Commandant the Army Schools

This year the Regular Force Cadet School celebrates its Twenty-fifth Anniversary. The quarter century is a traditional landmark, but the real significance is that we have now reached the point where there is a representative slice of ex cadets throughout the army regardless of corps, rank or trade.

The era has seen change in political emphasis and as a consequence, army doctrine. In 1948 when the cadet school was established, World War Two was fresh in our minds. Since then, ex cadets have seen service with New Zealand units in Korea, Malaya, Thailand, Borneo, South Vietnam and Singapore. A more recent change has been government interest in a United Nations peacekeeping role. The important point is that in spite of changing emphasis, the army continues to play a vital national role and provide an interesting and manly life for any lad with the right spirit.

Modern technology tends to force early specialisation in our education system today. In conformity with society we have emphasised formal trade, academic and military education in Cadet School. To some extent this has been at the expense of character developing pursuits and education of a more general nature. Changes have therefore been planned this year in the overall philosophy of the school to bring a more balanced aproach to the curriculum.

One tends to become irritated from time to time with the attitudes and dress of some factions of our community today, particularly our youth. It is therefore a salutary experience for me to be associated with two hundred and fifty young men who have pride in their dress and bearing, who take advantage of an unparallelled opportunity for outdoor pursuits, who are generally well above national average in examinations and trade tests, who play sport in the right spirit, and generally do the things which make for a good healthy community. In becoming good soldiers they are also becoming good citizens.

To those cadets who graduate this year I offer my congratulations and best wishes for the future. I am confident they will uphold the high standard set by their predecessors of the last twenty-five years.

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE RF CADET SCHOOL

This year, (1973) the Regular Force Cadet School celebrated its 25th anniversary. It is approporiate, therefore, at this stage to look back over these momentous twenty-five years to see the main developments that have occurred and to list the very real accomplishments of the school in that time. Traditions are built only slowly, but the school already has a record of which it can be justly proud and is building up a set of traditions which will play their part in shaping the character of the New Zealand Army of temorrow.

The Regular Force Cadet Scheme began in 1948. As the new Regular Army was gradually evolved in the years immediately after World War II ils nucleus was the returned servicemen who had served who during that war. It soon became obvious, however, that it would be extremely difficult to secure the junior NCOs and younger skilled tradesmen to replace these men as they were either promped or retired and it was to make up this deficiency that the Regular Force Cadets were cstablished. The object was to train the potential instructors and crafismen who would provide the future senior NCOs and tradasmen of the Regular Force. Entry was to be limited to boys between the ages of 16 and 18 years and recruits were to spend either one year or up to their eighteenth birthday in the unit, whichever was the longer period. Although the emphasis was to be on producing a soldier, attention was to be given to improving the educational standard of the recruit and in the case of the tradesman a considerable proportion of his training was to be devoted to technical trade instruction. A high standard was to be demanded and, as we'l as a rigid medical examination, the recruit was required to pass a battery of intelligence and attainment tests before being accepted.

The introduction of boys into the army involved certain new problems and to meet these a new Wing of the Army School of Instruction — The Regular Force Cadet Wing - was established under Capt B Boyd, MBE, with Ssgt Kearney J as CSM. They were assisted by three full time educational instructors, Lt TW Bate, MA, Lt JT Gill, MA and Ssgt Hay DR, MA, who were responsible for the education of the cadets, and three regular force sergeants, Sgts Bright, Cairns and Shave, acting in a part time capacity as hut commanders. Training was under the overall supervision of Col G Clifton, DSO, MC, Commandnat of the Army School of Instruction and Maj CF McCullough.

MBE, Chief Instructor. Special huts in Trentham Camp were allocated to the wing and improved toilet and laundry facilities were installed. Other huts were fitted out as education classrooms and special classes were established in the various technical training wings of the Army School of Instruction to deal with cadets. Training was offered in the following trades (potential instructors in all corps New Zealand Army of the trained initially in the Small Arms Training Wing): Vehicle Mechanics, Electricians Vehicle and Plant, Panel Beaters, Armourers and Auto Electricians (trained by the RNZEME Wing). Carpenters and Bricklayers (trained by the RNZE Wing), Radio Mechanics, Operators Wireless and Line, Electricians Telecommunications and Mechanics (trained in the **BNZ** Sigs Wing), Butchers, Cooks Driver Mechanics and Ration Storemen (trained in the RNZ ASC Wing) and Medical Orderlies (trained in the Hygiene Wing and the Camp Hospital). Special hobby huts were established by the AEWS and the cadets had the use of a swimming bath, a gymnasium and all the facilities of the well equipped Trentham YMCA. A special mess was also set up solely for their use with an augmented ration scale to suit the needs of growing boys. The timetables and organisation of several post primary schools with boarding establishments attached were carefully studied and the system finally evolved aimed at creating a boarding school with a military and technical bias.

On 15 July 1948 the initial intake of cadets, 90 strong, marched into camp. In accordance with the policy of naming each entry after a prominent New Zealand soldier they were known as Miles Company, in memory of Brigadier R Miles, OBE, DSO, MC, who lost his life during World War II. The coy was organised as three platoons for administrative purposes. The initial period of basic military training was four weeks and after that the day was divided among education, trade military and sports training.

Because the year was so far advanced there were few cadets who wished to sit outside examinations and the chief work of the education instructors was providing a general education course for the three platoons in English, Mathematics, Social Studies and General Science. Three cadets, however, were enrolled with the Correspondence School for School Certificate and also received special coaching from the education instructors. In the School Certificate examination (1948) one of these three, Cadet Wishnowsky, provided the school with its first examination success. Supervised study was instituted for one hour three nights a week with each platoon in turn spending one night at the AEWS hobby huts. The hobby facilities provided included cabinet making, ants and crafts, model aeroplanes, electronics and radio, motor car maintenance and repair, speech training and amateur dramatics.

As the year progressed the rank of "Senior Cadet" was established and those cadets who had shown definite powers of leadership were promoted. They became section leaders in the platoons which were still under the supervision of the RF hut commanders. A "Cadet Forum" was also established—a weekly meeting between OC cadets and representatives of the cadets in which problems in the day to day administration of the unit were discussed and difficulties, if possible, ironed out.

At the beginning of 1949 a

new company, Mead Company, marched into Trentham. There were 97 recruits in this group and as Miles Company was still under training, the school roll was 187 — the highest total it has reached so far. Capt Boyd continued as OC, but during the year Lt Sanley-Harris marched in as Company Officer, to assist with the administration. Ssgt Kearney was CSM for the initial par of the year, but was later repliced by Sgt Cairns. The education staff was increased to cope with the increased numbers. Maj B Kendrick, MA was appointed Senior Education Officer to take over control of cadet education. Lt Hawkhead, BA, EEc was placed in charge of ma'hematics and science with WOI Blackett G. BSc as assistant instructor. During the year Ssgt Hay and WOI Blacket were both commissioned as lieutenants. Three extra hut commanders, Lepls Martin, Mulligan and Mac-Donnell, were also attached to the wing. During the year, also, Col JI Brook replaced Col Clifton as Commandant. The wing itself underwent a slight reorganisation, the education section separating from the rest and becoming known as AEWS Wing.

With the first full year of training stretching ahead the wing rapidly settled down to the system which has, until recently, been followed ever since. The initial period of basic military training was extended to six weeks. Following this, training time was divided as follows: first year, 50 per cent education, 50 per cent military training in the first term; 50 per cent education (with additional full time study later in the year for those sitting external examinations), 40 per cent trade and 10 per cent military training (including sports and PT) for the rest of the year; second year, concentration on trade except in exceptional circumstances where a cadet might be allowed to continue with education.

During the year the problem of out of working hours activities of the cadets was tackled vigorously by Lt Stanley-Harris, assisted by the education officers was appointed Activities Officer to co-ordinate weekend activities and encourage those cadets not taking part in sport to do something active during the weekend. For potential instructors, participation in team sports was compulsory but for tradesmen it was optional and cross coun ry tramps, softball, basketball and cricket matches and swimming were arranged for this latter group in good weather. With films, basketball and hobbies in bad weather.

Weekend camps were established to instruct cadets in the adm nistrative arrangements the erection, necessary for maintenance and striking of a small unit camp while at the same time providing recreation, exercise and a break from the routine of barrack l'fe. Attendance at least two camps was compulsory The first, such as might be carried out by a Territorial Force sub-unit, was held in an area accessible to transport and stores, rations and personnel were carried to the camp site. The second was in an inaccessible area and necessitated stores being man-handled into the location. These camps became very popular and "Operation Rita (Relaxation in the Akatarawas)" became a regular feature of cadet life. Lt Hawkhead was an enthusiastic tramper and many trips were held into the bush of both the Akatarawas and Rimutakas.

From the beginning, sport was a major feature of the life of the unit. In the sports periods coaching was given in swimming, life saving (to bronze medallion standard), basketball, softball, tennis and cricket in the summer and boxing, hockey, soccer and rugby in the winter. As well as participating, cadets were taught the duties of judges and referees. As an experiment the sports' period was, for a time, held immediately after lunch. because of the heat of the classrooms in summer, but on the advice of the Education Department inspectors, who visited the school annually, the present 1600-1700 hours period was resumed. Sports clubs were estab-

lished for the main team games and three rugby teams, a soccer team, a hockey team, a cricket team, an indoor basketball team and two softball teams were entered in the various Wellington and Hutt Valley competitions. Inter-service competitions were held in rugby and boxing, with the Navy Seamen Boys at a tournament held in Hamilton. The cadets won both sports.

The YMCA had become a real centre of codat life. It provided billiards, table tenn's, a canteen and a buffet and i's reading room and quiet room were also wall patronised Padres' hours were popular and in 1949 23 a dets were confirmed in the Church of England and 15 in the Presbyterian Church.

During 1949 a p'pe band was begun, under WOII McNeill of Tactical Wing.

On 26 February 1949 the first cadet swimming championship was held and Cadet Sgt Burtt PJ won the individual champione'hip. In March Cadet Sgt Murphy JWR won the athletic championship.

The first graduation parade was held on 23 August 1949

when 49 Miles Company cadets who had reached the age of 18 and were not remaining for further education, graduated into the Regular Force. The passing out parade was inspected by the Adjutant General, Brigadier WG Gentry, CBE, DSO, and was followed by a prize giving and addresses by the reviewing officer and the Commandant Army School of Instruction in the camp cinema, a gymnastics and PT display and a tour of inspection of the various training wings. In the evening a graduation ball was held in the YMCA. The prize for the best all round cadet was won by Cadet Sgt Pye LJ. In December a second gradua tion parade was held, with 62 cadets from both Miles and Mead Companies being posted to corps. The parade this time was inspected by Maj Gen KL Stewart, CB, CEE, DSO, Chief of the General Staff and followed the same form as the August ceremony.

In November and December the University Entrance, School Certificate and Trade Certification examinations were held. Three cadets passed UE: twelve School Certificate; two the second qualifying examination for motor mechanics; and two the first qualifying examination in the same trade.

At the Duntroon Selection Board in December, Cadet Lepl Sianley became the first RF cadet to be selected for the Royal Military College, Duntroon. He entered the college in January 1950 and graduated lieutenant in December 19⁻³. Two of the cadets who passed UE, Spring Rice BN and Grant GR, were selected by the army to atlend university courses in 1950 and Grant later became the first cadet to secure a university degree, graduating BA in History in 1955 and MA in 1956.

Sixty-three cadets from Miles and Mead Companies still remained when the new group of 85 cadets marched in 17 January 1950 to make the total roll for that year 148. It was decided, with three groups in the unit to reorganise as one company and designate each separate entry as a 'class'. The new group was thus known as Allen Class and the two earlier companies were renamed Miles and Mead Class respectively. The old black company shoulder flashes were replaced by the now familiar red "RF Cadet" flash and the black diamond ceased to be worn on the pugaree.

Staff changes included the departure of Capt Boyd, who was succeeded by Lt Stanley-Harris as OC and Maj Kendrick who was replaced by Capt Bate as SEO. One interesting feature of the new entry was that it included a Filian member of Fiji Military Forces who had been sent to New Zealand to take advantage of the instruction offered by Cadet Wing.

Sport again played a full part in the curriculum. The first XI captained by Cadet Sgt Taylor (until Dec 49) and Cadet Cpl McDowell (1950) and coached by Lt Gill, won the Hutt Valley Cricket Association fifth grade competition. The softball nine captained by Cadet Lcpl Campbell and coached by Capt Bate, won the Hutt Valley Softball Association Knock-out Cup — a

handicap competition for all grades. The new athletic champion was Cadet Clarke WA and the champion swimmer Cadet Turnbull BA. With the arrival of WOII Page from the British Army, gymnastics became very popular. Classes were held in the evenings and the cadet gym squad gave several public displays at functions in the Hutt Valley. Teams continued to participate in the other team games although not achieving the same success as those mentioned. Tramping and harriers again had their devotees and a four day camp for the whole unit was held at Waikanae in February. An attempt to found a golf club met with little success in spite of the generous donation of a large pool of clubs by Mr J Watt, the professional at the Heretaunga Club. The annual cadet rifle shooting competition was instituted and won in 1950 by Cadet Trainer VB.

At a second interservices' tournament held this year with the Air Force Boy Entrants, the cadets won tre rugby 9-6 and drew in the boxing, five bouts each.

Term dances were held in the YMCA and many cadets attended dances in Lower Hutt at a club organised by Mrs RB Asche as part of a welfare scheme for soldiers in the Wellington area.

As many cadets proved to have had little previous domestic training, practical instruction in darning, sewing, cleaning and ironing was organised under instructors provided by Lt Burn, NZWRAC.

The unit mounted two guards of honour during the year. On 23 June fifty cadets paraded outside army headquarters and were inspected by Field Marshall Sir William Slim, GCB, KCB. A guard of 96 was trained for the opening of parliament five days later, but owing to bad weather this had to be cancelled. Subsequently, however. the Governor General Sir Bernard Freyberg, VC, GCMG, inspected the guard at a special parade held in Trentham Camp on 13

July. Afterwards he addressed the cadets in the camp cinema.

Another memorable event of 1950 was the ret.rement of Maj GF McCullough. MBE, Chief Instructor of the Army School of Instruction. The "Screaming Skull" was well remembered by all the early intakes of cadets and he did much to give the unit the early high standards which it has always maintained. A special cabaret evening was given by the cadets to farewell him.

Following Maj McCullough's retirement the Army School of Instruction was reorganised. It was renamed The Army Schools and the various wings became separate autonomous Schools and Units. The RF Cadet Wing became the RF Cadet Unit and the AEWS Wing became the RF Cadet School. Also, with the introduction of compulsory military training the unit lost its Regular Force hut commanders, whose duties were taken over by cadet NCOs. Cadet sergeants, corporals and lance corporals had been created in 1949 to replace the earlier senior cadets.

At the December examinations two cadets passed University Entrance, five passed School Certificate and five passed the first qualifying examination for motor mechanics. The successful School Certificate candidates included the Fijian Boy, Cadet Tonganivalu, who in 1951 was sent to Sandhurst by the Fijian government and graduated as a lieutenant two years later.

The new class for 1951 — Greville Class — numbered only 41, bringing the total roll to 79. This was a reflection both of the shortage of youths in the age group required by cadets and the competition resulting from the commencement of a similar boys' training school by the Air Force.

Capt JM Morr's replaced Lt Stanley-Harris as OC and WOII Forsyth joined the unit in place of Sgt Cairns as CSM. During the year Capt Hawkhead resigned from the education staff and was replaced by Capt RE Greaves. Lt Hay was also posted out of the school and not replaced.

The reduced numbers resulted in much smaller education classes. Five cadets only made up the UE class with seventeen doing School Certificate and 24 in the general education group. Trade subjects, Engineering Shopwork, Woodwork, Technical Drawing and Electricity and Magnetism were introduced into the School Certificate course for the first time and with the extension of the Trade Certification examinations to include Carpentry and Joinery, Plumbing and Electrical Wiring, much more attention was devoted to these subjects also.

The usual sports were again played, but with less success than previously—another reflection of the decreased roll of the unit. With the departure of Capt Hawkhead also, the interest in tramping declined, although camping was still a popular weekend activity.

Two guards of honour were provided during the year, one for S.r John Kotalawala, the Prime Minister of Ceylon; the other for the opening of parliament in June. Graduations were reduced from three to two and with 35 crdets graduating in December only 24 remained for 1952.

Williams Class 1952 was another small entry and brought the roll to 73. The only staff change was a new CSM, Ssgt Millichip, in place of WOII Forsyth who was posted to RF Depot.

For the first half of the year the unit was in Trentham and activities closely resembled those of previous years. An outstanding event, however, which will live in the memory of participants, was the camp at Featherston and the march back over the Rimutakas to Trentham.

In August came an even more momentous event — the shift to Waiouru. During the vacation the unit ceased to occupy its old home at Trentham and transferred to Waiouru where training recommenced at the beginning of September. The move itself was accomplished with a minimum of disruption, but it had many effects on the unit as a whole. The new lecture

rooms, mess and barracks were a great improvement on Trentham, but the comparative isolation of the new location brought real problems for sports competitions, leave and recreation.

As the School of Military Engineering which had trained cadet apprentices in the building and construction trades did not shift to Waiouru, a new RNZE Apprentice Wing was added to the RF Cadet School. Ssgt Davis, who was in charge, was under the overall supervision of Maj Bate, Chief Instructor of the school.

In spite of the move, examination results were very satisfactory. Three cadets passed University Entrance and six School Certificate, Six were also successful in trade examinations, Cadet Baker DS topped New Zealand in the first qualifying examination for motor mechanics with another cadet, Cadet Sgt McCracken JH second.

One graduation only was held in December.

In 1953 the unit roll was the lowest on record, Sixteen cadets re'urned for a second year and with only 25 new entries in Symon Class the roll barely topped forty. The education staff was reduced to three with the transfer of Lt Blackett to army headquarters and during the year Ssgt Young replaced Ssgt Millichip as CSM.

The unit was rapidly settling into its new home and making the readjustments necessary. Training differed little from that provided in Trentham, but some modifications were required in leisure time activities. Sports teams were entered in the Ruapehu Rugby Union, Ruapehu Cricket Association and Taihape Indoor Basketball Association competitions and skiing, trout fishing and deer stalking began to feature in cadet activities. Softball. SO popular at Trentham, hockey and soccer, were discontinued through lack of competition and swimming, harriers and boxing lapsed through lack of interest. Weekend camping remained popular and several trips were made to Lake Taupo, particularly on long weekends.

Education classes were again small, with four in the University Entrance class, two in the school Certificate class and the remainder in general education. In the examinations at the end of the year three passed UE, but neither School Certificate candidate was successful. Six cadets passed Trade Certificate examinations.

At the annual Duntroon Se'ection Board two more cade's, Cadet Sgt Lynch LJ and Cadet Sgt McIver DS, were se'ccted to attend RMC. Meanwhile, as has already been mentioned, the first cadet graduate of Duntroon, Lt Stanley of Mead Company and the first cadet graduate of Sandhurst, Lt Tonganivalu, had won their commissions. They were, however, not the f.rst ex cadets to be commissioned as earlier in the year 2Lt Murphy of Mead Company had passed an OCTU in NZ and been commissioned in the Regular Force and 2Lts Mainwaring of Miles Company, Couzens of Mead Company and Patchett of Allen Class had all won commissions as members of K Force.

Graduation in December saw the passing out of 24 cadets, leaving 17 to continue in 1954. A slight improvement in recruiting resulted in Young Class numbering 34, thus making the total roll 51.

Capt Morris was transferred at the beginning of the year and the appointment of OC passed to Maj ER Firth, BEM, acting in a part time capacity as he was also OC RF Depot. A full time Company Officer was once again appointed and this position was filled by Lt Launder, a recent graduate from RMC Duntroon and holder of the Sword of Honour, Sigt Young continued as CSM.

1954 was another quiel year with relatively few cadets to be trained, but highly crediable results were achieved. Two cadets studying extra-murally passed English I from Victoria University College, one cadet out of three candidates passed University Entrance, seven out of eleven secured School Certificate and six out of six passed trade examinations. Fifteen cadets qualified for the newly created Army Education Certificate Class II and two, Cadet

Lcpls Fraser AR and Spender PH, were selected for RMC Duntroon.

In the sporting field the 1st XV captained by Cadet J. Sowter and coached by Capt Gill, won the junior grade of the Ruapehu Rugby Union and the 1st XI, also captained by Cadet Sowter and coached by Lt Launder, won the Ruapehu Cricket Association senior competition.

The drum and bugle band which had gone into recess was revived and plans were made for the formation of a brass band.

Changes in uniform made during the year included the replacing of the old khaki pugaree by the khaki and red and the introduction of the red lanyard. Both these innovations owed much to the interest of Lt Col WRK Morrison, DSA, Commandant Army Schools, at the t.me.

At the 1954 graduation parade 26 cadets marched out. The unit, however, had turned the corner and the first class achievements of 1954 were followed by greatly improved recruiting in 1955. A decision had been made during 1954 to lower the age of enlistment of cadets to 153 years and this, together with a more active recruiting campaign, resulted in the new class - Shuttleworth - numbering exactly 100. The total roll was thus 125 and, although it finally stabilised at 108, it was above the century mark and has never dropped below again since.

Lt Williams replaced Lt Launder 28 Company Officer and Ssgt Millich'p returned for a further term as CSM. In February Lt TID McLennan, BA, Dip Ed, joined the education staff and in August Lt NL Skilton, BA, was appointed as a much needed additional education instructor.

Examination results were again satisfactory, Two cadets, Cadet Lepls Ee'l K and Jones B were selected for RMC Duntroon; one presed University Entrance, nine School Certificate and fifteen various Trade Certification examinations. For the second time in three years a candidate from

the school, Cadet Sgt Russell JF topped New Zealand in the first qualifying examination for motor mechanics. Fifty cadets qualified for the Army Educatoin Certificate Class II.

The 1st XV again won the local .rugby competition, going through the season undefeated and the 2nd XV was successful in the third grade. A policy of cutside games with post primary schools was established and the 1st XV played a drawn game with the New Plymouth Boys' High School 1st XV. The team also visited Woodbourne and defeated the Air Force Boy Entrants 1st XV 9-6. With increased numbers, soccer and hockey were reintroduced, although both suffered from the lack of a regular competition and had to rely on friendly games to survive. The 1st XV also won its competition for the second year in succession. Cadet Sowter once again captained both the 1st XV and 1st XI. Cadet Cpl Foster P was the 1955 swimming champion and Cadet Lcpl Niall P won the athletic championship. Boxing recovered some of its popularity and Cadet Lepls Kearney NA and Reihapa P were selected for the army team and won their bouts at the The inter-service tournament.

sports peculiar to Waiouru, skiing, fishing and shocting, continued to be popular and parties were organised for some or all of these in most weekends.

Outstanding military events were the march through Wellington when the unit led by the cadet band accompanied the SAS Squadron on its farewell parade through the city before it embarked for Malaya - the presence of eight ex cadets in the squadron made the occasion even more memorable; and the guard of honour provided for General Sir Gerald Templar, GCMG, KBE, DSO, the Chief of the Imperial General Staff designate during his visit to Waiouru.

A long standing want in the un't was filled when a cadet recreation room was opened late in 1955. It was established first in temporary premises now part of the RNZE Apprentice Wing, pending the vacating of the building by present civilian workmen in Waiouru. Wives of staff members served in the buffet each night and the school owes a real debt to Mrs Firth, wife of the OC, who did the initial organising of this important service. The immediate popularity of the Rec Room was reflected in the consumption of buns which soon reached a re-

cord figure of almost 10,000 per month.

Recruiting figures showed a slight decline in 1956 and Sinclair Eurgess Class numbered 61. The total roll was 117. Yet another reorganisation saw the combining of the RF Cadet Unit and the RF Cadet School into one entity with the title RF Cadet School. Maj Firth became full time instead of part time OC and his HQ staff was in-creased to include a CQMS and a clerk as well as the Company Officer and the CSM. The old RF Cadet School was renamed Education Wing and its staff. along with the RNZE Apprentice Wing and staff, came under Cadet HQ for administration, although each still had a chief instructor at its head, WOII Allen became the new CSM with Cpl Slater as CQMS and Lcpl Webster as company clerk. Capt Greaves resigned from the Education Wing and two new in-structors, Lt AW Nelson, BSc and Lt LGL Barbour, MA, were appointed to the wing. In May Maj Bate was succeeded as Chief Instructor Education Wing by Maj Gill.

Sport once again featured fully in the programme. The 1st XV and the 2nd XV both won their respective rugby championships again and the 1st XV also won the ten-aside knock-out trophy. Regular yearly fixtures were begun with Taumarunui High School and St Stephen's School, Bombay, both games being lost by narrow margins. The 1st XV again visited New Plymouth and was defeated by the Boys' High School 1st XV, 3-0. Hockey benefited from the introduction of a local competition in Taihape, the 1st XI finishing runners-up in the senior grade. Another sport which received a boost as a result of the formation of a local competition was indoor basketball. Two teams were entered in this and the B team won the second division championship. The As in the first division found their opponents too old and experienced, but won as many games as they lost.

The scope of Education Wing was considerably expanded with the opening of the new physics laboratory. Previously instruction had suffered from the lack of a good laboratory. The interior work was done by cadet apprentices in the various building and conctruction trades and the finished product was a credit to their instructors. Equipment was imported from overseas and enabled the wing to give instruction in physics up to UE level.

At the same time the scope of the library was expanded by the introduction of a loan section from which cadets could borrow a selected set of fic'ion and non-fiction of a higher standard than was otherwise available to them. About five or six hundred books were made available by the Country Library Service and the Army Library Service and provision was made for periodic changes to keep the section up to date.

Another innovation was the introduction of the cadet blazer and tie for walking out. A navy blue double-breasted blazer with the cadet monogram and a specially designed the were approved and made available to members of the unit on purchase. Finally, 1956 saw the introduction of a school magazine for the first time. This publication, now called "The Regular Force Cadet", was designed to record the activities of the school and give each graduating cadet a souvenir of his period of service in the school.

Puttick Class 1957 numbered 85, a slight improvement on the previous year and the total roll was 138. Early in the year a number of staff changes occurred. Lt Meldrum replaced Lt Williams as Company Officer, Lt Raue, MA, replaced Capt Mc-Lennan in Education Wing and Capt Treanor, a technical teacher, joined the school as Chief RNZE Apprentice Instructor Wing. Later Lt Meldrum left for Malaya and Lt McShane took his place. WOII Luckham joined the unit with the dual appointment of CSM and Bandmaster. Cpl Redwood became CQMS and finally, in November, Maj Firth severed a long connection with cadets when he relinquished command to Maj Dyson.

Trade training and education were once again the main activities of the school. Two members of the UE class passed the final examination, nine were successful in School Certificate and 20 passed various trade examinations. Outstanding in the latter group was Colour Sgt Jameson M McR who carried on a cadet tradition by topping NZ in the first qualifying examination for motor mechanics. During the year also, 22 cadets qualified in various army courses which would assist them to qualify for stars.

In sport the 1st XV won its fourth successive championship but the 2nd XV was defeated in the third grade by i's old rivals Ruapehu College. The 1st XV had further successes in outside games, defeating Taumarunui High School 1st XV 12-9, Police Cadets 6-5 and at the first fully organisel Junior Inter-service Winter Tournament defeated both Air Force and Navy Boys to win the competition. It was defeated, however, in two other school games by Gisborne Boys' High 1st XV 5-3 and St Stephen's School 12-3. The soccer XI visited New Plymouth and drew with the Boys' High School 0-0 and the hockey XI lost to Taumarunui 6-5. Basketball, skiing, deer stalking were other winter sports cricket, softball, tennis, and camping and fishing occupied most weekends in the summer. Cadet Laing won the swimming championship held at Taihape and Cadet Burell PJ was the athletic champion. Cadet Peden became the first holder of the Thomas Trophy for the best all round cadet athlete.

The drum and bugle band was augmented in 1957 by the silver band. The long awaited instruments arrived and with the appointment of a bandmaster, practices were held each evening. Finally the great day came when a full cadet brass band was able to play on army schools parade.

Another innovation was the founding of a Debating Club. Thanks to the enthusiasm of Lt Raue debates were held in Education Wing once a month after studies and the club soon had a keen following.

On 29 May the new recreation room finally opened. This occupies one side of the cadet mess

block and contains a games room and lounge and buffet, toilet facilities, a billiard room and a quiet room in which are housed the main cadet trophies and honours boards. All renovations were done by the cadet apprentices and the result is one of the best equipped buildings in Waiouru Camp - as reflected by the fact that it was chosen as the location for the luncheon given to Mr Duncan Sandys, the British Minister for War, when he visited Waiouru. The rec room rapidly became a centre of cadet life. Morning and afternoon teas were served there daily and a series of highly successful socials were organised in the building. A particularly successful evening was held in November to farewell Maj and Mrs Firth on their departure for Tauranga.

Two other events will live in the memory of 1957 cadets - the guard of honour at Paraparaumu and "Operation Warmup" The former was the guard mounted on the occasion of the departure from New Zealand of the Governor General Lord Norrie. A three day visit to Wellington culminated in the parade at the airfield on 24 July as Lord Norrie departed for Britain. Less pleasant are the memories of "Operation Warmup", the special invention of Lt Meldrum. Each platoon was taken by truck to a predetermined point and then, under the platoon sergeant, sent on a cross country compass march designed to bring it back to camp. As a refined form of torture the natural hazards of the trip were added to by the atrocious weather that developed as the exercise continued.

Finally 1957 will go down as the "year of the fires" in Waiouru Camp. In April a large fire swept through the army schools' instruction block and destroyed the RNZASC School and the School of Army Administration. Cadets in general were not directly concerned and although training of drivers and clerks was disrupted, temporary quarters enabled courses to be resumed with a minimum of delay. Early in November an-

other fire destroyed the MT Workshops RNZEME School, the temporary School of Army Administration and one room of RF Cadet School. All the school buildings were threatened and had to be evacuated. Considerable damage was done by wind and rain to furniture, books and notes and as this was less than a week before the final examinations the results were serious. Strenuous efforts by staff and pupils had the school running again within two days, but the damage was reflected in a shortage of classrooms, loss of notes and books and somewhat disappointing examination results.

Graduation was once again held in December and 61 cadets were posted to corps.

The new entry, Weir Class, like its predecessor, numbered 85 and the total roll for 1958 was 139. Lt I Burrows, MC, was posted to the unit as Company Officer in place of Lt McShane, but was seconded for duty as Adjutant the Army Schools before taking up his appointment. Instead, first Capt Vail and later 2Lt Hawkins acted as Company Officer. The appointments of Bandmaster and CSM were separated. WOII Luckham retained the former and Ssgt Mc-Donnell assumed the latter.

Sport once again was emphasised though results suffered from a reorganisation of the timetable of Army Schools which made it almost impossible to assemble complete teams for training. The cricket XI was entered in the Taihape competition as the Ruapehu association had gone into recess and finished in the middle of the senior competition — a very creditable beginning. The 1st XV won the local junior rugby championship and repeated its victory in the interservices junior tournament. In its outside games it defeated Taumarunui 1st XV but lost to Hamilton Boys' High School 1st XV. St Stephen's School and the Police Cadets. In spite of these losses it was an outstanding team, probably the best ever to represent the school as its record of 494 points for and 74 against indicates. Basketball, soccer and hockey teams also competed

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A highlight of the year was the guard of honour for the opening of parliament in June. The unit shifted to Wellington for the period before the guard, which was inspected by the new Governor General, Lord Cobham and returned to Waiouru the following day.

As this was the tenth anniversary of the founding of the school a reunion of ex cadets was held in Waiouru early in August. Over sixty cadets attended and a tour of inspection of the school was followed by a social evening. Sporting competitions had been arranged in most sports, but with the exception of basketball, the ex cadets were unable to raise teams and these had to be cancelled.

It is fitting at this stage to summarise the achievement of the school in its first ten years of existence. Some 650 cadets had passed through the school and the bulk of these had graduated into the Regular Force. Eighteen had won commissions, four more were at RMC Duntroon and one at the Officer Cadet School Portsea.

Of the younger generations, one was waiting to attend Duntroon the next year, one would enter Sandhurst and two would attend Portsea. Three others who were in Malava had passed a ROSB for Portsea provided they performed suitably during their year overseas. This averages out at almost three for each year of the school's existence. Of this group, one had won the Sword of Honour for Duntroon and two for Portsea. The sword is presented to the best all round cadet of the year at the particular college. A large number from the early classes now held the rank of Staff Sergeant and a few soon became eligible on service for promotion to warrant rank. The number to pass the final trade certification examinations from the early classes was disappointingly small but steps had been taken to make these examinations compulsory and the percentage finally becoming fully qualified tradesmen increased considerably. Finally, one ex cadet had

graduated with a Master of Arts degree.

In the field of sport ex cadets had an equally important influence on the army. They had qualified for blazer pockets in every sport possible and though so far no New Zealand representatives had emerged, ex cadet Luscombe, who played in the final rugby trials prior to the selection of the 1953-54 All Blacks, deserves special mention.

1959: Kippenberger Class (Size 79)

In April, the OC, Maj WH Dyson, RNZ Sigs, was replaced by Maj SR McKeon, NZ Regt.

For the first time there were two senior cadets in the same year. Both Cdt Ssgt Davies SAP and Cdt Ssgt Monks GL occupied the position of Cdt CSM.

Although a smaller class size for the year resulted in reduced class sizes at the Education Wing, there was a higher proportion of second year cadets. Only two cadets, however, had to be placed on correspondence and there was a class of 30 apprentices who studied Physics, English, Trade Calcs, Technical Drawing and History of the NZ Army at the wing. These classes were held in the morning, afternoons being devoted to trade training. The Gen Ed class of 28 followed a broad course for the first two terms, then left the wing to pursue a course of trade training in the final term.

Two cadets passed English I extra-murally from Victoria University, 5 obtained UE and 9 passed SC. Twenty-six passed Trade Qualifying exams.

This year saw the severance of the last physical link between Cdt Schoel in 1958 and its early years, with the departure of Maj JT Gill, MA; to take up a position as DADAE at CMD. Lt CT Grimsdele replaced Capt Nelson in January end Capt Barbour became 2IC. In February Lt PC Comrie took the place of Lt NL Sk'lton who had been posted to Education Officer, Papakura Camp. Lt PR Raue became Librarian.

Acquisition of new machinery made it necessary to obtain more accommodation. Thus, this year, the theoretical and administrative sections were rehoused in an adjacent building. Latest Tubular furniture was obtained for the wing.

The staff, headed by Capt RA Treanor, now RNZE, was joined by WOII Nolan, a man well versed in the history of the RNZE.

A record number of apprentices, 24, were under training. In 1958 exams 99% of First Qual apprentices passed and one recen'ly graduated cadet, Spr Millig n of ND Construction Squadron, topped the country in the examination

Cadets were in training at the School of Signals (9), the RNZ ASC School which had only five cadets for part of the year and the RNZEME School, now rehoused and catering for 50 cadets in a variety of trades.

In January a Drill and PT display was mounted for visiting US Army officers.

February saw 37 cadets assisting area staffs throughout NZ with schools' barracks weeks.

Basic Trg ended on 13 March and on the 22 senior cadets left for Trentham in preparation for a Guard of Honour for the SEATO meeting held in Wellington.

June was another month of guards, with one on 15 at Taihape for the Governor-General and another on 24 for the opening of Parliament.

Early August saw cadets swinging into a 15 mile map reading stroll — Exercise "Paradise Return".

Although the First XV lost to Navy at the Junior Interservices', wins were recorded against Onslow College, Taumarunui High School, Tauranga School, LDS College Hamilton and St Stephen's.

In athletics Cdt Sgt Booth JA was the field and track champion, with Cdts Holland RJ and Luscombe GI equal runners-up.

Cdt Orr RG won the individual championship at the swimming sports which were held on 28 February at the Ohakune pool.

I) was a poor season for cricket, in which, however, Cdt Douglas proved the most outstanding player.

Indoor basketball had a strong following, with cadet school fielding two teams.

A good season enabled Cdt Cpl Robb and others to show their prowess at skiing.

Lack of competition led to problems with soccer. Cdt Mowat showed ability in those games the team did get.

With the posting of the Bandmaster WOII Luckham, the band was organised, for the first time, by the cadets themselves, with Cdt Lepl Frazer as Drum Major.

Jungle Greens made their first appearance at the 1958 Graduation Parade, where the reviewing officer foresaw an independent RF Cadet Unit.

Sgt Jameson NC (Allen Class) awarded the MM for bravery against the communists in Perak. Sgt Dawes (Greville Class) was selected to play for the All Malayan rugby team that toured Thailand in November 1958.

Sgl Harris (Miles Class) posted back to RF Cadet Mess in Waiouru as head cook, UO AR Fraser (Young Class) was sixth of a Graduation Class of 48 at RMC Duntroon. Present Adm Officers of RF Cadet School, Lt Burtt (Mead Class) and 2Lt West (Allen Class). Fut Lt ADM Winkleman (Mead Class) mid in Malaya.

1960: Russell Class (Size 85)

Lt Burtt appointed company officer in HQ RF Cadet School (January). In February Sgt Mc-Donald joined staff as first of RF Plt Sgts. Capt Mataira joined HQ staff as 2IC Cadet School in March. In August Maj LJ Sanders, NZ Regt, replaced Maj McKeon as OC and the following month the school CSM, WOII MacDonnell, was replaced by WOII Walsh. The same month. Lt McIver took the place of Lt Eur't as company officer. In October, Sgt Lee took up his appointment as bandmaster of the cadet band.

Once again the school had to appoint two senior cadets in the same year. They were Cdt Ssgt Frazer PG and Cdt Ssgt Nix WJ.

Small classes at Ed Wing this year with 21 sitting SC and only two sitting UE. Apprentices again attended in the mornings and there was a Gen Ed class of 28 for the first two terms.

One candidate passed UE, five SC and 42 passed various trade exams. The library was completely reorganised and catalogued.

Maj JT Gill was replaced by Maj EG Jackways CI and Lt Raue was posted as EO Waiouru Camp, his place being taken by Lt MR Graveston, whose death later the same year came as a shock to all. A civilian, Mrs Butler, took over several classes and remained until the end of the year. Staff farewelled the typist, Mrs Hazeldine, who had been at the wing for four years.

Activities of the year included the construction of a solid reinforced concrete storage building for radio-active stores, weatherboard double garages. Work has started on a sawdust extraction unit.

An ex cadet, Lepl Casey, arrived in April to replace Cpl Duncan who was posted to ND Construction Squadron.

Four cadets trained at the School of Arty, Cdt Cuttance receiving instruction in radar techniques. For most of the year at RNZASC School only three cadets were under training. Cdt Rutledge CJ took the honours among those who attended courses at the School of Inf. One cadet trained as an ammunition exeminer at the RNZAOC School. There were 11 cadets at the various wings of the School of Sigs this year. Six cadets trained at the Armoured Depot and 37 attended courses at the RNZEME School, which has not had, in 12 years, one failure in a qualifying exam.

The new intake marched-in on 13 January and began their basic training at RF Depot.

Again, in February, cadets helped at schools' barrack week and later the same month provided a guard of honour for the Australian CGS. Basic training ended on 9 March.

The 20-strong cadet band played during the visit, of the Sultan of Pahang, in November.

At the 1959 Graduation Parade cadets were SD and were addressed by the CGS Maj Gen Sir Stephen Weir.

Soccer had a good year and the team won the Association Shield. The hockey XI defeated allcomers under their captain, Cdt Hall GJ. Under captain Cdt Rose BG the cricket XI enjoyed a full season. This year the school fielded four indoor basketball teams. Cdts Rutledge CJ and Tuhuru ITB were the stars of the softball team. Cdt Orr RG won the swimming sports and Cdt Nathan the athletics. The Junior Inter-services' was held in Waiouru; Navy won.

For the first time four RF Plt Sgts were appointed. A weight lifting club was started for 14 cadets under Lt Norton.

Six ex cadets now WOIIs. Cpls McAndrew and Niall were in the 2 Bn team which won the Farelf Cup.

1961: Stewart Class (Size 82)

Posted out early in the year were Sgt Sinclair and Ssgt Dorset. Posted in were Sgts Joe and Stevenson The policy of a cadet now graduating on his 18th

birthday led to appointment of three Cdt CSMs for the year; they were Cdt Ssgts McLeod D, Sullivan PS and Moller JA.

Shortage of staff led to the nine members of the UE classes having to attend Ruapehu College daily, by school bus. Lt Grimsdale also travelled to the college to assist with some of their classes.

Because the period of Basic Training was shortened, the school year was able to begin, academically, in February, instead of in March. There was a SC class of 17 and only one cadet was on correspondence work. The apprentice class continued, with the carpenters spending more time than previously in the third term preparing for trade theory exams. This year saw an industrious Gen Ed class.

In the 1960 exams, six passed SC and 29 passed various trade exams. The library continued to be popular.

Projects for the year included the construction of the Omori Hut, the completion of the fishing lodge at Birch Pool and alterations to Cadet School HQ.

Twelve cadets attended courses at the School of Inf, which introduced a Cadet Continuation Training course which the Gen Ed class attended in the third term, before commencing trade training. Cadets attended Tape Relay and Typing and P & T courses in Auckland, from the School of Sigs. Two cadets attended RNZASC School, while a large number found themselves at the RNZEME School

The new class marched-in on 12 January and commenced Basic Training at RF Depot on 16 January. A bushcraft weekend was held in February, under Lt Grimsdale. In April, cadets in the guise of red-coats, participated in the Military Tattoo in Wellington. A guard of honour was held in May, in Wellington for Gen Powell, US Army. In November cadets at-tended the Military Tattoo held in Ohakune. The 1960 Graduation Parade had been reviewed by Maj Gen Thornton and was followed as usual by a lavish ball.

A hard-fought but largely unsuccessful season for the 1st XV whose season included games against the Police School, Trentham and St Stephen's. A cadet team, led by Cdt Archer, was third home in the Camp Cross Country run. Twenty cadets went on three skiing trips. Champion swimmer was Cdt Orr RG and champion athlete Cdt Ward PC.

Water polo became a recognised sport.

Five more ex cadets graduated from Portsea. Total of commissioned ex calets now 46. Cadet school staff contained three ex cadets: Sgt Foster P (Young), Cpl Casey JR (Shuttleworth) and Sgt Crafts BL (Young). 2Lt M Jameson on course at Fort Knox, USA. Ex cadets sat for the first time the Advanced Trade Cert in Carpentry and Joinery. Six ex cadets were in the army basketball team of eight.

1962: Gentry Class (Size 108)

January — WOII McCulloch and Sgt McRae joined staff. In February Bdr Hobson AGA replaced Sgt McDonald and in early March Lt AR Fraser took the place of Capt ATA Mataira. Sgt Joe left for SMD in April and WOII Nolan went to NMD in June. In July WOII Shedden replaced WOII Walsh as CSM and in August Sgt Crafts was posted to 2 Bn Burnham.

The Cdt CSMs of the year were: Cdt Ssgts Futer DR and Hendrick JH.

Once again the UE class had to travel to Ruspehu College, otherwise the school year ran to previous patterns.

Lt Comrie, the magazine editor, was posted to army HQ and his place was taken by Lt A Ross from Whangarei. Ssgt McRae arrived from HQ CMD. Capt Barbour taught under d.fticulty with his back in plaster.

Four cadets passed UE by accrediting in the 1961 exams and six passed SC.

Syllabus now includes the teaching of elementary prestressed concrete technique and the electronic measuring of the moisture content of timbers.

Minor constructional work carried out included alterations to the old Armoured Depot to accommodate HQs of NSTU and Army Schools. The main lecture room in the wing itself was turned into a tutorium. WOII Nolan was replaced by WOII Parker from SME Linton. Ssgt Stevenson was Senior Trade Instructor.

Thirty cadets attended an advanced weapon training course at the RF Depot in September and in a field exercise which involved building a log cabin in an inaccessible area, pack horses were used as transport. Some 36 cadets attended course at the School of Adm, showing increased interest when the subject of Coy Orderly Rooms was discussed in 'Mil Law. Three cadets received training at the School of Arty and cadets at the School of Sigs went on a tour of 2YA and WNTV1. A Continuation Course was again run at the School of Inf for Gen Ed cadets in the third term and in a four day exercise in the Kaimanawas, sen or cadets were used, successfully, as section commanders. The RF Apprentice Chef scheme was introduced at the RNZASC School and 12 cadets passed the relevant trade exams during the year.

Junior cadets marched-in on 10 January and did Basic Training from 15 January. In March a guard of honour was mounted for Sir Nigel Poett, C in C FARELF. The first cadet dance was held in June. August saw a further guard of honour, this time for HM the King and Queen of Thailand, at Rongotai Airport. In November the school visited Field Force Display at Linton and later that month took part in "Riot" exercise for 2 Bn troops at Waiouru. The 1961 Graduation Parade had been reviewed on a sunny 8 December by Maj Gen Sir Keith Stewart

The 1st XV captured the Rosie Shield from the Police School, Trentham but were beaten by Navy in the Junior Interservices. Cdt Smith BM won the cross country. Champion athlete was Cdt Ngapo B. The softball team had wins against Taumarunui High and Wanganui Tcehnical College. Champion swimmer was Cdt McLachlan AF. Sixteen cadets played water polo. Champion of the annual shoot was Cdt MacKay. The 1962 sesson involved 40 cadet skiers.

The formation of the cadet dance band proved most popular

and dances were held fortnightly.

Again several ex cadets were on the school staff: Lt A Fraser (Young) as company officer, WOII Shedden (Miles) the first ex cadet to hold this appointment and Sgts McAndrew (Shuttleworth), Foster (Young) and Casey (Shuttleworth).

WOI D Campbell (Mead) was among the first three cadets to attain this rank. SUO B Bestic graduated from Duntroon holding the senior appointment of BSM.

1963: Bennett Class (Size 120)

Additions to the staff included Lt EB Bestic as Trg Officer and Ssgt Polaschek AJ as Clerk. Sgt Batson IR became Plt Sgt 1 Plt. Lt BPC Cudby replaced Lt Fraser as company officer. The latter had been at the school since February 1962 and was presented with a large ashtray.

The two Cdt CSMs of the year were Cdt Ssgts Ngapo BLC and Herewini K.

The 1962 exam results for SC were the best ever, with 17 passing out of 23. Cadets were congratulated on this individually by the Minister of Defence, the Hon Dean Eyre, who was visiting the wing when the

Brig Gould, the Chief EO FARELF paid a welcome visit in April. There was no movement of staff during the year. Staff were pleased to learn in October that the Royal Warrant had been bestowed on the Corps.

This year saw the departure of the CI, Capt Treanor, after a seven year sojourn with the school. WOII Parker and Sgt Foster also moved on. Ssgt Edwards replaced Ssgt Stevenson who returned to SD Constr Sqn.

Major works of the year included additions to the Omori Hut and the provision of a set of six bay garages for the use of living-in personnel in camp.

The advent of plumbing and electrical apprentices increased the staff by two: Cpls Nicholls and Rolle.

Among the ex cadets instructing at the School of Sigs was Ssgt Bygate (Williams). The School of Inf ran 2 Continuation Courses for cadets during the year and Cadets McLachlan. McLachlan. Matahaere and Matehe assisted with the running of courses. At RNZASC School apprentice chefs had an 80% pass in the London City and Guilds exams, with 10 gaining distinctions. This year at the RNZEME School some of the 43 cadets were enrolled in the trade of blacksmith.

The new class marched-in on 14 January, shortly before the visit of HE the Governor-General. In June a guard of honour was mounted for the C in C Far East, Admiral Sir Varyl Pegg; it was commanded by Capt B Hardie, RNZA. The Block II Mess and Rec Room were renovated after the fire of two years previously and a formal dinner and concert were held there in August. The class patron, Lt Col CM Bennett, visited the school in Novmeber. Cadets graduated on 11 December.

At the Junior Inter-services' the 1st XV drew with Navy but lost to Air Force. Twenty-seven cadets played soccer. In basketball the Cadet 1 team represented Waiouru in the Manawatu Regional Colts Tournament. Cadet Anderson JH won the cross country and Cdt Sgt Mc-Iver the swimming sports. The cricket XI defeated Trentham Police Cadets. Champion shot was Cdt McCaulay, who was also champion a hlete. In tennis Cadet Garratt defeated the runner-up to the South Auckland championship.

Cadet pocket money went from $\pounds 2$ to $\pounds 3$ fortnightly. Films were often shown in the rec room. A camera club commenced operations under Ssgt McRae, meeting in Room 3 Ed Wing.

Ex cadets on the school staff were: Lt Cudby (Shuttleworth), Coy Off cer; Lt Bestic (Weir), Training Officer; and Sgt Casey (Shuttleworth), Instr App Wing. OCs at Portsea included J. Brown (Puttick) as CSM, MA Harvey (Weir) as Col Sgt and A. Howell as Lcol.

1964: Parkinson Class (Size 144)

In M³y Maj Sanders RNZIR returned to NMD after four years as OC. Maj Jackways RNZAEC, the CI, took his place. A change in school org to form two coys led to the posting-in of 2Lt Gore RNZA as OC A Coy and the appointment of Capt and QM Petherick RNZE as CC B Coy.

Similarly, it was a year of increased numbers at Cadet CSM rank and for the first time a Cadet RSM was appointed. The Cadet RSMs (wearing rank as for CSM) were: Herewini K and Paton RN. CSMs of the coys were: Cadet Ssgts Fairhurst J and Seymour RJ, of A Coy and Heaton RR, of B Coy.

The Wing opened with a roll of 100 on 20 February. Capt Skilton had arrived back from Malaya for his second tour and newcomers included Lt IK Hampton from Cashmere High School and Ssgt Cherrington from AEWS Papakura. Lt Grimsdale left in January. Capt Skilton replaced Maj Jackways as CI in May, but left almost immediately to do the Grade II. Capt Barbour left after a stay of almost nine years.

One cadet gained UE in 1963 and 14 out of 24 passed SC. The SC class this year numbered 32 and there were 8 attempting UE. In January the Wing took over the end of the building which used to house School HQ; this eased problems of space.

Capt Petherick replaced Capt Treanor as CI and WOII Offord from RF Depot replaced WOII Parker.

One task undertaken during the year was the re-modelling of the main entrance to the Army Schools building.

A block course was introduced for the senior class carpenters and joiners.

At the School of Inf Cdt CSM Seymour acted in a semiinstructor capacity on the NSTU Mortar Course, Fifly-six cadets qualified on Continuation courses run. At the RNZASC School 12 apprentice chefs out of 12 passed the practical of the CFA exams in 1963.

The junior class arrived on 14 January and Graduation Day was 9 December. Speaker at the 1963 Graduation Dinner was Lt Col AH Sutton, DAEWS. A guard of honour under Capt PJ Burtt (Mead Coy) was held in April for Lt Gen Sir John Wilton, the Australian CGS. Cadet School HQ moved to the former School of Arty HQ, A Coy took over Galatas and Maleme Barracks and B Coy took over Olympus and Platamon Barracks: the Q Store was housed next to the fire station.

Girls, suitably chaperoned, were invited to dances in the Rec Room.

A result of the split into two coys was that inter-coy competition largely replaced the earlier inter-plt rivalry. In September teams from both coys competed in the Waiouru Camp 30 mile marching competition and perperformed creditably.

The 1st XV beat Seddon Memorial Tech Coll but again lost to Navy in the Junior Interservices'. There were six rugby teams this year. Four hockey players were selected for the rep colt team. The soccer XI had a decisive win against Whakatane High School. Four cadet basketball teams competed this year, which saw the introduction of a new sport—volleyball, played by 20 cadets. Thirty cadets played tennis and the school best Whakatane by six matches to one. Cadet Anderson JH again won the cross country. Skiing continued under Capt Barbour and Cpl Pearson. Champion athlete was Cadet RSM Herewini, who was narrowly cheated of the swimming honours by Cadet Anderson CD.

Apart from the major innovtion of the arrival of a second coy, other things were new; such as the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme in which 15 cade's participated in activities such as fire service training and judo. A school boat club was set up and a 10' dinghy constructed, which was later christened in the waters of the Waimarino.

1965: Barrowclough Class (Size 131)

Maj Jackways was replaced as OC by Maj GP Brown, RNZIR. Other staff posted-out included Lt Dearing, Sgt Casey and Bdr Lichfield. Arrivals numbered among them Lt Tuck, the new Training Officer, Col O'Erien from 1 Bn Depot and Sgt Milne from Burnham. Ex cadels on the staff were: WOII Nash, Sgt Casey, Cpl Rolle, Lcpls Lester, Lindsay and Simons, Ssgt Lloyd and Sgt Newth.

Ehe Cdt RSMs (now wearing WOI rank) were: Seymour RJ and Cutler AB. The Cadet CSMs (now wearing WOII rank) werc: Hebden BJ, Bolton JS, Henderson PJ, Dance OR and Hammond D.

The Wing welcomed its new charges on 18 February. The Appr and Gen Ed classes were of normal size but the UE class of 10 and the SC class of 40 were bigger than usual. Cadet Laing took Sig 1 Maths and English.

Staff shortages caused problems, even with Cabt Hampton, WOII McRae and Ssgt Cherrington welcoming the arrival of Sgt Roy DW. Capt Owen from AEWS took UE Eng until the arrival of Lt Wrighton in Apr.I from King's High School. The wing had several visits from the DAEWS, Lt Col Sutton and later his replacement, Lt Col Gill. The Governor-General HE Sir Bernard Fergusson signed the new wing yisitors books in June. In the 1964 exams three passed UE and 14 SC.

WOII Offord was replaced by Ssgt Edwards, who was in turn replaced by Sgt Lloyd. Cpls Rolle and Nicholls were replaced by Lcpls Sinkinson and Lindsay.

Generosity by outside firms enabled the screening of trade instructional films.

A pass rate of 95% was achieved in the trade exams of 1964.

Three cadets were under training at the School of Arty 2Lt DW Smith was among the ex cadets on the staff of the School of Sigs. Ten cadets qualified on courses at the School of Inf. For he first time cadets training as auto parts storemen were attached to the RNZEME School - five in number. At the RNZASC School MT Wing, 11 cadets attended courses and 10 out of 14 first year apprentice chefs passed their Basic Certificate.

The new class marched-in on 12 January and on 23 February the school paraded to farewell Maj Gen Thornton. 'n May a guard of honour was provided for the Governor-General at Taihape, followed the next month by a quarter-guard mounted in Waiouru for Vice-Admiral Sir Peter Phípps. A Grad Parade was held in August. In April a naturalisation ceremony was held in which Cadet Kaldelis became a NZ citizen.

The 1st XV drew with Navy in the Junior Inter-services' to become joint holders of the Secretaries' Trophy. In basketball the staff team again beat the cadets. Staff and cadets drew, however, in the soccer match. Once again the cricket XI defeated Whakatane. The softball team was successful, too, in its game against St Stephen's. Champion swimmer was Cadet Hurndell and champion athlete Cadet Hawkins.

WRAC NCOs filled the appointment of B Coy Clerk during the year.

Lt DB Slocombe, NZSAS (Puttick) attended a para instructors' course in Australia. It was with regret that the school records the death of the second ex cadet to be KOAS — Sgt Don A (Shuttleworth) — in action against the Viet Cong.

1966: Andrew VC Class (Size 124)

Among the many postings-in were: Capt CFW Leach, WOI LR Reeves, WIOII Kennedy K—

all from 1 RNZIR FARELF. Sgt Fraser IS arrived from the Rhodesian Army and Sgt Hornbrook LD from NSTU Waiouru. Included in the equally numerous postings-out were WOI Hill (Tiny) who had been at the school since October 1963 and WOII Edwards A, B Coy's CSM.

Cadet RSMs of the year were Hammond D, Dance OR and Bensemann DI, Cadet CSMs were Hawkins AP, Nicol BA, Westwater WK, McDonald JK and Strahan.

Again Ed Wing got off to an early start on 7 February, with a UB class of three, a UE class of five and a SC class of 32. The apprentice class of 19 and the Gen Ed class of 14 arrived on 21 March.

Additions to the staff included Capt DM Campbell and Capt Leach. Lt Roy was commissioned and Capt Wrighton promo'ed. Departures included Ssgt Cherrington, Capt Hampton and Maj Skilton, the CI since April 1964.

In the second term Capt Leach and Lt Roy took the Gen Ed class to Wellington.

Exam results from 1965 were: SC 15 passes out of 29, UE six passes out of seven.

Trade training tasks undertaken included the electrical rewiring of the barracks and alterations to A Coy HQ.

The only staff change was the replacement of Cpl Sinkinson by Lcpl Little.

Cadets at the School of Arty were involved in the first Long Locating Course ever run. Fiftyone cadets were at the RNZEME School of whom 36 were concerned with VM or fitting and turning trades. At the School of Sigs, Cadet Duffy MMJ became among the first to be involved with the operational use of the new Iriquois helicopter. The RF Depot Instructors' Course which did field training in Fiji, included 10 cadets. Almost onethird of the depot staff were ex cadets. Six cadets lid various courses at the School of Armour and three cadets attended the School of Infantry.

For the first time continuation soldier training was conducted entirely by the school. This involved 26 cadets, many of whom moved on to training at School of Armour etc at the completion of continuation training.

In April cadets lined the route from Raetihi to Taupo for the visit of HM the Queen Mother. Vargas, Secretary-Lt Gen General of SEATO visited Apprentice Wing. In September came the tragic news of the deaths of four cadets in a road accident near Ohakune. A 100 man guard was mounted in October at Wellington for the President of the USA, President LB Johnson. Perfect weather was recorded for the 1965 (Dec) Grad Parade, reviewed by Maj Gen Sir Harold Barrowclough. The usual parade was held in May 1966 and in August 80 cadets graduated.

The 1st XV won two games and lost three, also narrowly losing the Junior Inter-services Sh'eld to Air Force. Cadet Hawkins AP won the cross country in snowy conditions. The soccer XI held its own in the Central North Island League; Cadet Clifford proved the most improved player of the season. The school beat St Stephen's at cricket and tennis. Champion swimmer of the year was Cadet Ewart; champion athlete Cadet Gilbert T. Sports blues were awarded to Cadet CSM Hammond, Lepl Turner, Cadet Sgt Hawkins and Cadet Lepl Flatterv

This year saw the first cadet apply to join the RNZAEC — Cadet CSM Westwater WK and the first to be selected as a pharmacist in the RNZAMC — Cadet Lcpl Roseveare

Policy introduced of graduating cadets at the end of the term in which turn 17½, provided a full year at the school had been completed, as well as the required courses.

The area bounded by School HQ, A Coy and Ed Wing was named Toni Field in memory of Cadet Toni and a memorial cairn erected adjacent to School HQ, by 1 Construction Sqn RNZE.

Ex cadets at Portsea included OC IW Tidswell and OC RN (Prof) Walker. At Duntroon were OCs WA Blair (Parkinson) and JE Laing (Barrowclough). Five ex cadets were on the school staff: WOII Fell (Al!sn) as SSM, Ssgts Wawatai (Mead), Lloyd (Young) and Ta'a (Puttick) and Cpl Lindsay (Puttick).

1967: Crump Class (Size 152)

Postings-in included: Capt M Dakin RNZA, Lt P Sullivan RNZIR, ex HQ NMD, Ssgt Keene T, ex 1 Ranger Sqn Borneo, Sgt Litchfield V, ex 161 Bty SVN.

The end of the year saw the departure of the OC since January 1965, Maj GP Brown RNZIR and the AO Lt and QM AJ Aitken RNZIR. OC A Coy, Lt and QM HW Allen RNZIR, a man acquainted with the school since its inception, also left at the end of the year. The SQMS since January 1964, Ssgt Freeman NF, RNZIR, left at the same time for 1 Bn Dpt.

Cadet RSMs were BM Young and R Dobbin. Cadet CSMs were Ewart BJ, Hutchinson WB and McPhee G.

The new CJ. Maj PR Raue, returned from Malaysia to take up his position in January. March and April saw the arrivals of Capts JA Cooper and H. Duncan. Departures for the year included Capt Leach in April, Capt RC Wrighton in December and a veteran of six years at the wing, WOII McRae IA set off for Wellington. Maj DM Campbell deputised for the CI during his absence to attend the Grade 2 Course.

The UB class numbered one, SC 24 and UE 4. The usual Gen Ed and apprentice classes were run. The wing also provided instruction for newly commissioned officers in the first term and also ran a three month Pre-Portsea academ'c course.

A former wing instructor, Ssgt Cherrington was awarded the BEM. Exam results from 1966 were: UE nil, S C12.

As well as receiving such visitors as the CGS, Maj Gen RB Dawson, Apprentice Wing conducted visits of its own; apprentice electricians visited Wellington sub-stations, carpenters a Tokaanu sawmill and a maintenance party, Omori Hut.

Training tasks undertaken include re-decking the bailey bridges in Ruapehu Road, new double doors for RF Depot, ammunition trays etc.

Capt D Boxall RNZAEC replaced Capt D Petherick as CI. Lcpl Barrett and Cpl Inwood replaced Cpls Lindsay and Little. Sgt Lamb moved in August to Linton. The end of the year saw only 16 cadets remaining for gradu-tion. The pass rate in the previous year's exams had been 94.6%.

The RNZAC contains three officers and three WOIs who are ex cadets. Cadets at the School of Sigs provided radio comms for Central Districts Ordinance Depot during demolition work. Cadets at RF Depot enjoyed another trip to Fiji. Six cadets at the RNZASC School attended a Basic Air Despatch Course at Whenuapai in August. At the RNZEME School Cadet Breen RM won the NZ Motor Trades Board's special prize for top marks in NZ for first qual, with 97%. Two-thirds of the staff were ex cadets.

After the two month Basic, two pre Instructors' Courses were run to prepare cadets for the Instructors' Course at RF Depot. Cadets Tawharu and Sherlock G attended a PTI course at RF Depot gym.

Cadets were seen in the uncharacteristic role of film s'ars in June when they featured in a film entitled "The So'dier Boys", a 20 minute film on the life of a cadet. At the 1963 Graduation Dinner forks moved to the beat of the NZ Army Band.

The 1st XV registered several wins on the inter-school circuit. but was closely beaten by St Stephen's. Navy won the Junior Inter-services' game. The hockey teams performed creditably under their coaches Sgt Todd D and WOII Watts M. Cadet Nor'on DJ won the cross country and the harrier team consisted of 16 runners. For the first time in several years the school fielded two soccer XIs and indoor basketball had three cadet and one staff teams. The school entered a composite staff/cadet team in the Taihape competition — they came seventh in the table. In softball, Cadets Hales and Tawharu were selected for the Waiouru Command team. Forty cadets chose tennis as their summer sport. The champion athlete was Cadet Dobbin.

1968: Ardagh Class (Size 143)

Maj HR Burt RNZIR was posted into the school to replace Maj Brown as OC and Capt JR McGregor RNZIR became the new AO. Other postings-in were WOII Baker AR as Chief Clerk and WOI Mackey as SSM.

Among the postings-out were: Lt PL Holes RNZIR and WOI TJ Fell. Sgt Litchfield left for the School of Arty.

Cadet RSM for the year was Cadet RSM WB Hutchinson. The Cadet CSM appointments were filled by Stowell LD, Humphries BP, Foregeard PA and Kely WB.

Exam results from 1967 showed that one cadet had passed UE out of four. Sixteen passed SC out of 26, Cadet Houltham gaining a creditable 305 marks.

In 1968, for the first time, members of the Gen Ed class sat the Chamber of Commerce exams.

Members of the staff who left at the end of the year were Capt Wrighton, Lt Roy and WOII McRae. WOII Cherrington returned to the school from Malaysia.

Activities included: the UE debate against Wanganui Collegiate, which they narrowly lost and the SC geog field trip of the Volcanic Plateau.

Among practical work undertaken was that on additions to

the three colonels' houses in Command Crescent.

Sgt Nathan replaced Ssgt Lloyd, with Cpl Sowerby arriving to fill the post he thus vacated. The wing began the year with 24 cadets.

Results of the 1967 exams showed a 94% pass rate.

Seventeen cadets attended courses at the RF Depot, with several cadets being employed as P and RT Instructors. A total of 95 cadets attended courses at the RNZASC School. Fifty-four cadets were under instruction at the RNZEME School. Nine cadets took the Radio and TT Course at the School of Sigs.

The PT programme for the year included Con Course training, cliff scaling and judo. The Incentive Award scheme for gymnastics was introduced and two cadets gained the Leaders' Bronze Badge, of which there are only 50 in NZ.

Lt JW Brown and his six man staff had a full year at Training Wing preparing cadets for the Instructors' Course.

Cadets took part in the Waiouru to Turangi section of the Huntly Cen'ennial Torch Relay. The military band stood at a strength of 20 and visited Wanganui for the National Pipe Band Championship in March. In June a well practised guard arrived in Wellington all set for the opening of Parliament, only to be thwarted by demonstrators. Finally, the guard was diverted to Government House, where it was inspected by the Governor-General. Two members of cadet school s'aff, Lt JW Brown and Cpl Walker WG attended the 50th anniversary of the Armistice, in Paris. The Cultural Group, which frequently performed with the Maori Club and other groups, continued to prosper under Capt AJ Aitken and Sgt Kiwi G. Reviewing Officer at the 1967 Grad Parade was Col CA Blazey, who also distributed the prizes. After these even's there was a Graduation Concert organised by Maj DM Campbell RNZAEC, the high-light of which was a mock Orderly Room.

The 1st XV won the Junior Interservices' match — at last. For the first time ever, the

school fielded three soccer XIs.

The hockey XI won the Ruapehu Hockey Association's champonship. Six'een harriers finished the season. The 'star' of the team, Cadet CSM Humphries, won the cross country race. The tennis teams ended the season with a barbecue. Ninety c'dets played in eight softball teams. Champion athlete was Cadet Dreaver and champion swimrer Cadet Hollander. The water polo team came 11th out of 17 teams. Deerstalking continued under Sgts Riri and Cantrick.

The school learned with rgeret that Lcpl Bensemann DI, RNZIR, had been killed in a clash with the Viet Cong in November.

1969: Weir Class (Size 149)

Among staff posied-in were Sprs Archer and Stanger, WO'ls Foster and Reid and Lt Withers. Those posted-out included Lt J Brown, WCI's Kennedy and Wiawa'ai and Esgts McDonald and McFarlane.

The Cadet RSM for the year was Cadet RSM KR Brown. The Cadet CEN's were Dempster-Rivet RD, Grubb MJ, Munro JD and Salen'eks L.

Results from the 1968 exams wore: UE, one pass, SC 65 subjecs passed by 26 full time students and four part timers. Fourteen candidates gained 18 patters in the Chamber of Com-

merce exams.

In 1969 three cadets studied for UB, commuting daily to Taihape for the purpose, seven studied UE and 37 took SC, mainly in four subjects. Thirtyeight cadets took Chamber of Commerce subjects. The introduction of single subject passes for SC meant for some, that they would finish up with a possible total of six passes.

Maj Campbell left for Malaya and was replaced by Flt Lt Masters. Capt Sanders arrived to become senior mathematician, from Slim School. Earlier in the year Lt Dreyer had arrived from Fairfield College. The departure of the recently commissioned Lt Cherrington left a gap that was filled by Mrs Masters.

1969 saw linoleum laid hard on the heels of the recent repainting of the wing.

Only five instructors and nine cadets were present at the wing this year. The wing attained a 96% pass rate in the 1968 trade exams.

The best junior class cadet chef at the RNZASC School was Cadet McLennan W, the best in the senior class was Cadet Stephens RL. At the School of Armour three cadets attended the Ferret Driver Course. Seventeen cadets attedned courses at the RF Depot. Cadet Walmsley top-ped the 1 Star Radio and TT Course at the School of Sigs and Cadet Lcp! Ridler installed and operated a telephone system for an exercise at Tac School for the Grade II. Engineering classes were small at RNZEME School this year.

Training Wing was assisted by 1 Ranger Sqn NZSAS in the training of 30 Soldier Trainees in cliff climbing, ambushing techniques and navigation; the site chosen was adjacent to Lake Rotoaira. Exercise "Flat Stick" which called on the use of some of the skills learned in April, took place in October, again with the assistance of the NZ SAS, in the Rotorua-Te Puke area. WOI 'Shorty' Jamieson directed the 'enemy' activity. The year's FT again covered a wide range of subjects, from Circuit Training to Unarmed Combat. The gym team participated in several galas.

Among the activities for the year were: the guard of honour, commanded by the OC Maj Burt, for the Commander FARELF, Lt Gen Sir Peter Hunt. In July still another guard was held, this time commanded by Maj West, for the Minister of Defence, the Hon DS Thomson, when he arrived to open the new 1000 man ORs' Mess.

Many of the year's activities centred around the 21st birthday of cadet school celebrations: the dance was reinstituted for the occasion; a special ceremonial pærade, reviewed by Maj Gen Sir Stephen Weir, was held on 12 July and a 21st birthday dance was held, to wnich girls from Taihape and Ruapehu Colleges travelled. At large 21st birthday cake was prepared, which was cut by the Cadet RSM RK Brown.

The school was narrowly defeated in a debate with Palmerston North Boys' High School. The reviewing officer at the 1968 Grad Parade held on 12 December was Brig Ardagh. An unarmed combat display followed the parade.

A cadet rugby team visited Australia in October. A highlight of the tour was the game won against Balcombe Apprentice School. 15-11. Cadet Butler emerged the winner of the cross country. Over 145 cadets took part in various deerstalking expeditions. Cadet Davis V was the champion swimmer and Cadets Dow D and Dreaver K proved the best athletes. Tennis champion of the year was Cadet Cpl Belcher SJ. The cricket XI won both its games against traditional opponents Whakatane High and St Stephens. Against the latter the softball team was also successful. Cadets Byrne and Davis were selected to play for the Waiouru Command water polo team.

A special edition of the school magazine was published which reviewed the situation of cadets who had passed through the school.

Weir Class was sad to record the death of its patron, Maj Gen Sir Stephen Weir, on 24 September. The school received further unhappy tidings when it was learned that Pte Williams JS (Barrowclough) and Spr Barratt JT (Russell) had been killed in ac'ion in Vietnam.

1970: Ngarimu VC Class (Size 150)

At the beginning of the year WOI D StC Stewart replaced WOI F Mackey as SSM. Ssgt Jenkins followed Ssgt McFarlane as Training Officer and Capt Hasell replaced Capt Mc-Gregor as AO. In B Coy Capt PJ Skogstad took the place of Capt GW Boxall and was in turn replaced by Lt GA Davies; the CSMs, too, changed places, wih WO!I Foster P replacing WOII Wawatai. A Coy also had a change of OC when Lt GJ Brighouse arrived to take the place of Lt RP Withers.

The Cadet RSM this year was Cadet RSM MJ Grubb, who was assisted by Cadet CSMs Butler KN, Montgomery RE, Ross BJ and Saxon LA.

Many changes in staff took place at the Education Wing this year. Capt AJ Cooper left for Wanganui Collegiate and in August Lt Dreyer was posted to the AEC Section Waiouru Command, WIOII Matson was also posted. New arrivals were Capt Broadhurst, Lt McNicol and Lt Robson.

A five subject course for UE became policy this year for the four cadets taking the course. There was one in the UB class and the SC class started the year 44 strong. The Gen Ed and Appr classes had rolls of 20.

Results from 1969 showed that in SC 36 cadets passed 73 out of 140 subjects sat, two passed UE and 37 cadets gained 36 passes in the Chamber of Commerce exams. Only one cadet was on correspondence work this year.

The end of the year saw the departure of that representative of increasing tri-service cooperation, F1 Lt GK Masters, who had spent two years at the wing.

At the Apprentice Wing, Lt GM Davies replaced Capt Skogstad as CI in August. All the other instructors at the wing had been cadet apprentices there.

Tasks undertaken included the building of an office in the Coy HQ, the refurbishing of the cadet canteen and extensions to a large amenities building in the Waiouru Community Centre.

All cadets who sat passed the 1969 examinations for their trades.

At the School of Armour Cadet Cawte and Cdt Lepl Tuffin were selec'ed to join the RNZAC team on Ex "Tasman 9" in Australiaanother first for cadets. From RNZASC School came the news that ex cadet Cpl Blockstage ER had been selected for the NZ Restaurant at Expo 70, Japan. Thirty-four cadets attended courses at the RNZEME School, which was headed as CI by Maj DS Baker (Greville Class 1951). At the RF Depot 14 cadets attended the Basic All Arms Instructors' Course.

Again Continuation Courses were run for Soldier Trainees. These included an Infantry Weapons Course and a Pre-Instructors' Course. They were followed by an SAS course conducted by 1 Ranger Sqn at Lake Rcloaira — Ex "Flat Stick 2" — in which cadets experienced the joy of being in action with Iroquois helicopters.

The new intake marched-in on 7 January. The same month 40 cadets took part in the Taupo Centennial Celebrations and a 100 man guard ceremonially received the Freedom of the Borough of Taupo, for which a special charter was drawn up and presented to the school.

In March, six Indonesian officers visited the school and the following month Gen RE Haines Jr, C in C the US Army in the Pacific, inspected cadet activities. In June the school received a visit from the CDS, Lt Gen Sir Leonard Thornton and the Secretary of Defence, Mr JF Robertson, Twenty-four cadets graduated in May and nineteen in August; the final Grad Parade for the year was held on 10 December. The 1969 Grad Parade was reviewed by HE the Governor-General Sir Arthur Porritt and attended by Lady Weir.

The 1st XV won both the Ruapehu-Taihape third grade competition and the Junior Inter-services'. Cadet CSM Montgomery and Cadet Poka were chosen for the senior rep side in cricket. In hockey the cadet XI defeated Air Force at the Junior Inter-services'. Cadets Poka and Jones represented Waiouru at the North Island basketball championships. Champion swimmer was Cadet Cpl Davis V. A number of cadets were nominated for the Waiouru Command water polo team, but m'litary training commitments precluded their participation. Champion athletes were Cadets Gun and Porter and Cadet Walker won the cross country in a new record time of 26 minutes 3 seconds.

This year saw the emergence of trout fishing as a popular recreation for cadets.

Ex cadets Lcpl Corey SF and Cpl Adkins KR assisted during the year in the Governor-General's kitchen.

WOII Rout JB (Shuttleworth) RNZA, spent 10 weeks assisting the Australians in trials on FACE (Field Artillery Computer Equipment).

1971: Upham VC and Bar Class (Size 152)

The major staff change for the year was the arrival of Maj JF Mills to replace the OC Maj HR Eurt. In July Lt AJ Rivers replaced Lt Sherrif as AO and in August Ssgt Morgan followed WOII Corcoran as Chief Clerk. September saw Sgt Wills replace Ssgt Adams as OQMS. In December WOII Shirley, who had been Education Wing Warrant Officer, became CSM A Coy, to replace WOI M Watts who had been appointed SSM following the departure of WOI Stewart. The same month Ssgt Todd became CSM B Coy in place of WOII Foster.

The Cadet RSM for the year was Cadet RSM Byrne, who was assisted by Cadet CSMs Montgomery, Snow, Saxon LA, Gardner K and Williams.

Staff changes at Education Wing included the departure of Maj Duncan, who became EO Linton in February and Lt Robson and Capt McNicol, who both returned to teaching. Maj PR Raue, who had been CI for five years, was posted to Singapore in December. Arrivals were Lt WK Westwater (Parkinson Class), who had completed university and teacher training in Christchurch and Lt TB Powell, who arrived in November from Auckland.

In the 1970 exams for SC, 36 cadets gained 77 passes out of 163 subjects sat. There were 11 in the 1971 UE class, 33 taking SC, 15 undergoing Gen Ed and 27 doing Appr Ed. Ten subject options were available at SC level.

The place of Ssgt Todd as Ordnance Instructor at Appr Wing was taken by Sgt Henderson.

Cadets at the School of Arty found themselves using such new equipment as gyroscopicallydirectors and orien'ed the WF 3 wind-finding Plessey meteorological radar. At the School of Armour cadets assisted in demonstrations such as the NSTU Passing-out Parades, cadets Sixty-eight attended courses at the RNZASC School and those at the MT Wing learnt the new hazard avoidance tech-From the RNZEME niques. School came the news that all cadets had been successful in the previous year's exams.

Eighteen cadets attended BAA Instructors' Courses at the RF Depot and participated in the "Tropical Dawn" exercise in Fiji.

Among the exercises in which soldier trainees were involved was Exercise "Argus" in October which emphasised the importance of navigation.

The new intake marched-in on 7 January. Graduation Day was 14 December. In May a 100 man guard was mounted for HW the Mayor of Taupo and a dance held in Taupo the same evening. In July cade's travelled to the same venue for a similar dance. In September the school provided a 50 man guard for the Governor-General, Sir Arthur Porritt, when he visited Taihape. October saw the school climbing Mt Ruapehu, the highlight of the trip being cold meat pies at 8000 feet.

The year saw the school win the Junior Inter-services' Tournament, which was held in Waiouru. Of five games played, the soccer XI won four. Champion swimmer was Cadet Dally, who broke three records; other record breakers were Cadets Galbraith and Haworth. The squad of 20 water polo players continued to make the trek to the Ohakune balhs. A high point in the year's cricketing calendar was the selection of five cadets to play in the NZ Army Regional Tournament.

An obvious innovation of the year was the advent of the Mk V Centurion tank, which had seen service in Korea. The tank was placed on a special mound outside the Training Wing.

Chief Instructor at the School of Infantry was an ex cadet, Maj B Bestic (Weir). He was assisted at the school by Capt AG Howell (Russell) and Sgt Lillicrapp WJ (Stewart).

1972: Dittmer Class (Size 152)

Early in the year Lt Brighouse departed and was replaced as OC A Coy by Lt NC Jamieson (Allen Class). The AO, Lt AJ Rivers, left in July and was replaced by Capt HC Oakley-Browne. In B Coy Capt RS Munro replaced Capt GM Davies who moved to HQ ATG Waiouru.

The Cadet RSMs were Cadet RSM MA Gibney and Cadet RSM N Galbraith. The Cadet CSM appointments were filled by Cadet CSMs Fergusson and Bell.

Maj GN Smith, who arrived in January to replace Maj Raue as CI, heralded the arrival of Lt LM Gray from Christchurch, in January and Capt TE Salt from Auckland in February. March saw the arrival of Sgt Boulton IW to take the place of Ssgt Pomeroy.

In the 1972 SC exam 41 cadets passed 94 subjects and three of the ten eligible obtained UE.

This year the Gen Ed class was discontinued and Appr Ed carried out on a more limited basis.

Appr Wing continued to achieve a high standard. Staff changes included the posting-in of Sgt Bruce to replace Sgt Rose, the departure of Sgt Milligan as well as that of Sgt Pearson, the longest-serving member on the staff of the wing.

Late in the year Ssgt Lamb arrived to take over the wing. A cadet from the RFMF Sikivou at!ended the land 2 Star courses at the School of Sigs, to put him on the road to becoming a Radio and Telegraph Technician. At the School of Inf, five cadets qualified on the RF Section Commanders' Course.

Training Wing welcomed in Ssgt Horsfall as Trg NCO and also ex All Plack Sgt Buff Milner. Among the concerns of the wing during the year was the improvement of the ranges.

Among the guards mounted was one in April for Gen Tan Sri Ibrahim Bin Ismail, commanded by Capt B Hill, RF Depot, and one in July for the Governor-General, Sir Arthur Porritt, commanded by Cadet CSM Galbraith N. One of the highlights of the year was the tented camp at Hatepe held at the end of July and early August —heavy frests helped to engrave the event on one's memory.

Another activity in which the school participated was a cross country walk between the Chateau and the Desert Road; A Coy started at the Chateau, B Coy started at the Desert Road and both met, very brietly, somewhere about the middle.

For the the first time the scope of the Junior Inter-services' was widened to include soccer and hockey, as well as rugby. Cadet Lepl Johnson won the cross country in a record time of 23 mins 14.45 sees. From this race a team was picked for the Manawatu champs, where it finished fifth overall. The A besketball team (the Tom Cats) played 12 games and won 11. Fencing was introduced to the sporting calendar for 12 cadets

During the year the school acquired a Bren Carrier from the Ruapehu Lions Club. This was lovingly restored during the waking hours of second year RNZEME apprentices.

The RNZASC School reported that one of the 1971 CSMs (Cadet), Snow J, had spent six months TOD at the Chateau. Six of the instructional slaff at the School of Arty were ex cadets, the most senior being WOI GB Black (Williams). In September Lt Col LJ Lynch (Williams) became the first ex cadet to reach this rank.

Become one of architects at breaking of Alamein defences and was one of the "Soviet" which ran 2NZ Div (Freyberg, Weir Queere, Hanson, dashed with Monty over 2nd Div. Left Hook at Mareth line — and won! (Became known as only senior officer to argue with Monty and not be sacked).

During campaign in Italy be-

came expert at getting Div forward particularly by bridging — at Cassino and in race to Trieste.

Rejoined MOW (PWD) after War and became Commissioner o Works 55-62 retired 62). Known as straight talker. TF member army board after War.

Had rather close parallel to last year's patron in many ways:

- (a) Both started WWI as NCOs (Dittmer commissioned during WWI);
- (b) Both decorated gallantry in France. Dittmer MC Hanson MM;
- (c) Dittmer joined RF between wars;
- (d) Both sailed to UK on same boat 2nd Echelon;
- (e) Together in UK 1940;
- (f) Both sailed on same boat UK-ME;
- (g) Both on Greece and Crete together;
- (h) Both evacuated from Crete on same British destroyer:
- (i) Both won DSO WWII (Hanson with bar); and,
- (j) Both speak highly of the other as being honest straight talkers.

BRIGADIER JT BURROW3 CBE, DSO, ED, MA

Brigadier James Thomas Burrows CBE. DSO and Bar, ED, MA was born on 14 July 1904. He joined the Territorial Force in April 1923 as a Second Lieutenant

On the outbreak of war he went into camp with the rank of Captain and commenced his service with 2NZEF as a Company Commander in 20 Battalion. He sailed with the First Echelon for the Middle East where he subsequently held various appointments including Second-in-Command and Commanding Officer 20 Battalion; Officer Commanding Southern Training Dcpot (Egypt) and Advanced Base (Italy); Commander 4 Infantry Brigade (Western Desert) and 5 and 6 Infantry Brigades (Italy).

He rejoined the Territorial Force on 1 December 1948 as Commander 3 Infantry Brigade. On 16 January 1950 he entered the Regular Force with the rank of Colonel in the appointment of Commander Papakura Camp. In November 1951 he was appointed Commander Southern Military District with the rank of Brigadier. On 24 October 1953 he was posted as Commander NZ K Force (Korea) and in January 1955 he returned to the Command of Southern Military Districts.

Brigadier Burrows retired in January 1960. He was awarded the CBE, DSO and Bar, ED (with clasps for 18 and 24 years' service), mentioned in despatches three times and awarded the Order of Valour (Greece), during his service.

He also proved himself as an outstanding sportsman in that he was a member of the 1928 All Blacks who toured South Africa, a Canterbury Rugby, and Cricket representative and he played rugby for New Zealand Universities. He also distinguished himself in the sport of boxing.

After retiring he undertook the appointment of Honorary Colonel, The Canterbury Regiment, Royal New Zealand Infantry in 1964. He continued as Honorary Colonel when the South Island units amalgamated to become the Canterbury and Nelson-Marlborough and West Coast Regiment. He was transferred from this appointment to the Retired List on 1 April, 1966.

'B' COMPANY NOTES

'B' Company is the company with the cadet full-time apprentice tradesmen in it, and is responsible for:

- (a) Their discipline and adminministration;
- (b) The co-ordination of their trade training with corps schools;
- (c) Their military training; and
- (d) Their welfare and recreational activities.

1974 has been a busy year and one of change for 'B' Company; besides having to put up with the whims and fancies of a new Company Commander and Company Sergeant Major, it has had to adapt to a slightly changed role, a shift in emphasis in military and trade training, and a changing domestic scene.

The year started for the Company in early January when all the second and third year cadets of the school arrived back from their Christmas leave to start their advanced soldier training.

The soldier training was designed to confirm the basic military skills the cadets had learnt the year before, to teach and practice them in new skills of a more advanced nature which are common to all Corps of the Army, and to give them experience of living in the field. To this end, the five week period available was divided into four phases. The first phase was one week of shooting, the second a week of map reading exercises, during which the cadets lived in a tented camp at Don Base, and the third a week of section and platoon battle drills exercises in the Waiouru area. For the final phase, which lasted two weeks, the Company moved to the Mamakus near Rotorua where a tented base camp was established and aspects of jungle tactics and warfare were taught and practiced.

Ali in all this training was successful; the cadets learnt skills of value for their future careers in the Army, they learnt how to live ir field conditions and fend for themselves without all the comforts of modern civilization. The excesses of Christmas were worn off, we all being a lot fitter as a result.

With the completion of soldier training, the 'B' Company second and third year apprentices were joined by the first year apprentices who had just completed their basic military training. Trade training ther, commenced.

Early March saw the company at its highest strength ever and with cadets training in more trades than ever. Cadets continued or started their apprenticeships in nincteen trades, nearly all of which have a civilian equivalent recognised and taught and tested to the standards of the New Zealand Trades Certification Board.

The appprentice vehicle mechanies, instrument technicians, fitters and turners, engine fitters, auto electricians, armourers, fitters and welders, and panel beaters went to the RNZEME School: the chefs and stewards to the RNZASC School; the radio and telegraph technicians and electronic technicians and signals to the School, the carpenters and joiners, architectural draughtmen, electricians, plumbers, auto parts storeman and RNZAOC storeman clerks to the RNZE Apprentice Wing; and the dental technicians to the Dental Section.

Initially the apprentices started on the theory of their trade. progressing to practical aspects in workshop type situations until, in late 1974, we had people spread throughout New Zealand and involved in more advanced pracucal aspects of their trade training. For example, the carpenters and joiners in Wanganui building a motel unit, vehicle mechanics working in the Waiouru Workshops and chefs and stewards scattered around messes in Waiouru and other camps. However by late October most of them were back in the fold studying for their trade examinations in late November. More details of the apprentice training are contained in the notes of the various corps schools, elsewhere in this magazine

Throughout this time, a limited amount of military training and plenty of sport and recreational training have been conducted. Generally, the apprentices have continued to carry out five hours of military training each week, mainly consisting of drill, physical training and shooting, with the aim of keeping the edge of skill and fitness picked up earlier in the year.

As with any military institution, sport and recreational activities play an important part in developing fitness, teamwork, spirit and character, and every Wednesday and Saturdav at least has seen the cadets and staff of the Company involved in some sort of sport or recreational activity.

'b' Company has been well represented in the School sports teams, more of which elsewhere in the Magazine, and two of our cadets were selected to represent the Army; Cdt CSM Cook at soccer and Cdt L cpl Barley as a hockey reserve. Well done, to both of them.

'B' Coy had a successful year in the inter-company sporting events for the Commandant's Shield, winning the tug-of-war, cricket and tennis competitions. Although we lost the team competition for the cross country run, Cdt Holder of 'B' Coy was the individual winner — well done. On the recreational side, 'B' Company cadets have been prominent especially in canoeing and deer stalking, more of these, too, elsewhere in the magazine.

I would like to thank all the staff and cadets for the effort and time they have put into company activities during the year, and wish the cadets well in their forth-coming examinations — try and better the 95% pass rate of last year!

RNZE Apprentice Wing 1974

In a constantly changing world, we find changes being made here in our own small but unique environment. The most notable change made in this Wing, is that of the Carpentry apprentice who can now be examined for both the 1st and 2nd Qualifying Examination in the first year.

The first sixteen weeks of the apprenticeship, the carpentry apprentice covers the complete 1st Qualification Examination Syllabus and at the end of that period attempts a 1st Qualification Examination set by the Senior Trade Instructor. This examination is then marked and sent forward to

the New Zealand Trade Certification Board for scrutiny.

For the remaining part of the academic year the apprentice is preparing to attempt the 2nd Qualification Examination in November. This examination is set by the Trade Certification Board.

The advantage for the apprentice is that, in the second year he will be trained and prepared to attempt the Trade Certification Examination and if successful the apprentice is left with only one examination to be taken, Advanced Trade Certificate.

Throughout New Zealand the only other institutes who have the approval to conduct such schemes are the Waikato Technical Institute, at Hamilton, and Christchurch Technical Institute.

To achieve complete training the scheme is based on the construction of a standard New Zealand home.

The apprentices this year have constructed a 'motel' which is sited next to the Wanganui Army Area Office. It is the intention next year to have the apprentices construct houses in the Waiouru Housing Area.

At present there are nine apprentices who will be attempting 2nd Qual and two who will be attempting Trade Certificate in November.

The Electrical apprentices have not been as fortunate. June of this year the only Electrical Instructor at the Wing (Cpl Jones TE) was accepted for an Officer Cadetship course in Portsea, Australia. Since then the apprentices have continued with correspondence and have attended Block courses at Petone.

All three Electrical apprentices will attempt 2nd Qualification Examination this November.

There are no Plumbing apprentices at this stage, due to one reason or another, the three who were here have all been released from the Service.

Education Wing

1974 began with Maj DM Campbell being posted to Burnham and Maj H. Duncan returning from Singapore as Chief Instructor. Capt TB Powell was posted to HQ ATG Waiouru as assistant Education Officer but has retained his association with Cadet School by continuing to teach one of the School Certificate English classes.

Capt SJ Fraser joined the Regular Force in January having been introduced to the army through the Territorial Force. Capt Fraser replaced Lt Westwater who had ioined the staff in January 1971. During his three years at the school Lt Westwater taught Geography, Science and English; a wide range of subjects which indicates his value to Cadet School education. The posting to the Officer Cadet Training Unit came in December 1973 and we were all sorry to see Keith go.

The staff members who remained from 1973 were Capt TE Salt, Capt M Preece, Lt LM Gray and S Sgt IW Boulton. Lt Gray was promoted during the year and SSgt Boulton qualified for promotion on the SSgt to Warrant Officers course.

1974 has seen a concentration on School Certificate and University Entrance classes to the exclusion of all other types of instruction. This was made necessary by the number of students and the range of subjects taught. The subjects offered at the University Entrance level were English, History, Geography, Physics, Mathematics, Biology, Accounting and Technical Drawing, the last two being studied through the Correspondence School.

School Certificate subjects studied during the year were English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Commercial Practice, Technical Drawing and Engineering shopwork.

Seventeen students are sitting University Entrance and fortynine have entered for School Certificate subjects, several cadets are

sitting subjects in both examinations. All cadets who have entered for the University Entrance examination are eligible for Sixth Form Certificate awards. This award is made by the Department of Education and its increased standing as an academic qualification provides an additional incentive for those doing post school certificate study.

One cadet, Cdt CSM R Loader has studied History and English through Massey University

To join the Army and then be asked to follow a full-time academic course is not what every cadet thinks is best for himself. Many are very keen to improve their academic qualifications, while others would sooner leave their books at the doors to Cadet School. It is our aim to develop a young man's abilities to the level which will give him the best start to his military career, and it is felt that a good general education provides the base for the more specialised trade and soldier training.

Cadets engaged in full-time education have to adapt to their new environment and learn the basic skills of being a soldier as well as coping with their class-rcom teaching and study. Theirs is a full and demanding year and the majority cope very well. Our thanks go to all those who have worked well during the year and we wish you every success in your examinations.

RNZASC School 1974

The Royal New Zealand Army Service Corps School's role is to train to a uniformly high standard selected personnel in those aspects of organisation, command, operational techniques and skill's required of the Royal New Zealand Army Service Corps in war and peace. The School Staff

The RNZASC School has a staff of 37 officers and non commissioned officers (NCOs), making us one of the largest schools in The Army Schools. Of these 37, 13 are ex cadets, which gives an indication of the importance the RF cadet plays in the future of our Corps. It is the RF cadet of today who is the RNZASC instructor of tomorrow. The Chief Instructor, Major SA Davies is an ex cadet (Puttick Class) of 1957, as is the School Sergeant Major, WOI D Hudson (Mead Class)

The Catering Wing

in today's modern Army. However, the days of bully beef stew and biscuits have long past. Today's Army marches on a cuisine that puts a lot of high class civilian hotels to shame. Our chefs are trained to such a high standard that they are the envy of their civilian counterparts.

Since 1948 the Army has been running an apprentice chef scheme that is second to none. All apprentice chefs sit City and Guilds of London Institute Trade Certificate examinations, which are recognised throughout the English speaking world, as well as in Asia and the Continent of Europe. Our pass rates are 90 per cent and the general standard of trade ability is very high. Many of our chefs, on completion of their mili'ary service, are able to gain top positions in the kitchens of the world, as well as in this country. Some chefs rise above the kitchen and enter the management activities of hotels and industries. Others set up their own catering businesses, using the skills and expertise learned at the Catering Wing.

Ex cadet apprentice chefs who have elected to remain in the ermy have also gained some excellent appointments. Ex Cadet MCA Harris of Miles Coy (1948), for example has, after graduating through the ranks of the Regular Force to Warrant Officer Class One, been commissioned and reached the rank of Major, Chief Catering Officer of the Army.

Ex Cadet DA Armstrong of Parkinson Class (1964) has also been commissioned and is now Catering Officer at the RNZASC Schools Catering Wing

Ex Cadet AM Wheeler of Ardagh Class is now at OCS Portsea undergoing officer training.

Ex Cadet J Gruber of Russell Class is now a Warrant Officer Instructor at the Catering Wing, as is ex Cadet DT Mravicich of Parkinson Class, who is now a Staff Sergeant. Many other ex cadet apprentice chefs hold the rank of Sergeant and look like progressing rapidly.

The Catering Wing also trains apprentice stewards to a high standard of proficiency. RF cadets who choose to become apprentice stewards are trained for the position of waiters, barmen and head stewards. Promotion is rapid in this field for the right men, because of the responsibility invested in army stewards, who are often called on to supervise and train a large staff of civilians.

Eventually, we hope to gain City and Guilds recognition for our steward trade examinations, which will make our stewards as popular with civilian employers as our chefs are now. **The Motor Transport Wing**

Driver training is, of course, most appealing to young men. What can be more satisfying than charging across country at the wheel of a heavy truck, or the more nimble Land-Rover? Many a potential Heatway Rally driver has cut his teeth on an army vehicle, much to the consternation of the school's instructors.

Of course, cross country driving is not the only requirement of an army driver and the MT Wing spends considerable time teaching both RF cadets and Regular Force drivers to be responsible, capable drivers for the roads of the country.

Drivers are also taught basic mechanics; how to service a variety of vehicles, how to diagnose mechanical faults and how to repair minor faults. Whether they are driving a normal saloon staff car, a Land-Rover, a heavy truck, forklift or our 10 ton semi-trailer units, all RNZASC drivers pass through the MT Wing on courses. Some will eventually return as qualified Motor Transport Instructors, where they will pass on their knowledge to future RF cadet driver trainees.

The Operations and Supply Wing

The Operations Wing trains both RF cadets and Regular Force soldiers to be storekeeperclerks, carrying out such functions as procuring supplies, stock control, office procedures, warehousing, man management and operational procedures.

All these functions are of value to both the army and to civilian enterprises. Several RF cadets, on completion of their military service, have found good positions as warehouse managers, purchasing officers and managerial careers in the grocery trade.

Be they chefs, stewards, drivers or storekeeper-clerks, the RNZASC School trains them for careers both within the army and for later careers on their return to civilian life.

Role of the School of Artillery

The School of Artillery is responsible for training all officers and men of the Royal Regiment of New Zealand Artillery, both Regular and Territorial Force.

They attend courses of instruction with both Regular and Territorial soldiers and are trade-tested at the end of each course. After this period of training they are posted to Artillery units.

School of Signals 1974

The School of Signals is responsible for training technical and non technical personnel of RNZ Sigs, Regular Force (incl. RF Cadets), Territorial Force and NZWRAC. It comprises a tactics and operator training unit (Tac-Op) and a Technical Training Unit (Tech). It is also responsible for running the Army Training Group Communications Centre.

Technical Training Unit:

The course introduces the Signalman/RF Cadet to the technician trade and prepares him for his first Qualifying exam (civilian exam). On completion and subject to him attaining the required standard qualifies him as a 2 Star Tradesman in the Corps of Signals. He is able to service radio sets such as the AN/PRC-77 and AN/PRC-47, set up basic teleprinter and telegraph systems.

The Cadets of the unit both RNZ Signals and RNZEME attended a 1 Star (all trades) course run by the Tac-Op unit. Tactics and Operator Training

Unit:

All RF Cadets this year attended RF OR Communication the Centre operator, Radio Relayman, Telegraph operator and Radio and Telegraph technician 1 Star course which introduced the Cadets to the skills of radio operating, line laying, and maintaining switchboard

operating, battery charging and Corps organisation. To increase their trade skills all of the RF Cadet operators were taught to touch type to a speed of 45 words per minute on the RF OR tele-typewriter course. This course is 10 weeks long. To further this skill of telegraph operators/ Comcen Operators, Cadets Brown, Gray, Hubbard, Watty, Campbell Tchernegovski attended an and RF OR Communication Centre and telegraph operator 2 Star course. Knowledge gained on this course will enable these cadets to operate as a detachment member in a field force comcen or a static comcen. Further training is being carried out in the ATG Comcen. The Radio Relay Cadets attended a 2 Star Radio Relay course where they were trained as detachment members for a field force radio relay troop. The equipment these Cadets trained on is the latest available from America, the AN/GRC-103/V)1.

ATG Communication Centre:

The Communication Centre is a part of the NZ Defence teleprinter and telephone network, and is able to transmit signals to most countries throughout the world. Modern equipment is used to achieve quick efficient handling of messages/phone calls, Automatic Message Switching and Creed 444 teleprinters.

The Supervisor Ssgt Earl (Puttick Class 1957) and assistant Supervisor Cpl Papuni (Crump Class 1967) are the only two graduates of RF Cadet School employed on the staff, the remainder are NZWRAC.

Conclusion:

For all instructors in both units and the RF Cadets trained by them the year has been extremely busy. For those RF Cadets who graduate and take up their places with RNZ Sigs units throughout New Zealand, the best wishes of the School of Signals go with them.

Royal New Zealand Army Ordinance Corps 1974

Within the Ordinance Corps the following trades are available to RF Cadets:

Automotive Parts and Accessories Merchandising. Storeman Clerk RNZAOC. Ammunition Technician. Tailor.

Automotive Parts and Accessories Merchandising embraces all aspects of the Automotive Parts department in a Civilian Organization, the examination being conducted by the New Zealand Trade Certification Board.

The trade of Storeman Clerk RNZAOC is an Army trade and covers the purchasing, warehousing, accounting (manual and computer) for all Army stores which range from a needle to a complete M113 Armoured Personnel Carrier.

The training given for these two trades are closely related.

The trade of Ammunition Technician covers the handling. breaking down, and storage of all types of ammunition used within the Army, plus the chemistry of explosives and elementary ballistics.

The remaining trade is that of the Tailor covers the alteration of the various Military Uniforms and limited production of prototype uniforms. On completion of Basic and Advanced Soldier Training in March 74, Trade training commenced with three second year cadets and two first year cadets, later on in the year we were joined by a further two cadets which gave a total of seven cadets with a trade breakdown as follows:

Automotive Parts Apprentices 4 Storeman Clerks 2

Ammunition Technicians 1 Other RNZAOC cadets successfully carried out educational stud-

ies and All Arms courses. Both theory and practical training is carried out within Units in ATG Waiouru. Automotive Parts apprentices practical work being conducted at Waiouru Workshop Stores Section and Armoured Squadron LAD Stores Section. The theory training is conducted by RNZEME Schools and the RNZAOC Instructor attached to RF Cadet School.

The training of the Storeman Clerks and the Ammunition Technician is conducted by 2 Central Ordinance Depot and Ammunition Area Waiouru.

During the year cadets were attached to Ordinance Units outside Waiouru and attended various courses at the RNZAOC School, Trentham, and the Central Institute of Technology, Petone.

All returned with a qualification giving a 100% pass rate.

Throughout 1974 we also saw the departure of many recently graduated RNZAOC ex-cadets of the above trades to the new Ordinance Depot in Singapore.

The present RNZAOC Instructor attached to RF Cadet School is Cpl McLean MJ.

Rugby 1st XV 1974

Although a long and difficult season for players, this year has seen one of the most successful 1st XV Rugby teams, that the school has fielded.

The season began on 23rd March and ended on the 31st August in which 30 games of Rugby were played, for 24 wins, 5 losses and 1 draw. The total number of points scored was 794 for and 203 against.

On the local scene we won the under nineteen section of the Northern Wanganui Sub Union Competition for which we were awarded a trophy. The highlight of the season was our game against St. Stephens College on 22nd June when for the first time in 21 years of inter school rugby we all but had it won, with one minute showing to full time we were leading 6—4 and were pipped on the post to go down 12—6. A very hard game of

rugby with a half time score of 4-3 to the visitors. The game went on, finger nails getting shorter and shorter, hearts palpitating, then out of the blue Dick Wixon dropped a goal to put us in the lead. To this day, and we have replayed that game many times since, we believe that the fact of actually leading was too much for some of us. We had played our hearts out and were so close to winning. It is doubtful if ever any of those players will again experience the bitter dis-appointment they did that day. It is worth mentioning that St. Stephens had just completed an unbeaten tour of Australia and that the game was controlled by the test referee Mr Bill Adlam of Wanganui didn't give us any chance to blame the referee.

AROUND THE MOUNTAINS RECORD BREAKING RUN

At 3 a.m. on a bleak Waiouru mcrning, Saturday 12th Oct. 74 the OC, Maj Wilson and 'B' Coy Comd Capt Dennistoun-Wood started off the RF Cadet relay team on its record breaking attempt of the 100.4 mile round the mountain relay. The route was from Camp HQ, Ruapehu Road via the Desert Road to Ohakune, National Park, Rangipo and then by the Desert Road back to Waiouru Camp HQ.

The record was set at 9 hours 54 mins 18 seconds by RF Cadet School in 1973 and was going to be hard to beat.

Ten runners took part with WOII Henderson heading the logistic support team which contributed greatly towards the success of the exercise.

Timings and speeds achieved were 4 hours to National park (10 mph average), 2 hours 40 to Rangipo (9.8 mph) and 2 hours 25.20 seconds to Waiouru (11.25 mph).

No record was kept of posted mile or individual performances as an exercise of this type relies entirely on teamwork to achieve any measure of success. The personal contribution of the runners on this occasion was outstanding especially in the closing stages when the strain was felt.

It was a great feeling of elation for all when the last runner reached Camp HQ at 1225 hours and 20 secs.

The RF Cadet Relay team has carved 28 minutes 58 seconds off the old record and in so doing had set a time that is going to be hard to better.

CANOEING

General

A new sport to emerge on the cadet school scene is canoeing. This activity provides both a sport and a challenging pursuit requiring a high degree of mental awareness and an above average degree of physical exertion. At one time considered a fringe sport, canoeing is now developing into a powerful attraction for all age groups. New Zealand alone has 50 clubs which are primarily canoe clubs or include canoeing as one of their activities.

Divisions

Canoeing is divided into a number of divisions depending on the type of canoes used or the type of water the canoe is used in. The activity is generally termed canoeing but is subdivided into:

(a) Canadian cances. This type of cance developed from the original Indian cance which was open and had the recognised upturned stern and prow. The main characteristic of a Canadian cance is that it is propelled or controlled with a SINGLE BLADED paddle and the paddler half kneels, half sits while guiding the cance. Copies of the original Indian design are still available but are now made in fibreglass. Competitively, the Canadian is now redesigned for international and Olympic competition into:

1. Canadian racing single and double (C1 and C2). This is designed for speed and is paddled over a flat water course as in rowing. The European countries dominate this competitive field.

2. Canadian single and double slalom. This has been redesigned for turbulent white water competition and the canoe is now fully enclosed with a cockpit that can be sealed. Stalom was included in the Munich Olympic Games for the first time in 1972.

(b) Kayaks. This type of cance developed from the original Eskimo Kayak and is characterised by the paddler sitting down as opposed to kneeling and the use of a DOUBLE BLADED paddle. Competitively it is divided into:

1. Flat water racing. International and Olympic competition promotes single, doubles and fours (K1, K2, K4). It is interesting to note that a K4 can beat a rowing eight over a 500m course.

2. Slalom. Only single Kayaks (K1) compete in this division.

In addition to the above sub-

caters for the non-compelitive aspects such as surfing and cruising can vary from a full scale expedition such as the 1971 canoe expedition down the mighty Colorado River to a sedate paddle on a small lake. Open sea cruising is a specialised form of canoeing which requires a high degree of navigational skill for currents, tides and winds must be considered. Slalom This most skilful aspect of

divisions by canoe type, canoeing

This most skilful aspect of canoeing has been developed since 1930 and is now a highly specialised sport. The first world championships were organised in Geneva in 1949 and have been held regularly every two years since. In 1972 at the Munich Olympics, slalom was included as a games event, in fact an artificially constructed course was used.

AIM. The aim of slalom is twofold: (a) to complete the course in the shortest possible time; and (b) to pass cleanly through all gates.

THE COURSE. The competition is run over a course of up to 800m. The canoeist must pass through up to 30 gates, which consist of two poles hanging over strategic points on the white water course. Points are added to the canoeist's time for every gate which he fails to complete or touches in the process of presing the poles.

Cadets

In order to be able to compete with affiliated clubs of the New Zealand Canoe Association a canoe club has been formed in ATG Waiouru which is open to all army personnel and related civilians in Waiouru.

Through this club cadets have in an 18 month period reached a standard where they compete regularly in slalom and down river races. The highlight of this competitive programme has been an invitation to enter a team in the Commonwealth Slalom competition in February 1974.

Commonwealth Slalom

A Commonwealth slalom was held on the Rangitata River, close to the Mt Peel Reserve

in the South Island. The competition was run from 8-10 February 74. It included about 30 invited canoeists from Britain, Australia and Japan, who competed internationally against a team of six of New Zealand's top canoeists.

In addition, a number of New Zealand clubs were invited to enter teams to compete for a national competition.

Cadet school was invited to compete in this phase of the Commonwealth slalom. Although not a venue for the Commonwealth Games, the Games committee allowed the competition to be run "in conjunction with" the Games.

Coaches

The ATG Waiouru canoe club has one senior coach recognised by the NZCA, Capt HC Cakley-Browne. The club is in the process of getting other members qualified as coaches. A strong lia'son exists between the Palmerston North Canoe Club, who have provided coaching assistance and technical advice.

Canoeing By D. Inger

During the present year the Waiouru Canoe Club has been very busy and has taken part in events ranging from river racing to slalom canocing. Apart from practising in the local area the club has sent teams to canoeing competitions around NZ. These competitions were as follows:

- (a) Mount Peel Commonwealth Invitation Slalom.
- (b) Manawatu Gorge River race.

(c) Mangawho Invitation slalom.

The Commonwealth Invitation slalom was held at Mount Peel on the Rangatata River in the South Island. Teams from all over NZ entered and others came from Great Britain, USA, Canada, and Australia. The slalom lasted from, the 7th February until the 10th Feb. The Waiouru Club sent down a party of 8, 6 cadets: P. Ayres, M. West, D. Verry, D. Inger, R. Armstrong, P. Thompson and Coach-competitor Major H Oakley-Browne, and the Manager of our club, Cpl White. About 300 spectators came to cheer on the competitors and help in any way they could. Although no major places were taken by our team they still did their best and Cadet Avres and Mai Oakley Browne did very well. The mem-bers learned a lot and enjoyed themselves, and this trip helped prepare us for competition trips that followed.

The Manawatu Gorge race was held in mid June over a total distance of 5 miles with only one big rapid, the White Horse rapid. The team did well with Cdt Hogben 8th and Maj Oakley-Brown 9th out of 43.

The Mangawho Invitation slalom was held at the Mangawho slalom site out of Palmerston North and our club sent 8 cadets to compete. The standard of canoeing was very high and about 86 competed. The water proved too rough for most of the cadets and only D Inger and J. Albrett finished the course. J. Albrett came in 37th out of 86 and D. Inger 54th. Both good efforts.

In summing up, the Club has had a very good year and all club members enjoyed the trips away.

Judo

Judo within Cadet School during 1974 has been a year of great progress.

In spite of several potentially capable participants falling by the wayside for various reasons, we still managed to finish the year with a solid core of keen and proficient cadets who have successfully attempted three gradings.

As all the above cadets are returning to RF Cadet School for a further year, it is hoped they will avail themselves of the opportunities offered and push hard for their 1st Kyu grading (brown belt). Once having achieved 1st Kyu standing, all successful fights against an equivalent or better grade means 1 point towards a total of 10 points needed to make them eligible to sit for black belt (1st Dan) standing.

Deerstalking

Deerstalking got underway at the end of March and continued on a weekly basis throughout the year, with considerable success. WOII Henderson was the convener for the activity and he was assisted by many people from outside units, all of whom gave up considerable amounts of their own time to make this aspect of recreation a resounding success.

Only two parties throughout the year were unlucky enough not to spot deer, but almost all cadets who participated sighted deer in their natural environment.

The fallacy of wandering out the back, parking the Landrover, then walking 100 yards and shooting a deer was destroyed and very tired and sore cadets eventually staggered back to camp under the carcass of a deer.

Although conditions on several occasions were extreme by anybody's standards, this did not prevent many successful stalks taking place. The average number of deer shot throughout the year, on a weekend basis was two per weekend. On several occasions only one was shot but on others up to as many as six deer were shot on one trip.

Cadets were very lucky to have as their guides some of the most experienced hunters in the Waiourn area and they no doubt gained a lot of valuable experience, and exercise in the process.

Thirty-five cadets went hunting, although several of these had more than one trip.

We did not confine ourselves to hunting as we also spent a considerable amount of time, over several weekends, refurbishing the hut used as accommodation.

The MWD was most helpful with this task and supplied building materials which enabled us to re-roof, re-pile and add to the existing structure, to make it comparatively comfortable.

The addition of mattresses to the top of the wooden bunk slats also added to the class of the establishment. Had it not been for the smoke-laden atmosphere when the fire was lit, people could have been forgiven for thinking they were guests of the Tourist Hotel Corporation at the Hermitage, Chateau, or the like.

Most cadets who participated now know just how difficult it is to unbog a Landrover in the middle of a swamp and put chains on in blizzard conditions. Most trips had their difficult moments and according to the cadets these added to the excitement of the occasion. (This view was not necessarily shared by the RF Staff participating!)

I am quite sure the cadets who went out on these trips saw a completely different side of the RF and vice versa, a good thing on both sides. Even though to a cadet an old!! person is anyone over the age of 25 they may concede now that these middle-aged people do have their uses.

The best head shot was a 12 point Red. Unfortunately, this was shot at the bottom of a large gully and only the hindquarters. back steaks and shoulders were brought out. As the hindquarters weighed 93 lb it can be seen that the beast itself was quite a good one. The animal was shot by WOII Henderson after a mad dash through scrub.

LOOKING BACK

It hardly seems that long ago, but by the simple method of addition or subtraction, 1948 from 1974 just about makes 26 years, come July, from the day that close to one hundred bewildered youths presented themselves to the staff of the newly formed unit, RF Cadets.

In most cases, the experience was not completely new as it was the exception rather than the rule not to have had any training in School Cadets.

Miles Company we were named and to most of us, even though it was in honour of one of our finest wartime officers, th's import was yet to be realised. Today, I for one look back in nostalgic pride at the unit whose officers and NCOs moulded my future career and who in turn have completed their engagements and returned to civilian life or, sorrowfully, have passed on.

To us, Trentham was the end of the civilised world, only because of the distance from Wellington. This situation did not last long when the proximity of the Post Office telephone operators' hostel was discovered as well as that of some of the local belles doing likewise.

Five shillings per day to start. Hardly a fortune! Six months later, another shilling per day. Imagine the envy of the throng when anyone amongst us turned 18 years of age for a full Private's pay.

Rank appeared for the Cadets; a half of a Lance Corporal's chevron worn two inches above the cuff of the right sleeve. Better still, the RF Hut Commanders were removed and I for one, found myself a paid and temporary Lcpl in command of a hut of the second intake, Mead Company. Come graduation day, the inmates were allowed to run their own institution.

Although he would probably never admit it, Major McCulloch was proud as Punch. Incidentally, he pursued his rugby coaching as ardently as his drill and I can still picture him out of the corner of my eye, keeping pace with me in a burst down the line. My ear has never quite been the same since from the effects of the encouragement passed by the voice that could be heard as far away as Upper Hutt on a crisp morning.

In the field of sport that year of 1948, no fewer than six Cadets represented Army Troops for the Inter-District Tournament. Three of us went forward to the Inter-Service Tournament in Auckland in the various fields of athletics, cricket and water polo. The winter of 1949 saw us with a first class rugby team but this was interrupted by the first graduation.

No doubt with the facilities available the school and individuals will continue to shine in the representative fields.

I don't think the school of today has changed much. Sure,

the minimum age is lower than it was and I would not comment now about Trentham's being the end of the world. But my practised eye still sees the interplatoon/company rivalry as well as the suppressed desire to become a fully fledged soldier.

The Guard for General Burnett recently, viewed from an ATG window, convinced me that the s'andard is still as good as the day Miles and Mead performed the guard for the Opening of Parliament.

For a few years after graduation those that stayed behind or moved to other Corps were met in a variety of circumstances whilst new friends were made from the later companies as they graduated to Corps. But now, any meeting between the "oldies" is a long chat about who is where and what is he up to. A note of interest: those of us staying to fifty years of age still have between seven and eight years to do.

Names mean little but you will come across them in Camp or other Camps from time to time. The names Burke, Brighouse, Clarkson, Clark, Hancox, Wischnowsky are still with us. Not too many are left and my memory is hazy at times. Those that remain of the 1948 staff are Lt Col R Stanley-Harris, WOI R Kiddie and perhaps WOII Sellan. How many of the present companies and staff will be around in the year 2000? Perhaps there will be another "Looking Back" by one of the readers. If so, remember that I for one in my years of service, have been proud to say I have been a Regular Force Cadet. whether it was in day to day routine training, commanding a British tank in Korea or trudging the hills of Kashmir.

My advice is that the honour of the unit name is in the serving cadet's hands. Guard it. Any dishonour is also borne by those who have preceeded you.

On graduating from the first intake of RF Cadets in August 1949 I was assigned to the Corps of RNZEME and posted to SD MT Wksp in Burnham as a Pte. Many ycars were to pass before the first change in routine came along. It would be about 1960 that I partnered the late Ssgt Jack Lunn on the Mobile Inspection Unit. This, however, did not last very long for in 1961 I was posted as cadre staff to 3 Inf Wksp at Addington Barracks.

In 1966, as a Ssgt, I was again posted to Eurnham to the retitled SD Wksp, firstly as CSM and later as Chief Clerk.

Many memories of those first 13 months in the Army are still with me but it is very difficult to bring any one particular episode to mind without involving or embarrassing what are probably now respectable and married people of the community.

However, many of our Coy will recall the times in Barton's Eush; the Upper Hutt RSA dance on a Friday night; the Saturday nights at the Silverstream Hall and of course the Saturday dance at the Lower Hutt Horticultural Society Hall. One can recall the dancing lessons in the Trentham Camp Clock Tower with a wind-up gramophone and members of the NZWRAC to help the lads out in time for our graduation ball.

There was also the occasional dispute between us and the local youths. For some reason they did not appreciate the area's being suddenly inflated with 100 new lads. Maidstone Park seemed to be the venue for these meetings.

A quick trip by 3 tonner over the Rimutakas was quite an experience for those of us who went to Pahiatua to collect school furniture. One must not forget the entertainment in the camp cinema and the tremendous service given at the YMCA by Chappie and Charlotte and our patient Padre.

I can remember a pre-graduation gathering, by courtesy of Chappie, when the original roll was read and we thought of absent friends, who did not exclude at that time our two temporary inmates at Ardmore.
