and periodic dances are arranged for them.

#### **RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION**

One hour each week is set aside for religious instruction in the particular denomination of the Cadet, so helping towards the highest possible moral standards. In addition, the normal Sunday religious services are held.

## PERIOD OF TRAINING

This varies from one to three years depending on the age on enlistment. All Cadets do at least one year's training and thereafter graduate at the end of the term in which they turn  $17\frac{1}{2}$  years, i.e., May, August and December each evar.

It is the object of the School that Cadets complete their Basic All Arms Soldier Training within the first three months but this is not always possible due to the commencement of University Entrance, and School Certificate Classes and some apprenticeship training.

Those who are suitably qualified and keen to do so may take full-time education aiming for School Certificate and University Entrance Examinations. Some of those who are accepted for apprenticeships do school work integrated with the trade training, while some of the remainder take a general education course leading to Army Education Certificate Class II, and then commence their trade training.

Some non-apprenticed Cadets go straight on to full-time military training in the Training Wing of the School or at Corps Schools.

All Army trades are open to Cadets, but in the main they are trained as:

- a. Potential instructors in all Corps.
- b. Apprentices, in the automotive, radio, electrical, plumbing and building trades.
  - c. Administrative personnel.

#### PROMOTION

A Cadet who shows leadership qualities has the opportunity for promotion to various ranks up to Cadet Regimental Sergeant Major. The Ranks of Cadet Sergeant and above bring an increase in Pay. Any rank gained whilst a Cadet is relinquished on graduation.

## MONDAY CLOTHING CHANGES

## RUGBY TOUR TO AUSTRALIA

Largely thanks to the efforts of Lt Col Quinn, AA & QMG Waiouru Command, a Cadet Rugby team was able to visit Australia from October 6th to October 11th. Thus an enthusiastic group of Cadets left Waiouru on Sunday 5th October on the first leg of the journey to Melbourne.

After an 0530 hours breakfas: at Papakura the next morning, we were taken by bus to Whenuapai where we eventually boarded a RNZAF Hercules Aircraft for the trip across the Tasman. The first stage of the flight was a very short hop to Mangere where the aircraft took on extra fuel. This gave most members of the Cadet Party the chance to shop at the Duty Free Shop, most buying either transistor radios or watches.

The trip across the Tasman took about five hours and we eventually landed at Canberra about two o'clock Australian Eastern time which is two hours behind New Zealand. At Canberra we were met by Major Cooke, Royal New Zealand Army Service Corps, and Ssgt Ballance, Royal New Zealand Armoured Corps, the New Zealand Armoured Corps, the New Zealand Instructors at Duntroon, who took us on a conducted tour of Canberra and the Royal Military College Duntroon.

By five o'clock we were back at the Airport and had a quick snack before boarding a TAA Electra for the journey to Melbourne, where we were met by our Australian Army Liaison Officer, Lt Costello. From Melbourne Airport we were taken by bus to Watsonia, a large camp on the outskirts of Melbourne.

The next morning, Tuesday, was taken up with a sightseeing tour of Melbourne which included a visit to Flemington Race Course where the Melbourne Cup is run. In the late afternoon we journeyed out to the Army Apprentice School at Balcombe where we spent the night.

On Wednesday afternoon we were to play our first match against the Balcombe under 18 side. School participation would have been an inspiration to the Cadet Basketball players had there been ideal opportunities to prepare. But without those opportunities the challenge just to play became more intense and the inspiration and effort even greater.

Of course the Cadet teams had their disappointments through an inability to bring players together for any intensive period of training.

To progress can be a painful process and Cadet Basketball throughout the season did progress. It is a big circle:

'We accept any challenge because we want to learn'.

'We want to learn because we want to go ahead'.

'To go ahead we must be prepared to accept any challenge.'

And the players always had hope because the ball they played with was round. The whole tempo of the game did of course rise very rapidly through the season. Players did recognise this and the fact that the high stakes of today breed a much more competitive atmosphere than ever before.

As the season progressed the improvement in all players both individually and in team work was tremendous. This is a game which requires the utmost in skill and physical fitness. Basketball can be likened to a convoy during the war, which moved only as fast as the slowest shin. A player is governed by the standard of the grade he plays in. The policy of their coaches WOI CP Dyson and Ssgt McFarlane IC, in conducting the Cadet practice in conjunction with the Waiouru Command Representative practice was a very sound one indeed. This raised the sights of the individual Cadet players. What of the players?

A pleasing feature was the progress of several promising players. T. Jensen, S. Vinnicombe, P. Nevin.

Both Jensen and Nevin on the recommendation of the Waiouru Basketball Association were nominated and attended the final coaching session in May from which the NZ under 18 team was selected to tour Australia. Neither through lack of experience made the final team. However the progress that these two made after this was tremendous.

Jensen had the advantage of height (6 ft 4 in) and has shown some marked ability and progress. He just failed to make the under 18 NZ team but if given the same chance now at the end of the season would be hard to leave out. Nurtured along throughout the season and brought on in representative games only when the tempo of the game had settled down, he proved of immense value. The highlight was his being selected for Waiouru Command and the NZ Army teams. In tournaments the value of his increasing ability to score goals was important to the team. He was on ability alone selected as the most 'Improved Player' and the player to score 'Most Points' in the Waiouru Association. We should hear much of this promising lad in the years to come.

Jensen has been only the third Cadet, in the 21 years of the Cadets, to make the NZ Army Team while still a serving Cadet, the others being R. Sharrock (1958) and J. Talbot (1968). This does not mean that the standard of the Army Team is low — no, on the contrary the NZ Army Team is among the top bracket of 'A' Grade Provincial Teams.

Vinnicombe was another whose natural left handed ability was also a decided asset. A good team player who was surprisingly deceptive and a most able set shooter. Unfortunately this player was not available for District Team selection, but should progress and make his mark in the vears ahead.

What about the rest of the Cadets in the squad?

These players are the best investment for NZ Army Basketball. These were the hardy dedicated enthusiasts who week after week attended practice sessions and Club games.

To single out any one person wculd not be fair to all of the others who put in equally as much work and effort. Some of these players will certainly make district teams if not higher in the future.

The Cadets also assisted materially with the expansion of the game by assisting with a coaching clinic in Taihape to develop both Rep and College Basketball. The Games
