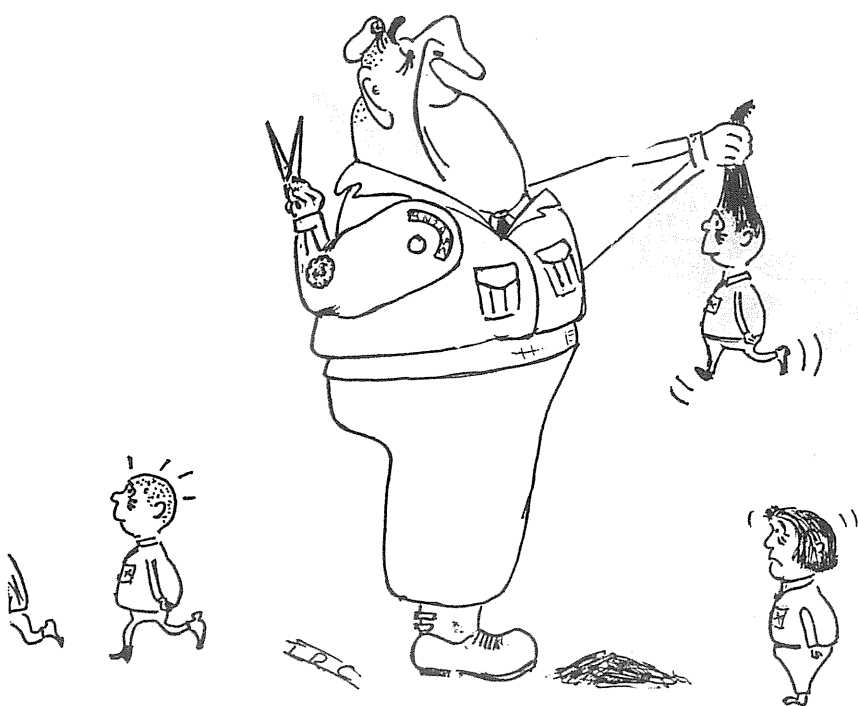

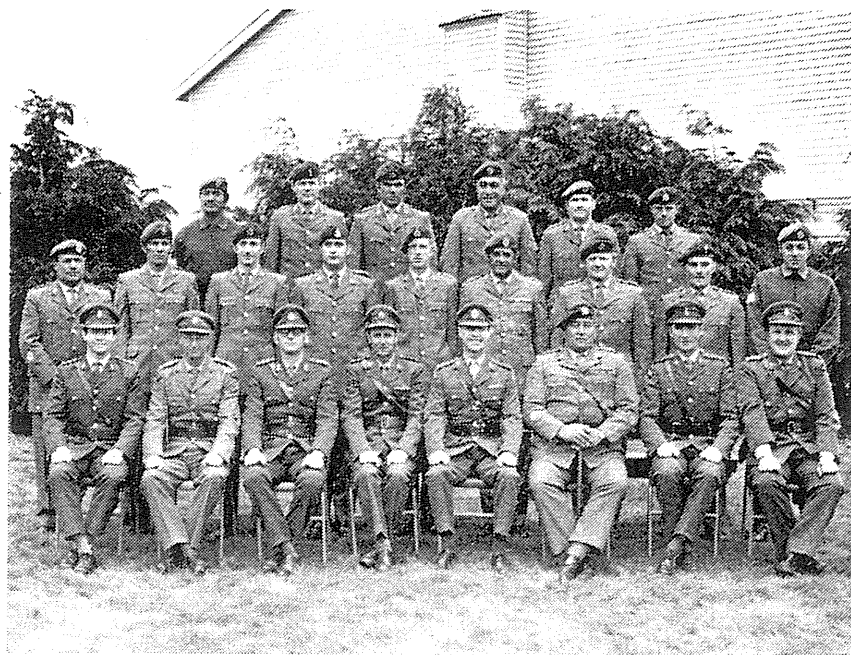

GRADUATION PARADE 74

December 16 dawned fine but by mid morning heavy rain threatened the programme. By 1300, however, Waiouru weather was at its best. The large crowd of parents, friends and military personnel, including the corps directors, saw Cadet RSM Broughton march Cadet School on to the parade ground.

Brigadier JT Burrows, CBE, DSO and Bar, ED, MA, class patron of the 1974 class, reviewed the parade.

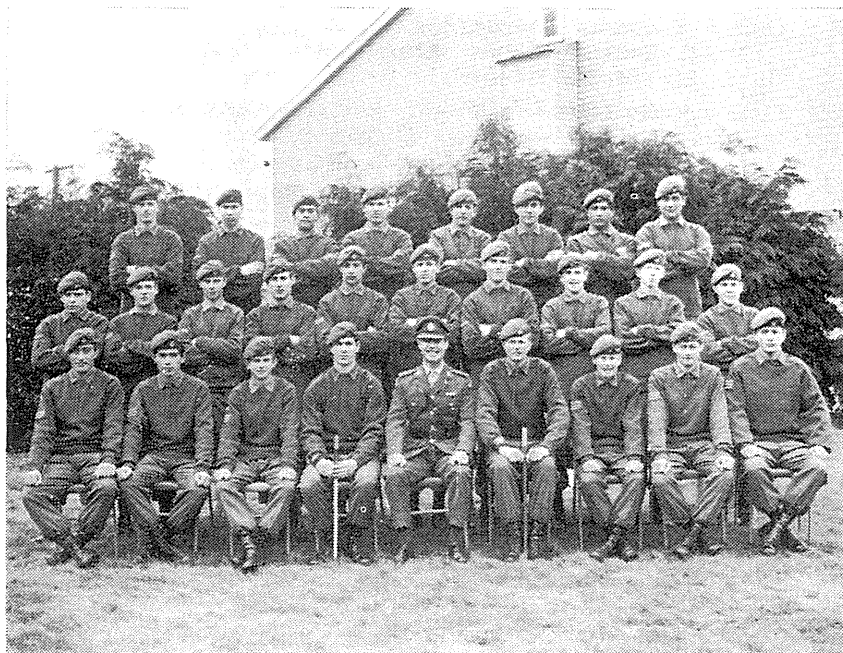

Major JGH Wilson, RNZIR

Major JGH Wilson was posted to RF Cadet School as Officer Commanding in July 1973. He is a graduate of the Royal Military College, Duntroon and before coming to Cadet School had spent the majority of his commissioned service in appointments involved with the training of soldiers, mainly in the 1st and 2nd Battalions of the Royal New Zealand Infantry Regiment. His last appointment before Cadet School was as the Training Staff Officer of the Territorial Force Depot.

Consequently he was able to bring with him to the School considerable experience in and knowledge of training methods and soldiering skills. He also brought with him a deep interest in the character development of young men. As a result of this experience and interest and mainly his efforts, the training scope and slant of the school was changed towards teaching skills and attributes that not only develop a cadet as a soldier and tradesman, but also as a confident young man with a well balanced outlook on life who is aware of the world about him

and of his duties as a citizen of New Zealand. He was also responsible for the increased emphasis on adventurous training within the school; an important aspect as it helps to develop robustness of character and resourcefulness in a person.

During his time here, Major Wilson put in much hard work and long hours in order to develop this theme to the benefit of cadets and the school. It is a pity that he was posted from us just as his efforts were beginning to show results in cadets, staff and the school as a whole. However, there is no doubt that his ideas and schemes have been successful; as I observed 121 young men leave us on 12 December and mentally reviewed their progress, I saw in most of them the qualities of professionalism, discipline, confidence and robustness which Major Wilson sought.

Maj Wilson left us in May 1975 when he was posted to the 1st Battalion, Royal New Zealand Infantry Regiment in Singapore as a company commander. The school, staff and the cadets owe a lot to him and it was with regret but our best wishes that we saw him and his family go.

CHARTER OF THE REGULAR FORCE CADET SCHOOL

AIM:

The aim of the Regular Force Cadet School is to prepare Regular Force Cadets for their careers in the Army.

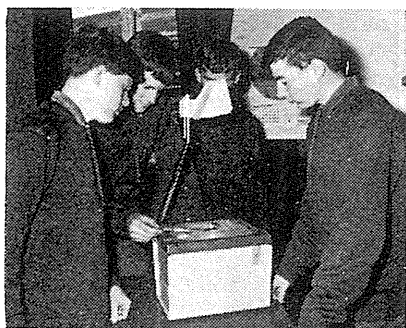
SCOPE:

This lies in the provision of military, academic and trade training as applicable to prepare each Regular Force Cadet for his career in the Army.

OBJECTIVES:

Within the scope above, the school has as its objectives:—

- (a) To provide a broadly based education designed to produce a good soldier and citizen.
- (b) To promote reliability, motivation and self-confidence.
- (c) To provide trade training to a minimum of One Star level.
- (d) Where appropriate, to provide the fullest formal academic training.

EDUCATION WING NOTES

At the end of 1974 Capt Gray, Capt Salt and Capt Preece left the Education Wing and were replaced by Capt Brown, Capt Bruton and Capt Charles. Maj Duncan and Capt Fraser remained from 1974.

The staff change-round coincided with a change in the organisation of the work of the Wing. The Military Education course replaced the School Certificate programme and all two year cadets whose futures were to be in the "teeth arms" undertook the programme. In addition there was a small University Entrance class who were engaged in full time academic training.

The Military Education course is aimed at providing a broadly based educational programme and encompasses both soldier training and academic training. The programme is organised so that the course is divided into modules which vary in length from two weeks to one month. The course content is alternated between military training and academic training so that there is an even balance between the two aspects.

The academic aspect of the course is aimed at ensuring that basic communication and arithmetical skills are of an acceptable standard and that the cadet has a good knowledge of the world in which the Army operates.

Subjects covered are:

- a) English and Service Writing;
- b) Mathematics to three levels;
- c) NZ Military History;
- d) Military Science;
- e) World Affairs;
- f) Commercial Practice.

The content of these courses in most cases is new to the cadets and repetition of school content is avoided as far as possible.

The course has assisted the cadet to maintain and improve

study and learning skills as well as to increase his knowledge in areas where prior to this little or no instruction has been received.

The results of the education section of the Military Education course have been encouraging. Most cadets have realised that there is more to being a soldier than reading a compass or firing a rifle. Basic academic skills and a sound knowledge of the world in which we live are as important as any other skill which is learnt in the Army.

Formal academic study was limited to Sixth Form Certificate and University Entrance courses. Nine cadets followed this course on a full time basis. Subjects studied were English, Mathematics, Physics, Accounting, Geography, Biology and Technical Drawing. The Sixth Form Certificate awards made were very pleasing and this qualification will assist the student in the attainment of technical qualifications in future years.

RNZE APPRENTICE WING 75

1975 has added another year to the RNZE Apprentice Wing's record as a recognised Technical Institute. The year has brought about a new carpentry training scheme known as the "Hawke's Bay" Scheme. This scheme is based on internal assessment in practical aspects of the trade up to a national standard prior to sitting the Trades Certificate examination. Under the new scheme an apprentice must obtain seven units to receive his first pay increase and 13 units for his second. When the apprentice has attained 16 units he is then permitted to sit the Trade Certificate examination, thus putting capable and practical tradesmen into the building industry. This year we have 15 apprentice carpenters of whom two have sat Trade Certificate.

The plumbing section of the Wing has five apprentices who will all graduate at the end of the year and this will therefore leave no plumbing apprentices for the 1976 training year, due to the fact that the three Field Squadrons reached a satisfactory tradesman to apprentice ratio.

Emphasis has been placed on practical work and as a result there are now two new houses and garages built by the cadets in Waikouaiti housing area. Next year it is planned to build three houses and have up to 23 carpenter apprentices, including five RF Sappers, undertaking training at the Wing.

As a climax to their training the senior cadets took part in an army exercise involving many units of the NZ Army.

March saw the Training Wing run or assist in a variety of internal courses for 89 cadets and this continued until 25 Nov 75.

Numbers in the brackets denote the number of courses:

1. **Pre Instructors Course (1).** This course is designed to assist the student so that he can qualify to attend the Basic All Arms Instructors Courses at Regular Force Depot.

2. **Minor Tactics (2).** This course not only teaches a student how an Infantry Section deals with a situation but also the importance of team work.

3. **Heavy Trade Licence Course (3).** The aim of this course is to provide cadets with an HT licence so that after graduating they can be readily used in their new unit. As cadets are under the age of 18 years we must apply to the Ministry of Transport for approval. One point to remember is that whilst at Regular Force Cadet School cadets who pass the test and obtain an

HT licence, cannot drive an HT vehicle with troops or stores unless under supervision of Regular Force staff members.

4. Signals Handlers Course (1). This course is designed to teach students the basic voice procedure used on radio sets in the NZ Army.

5. Assistant Physical Training Instructor (1). This course was conducted by the Physical Training Wing of the Army Training Group. Students are taught how to conduct minor games and simple exercises. Those who perform to a high standard can, if they wish to, attend a Physical Training Instructors Course at a later date.

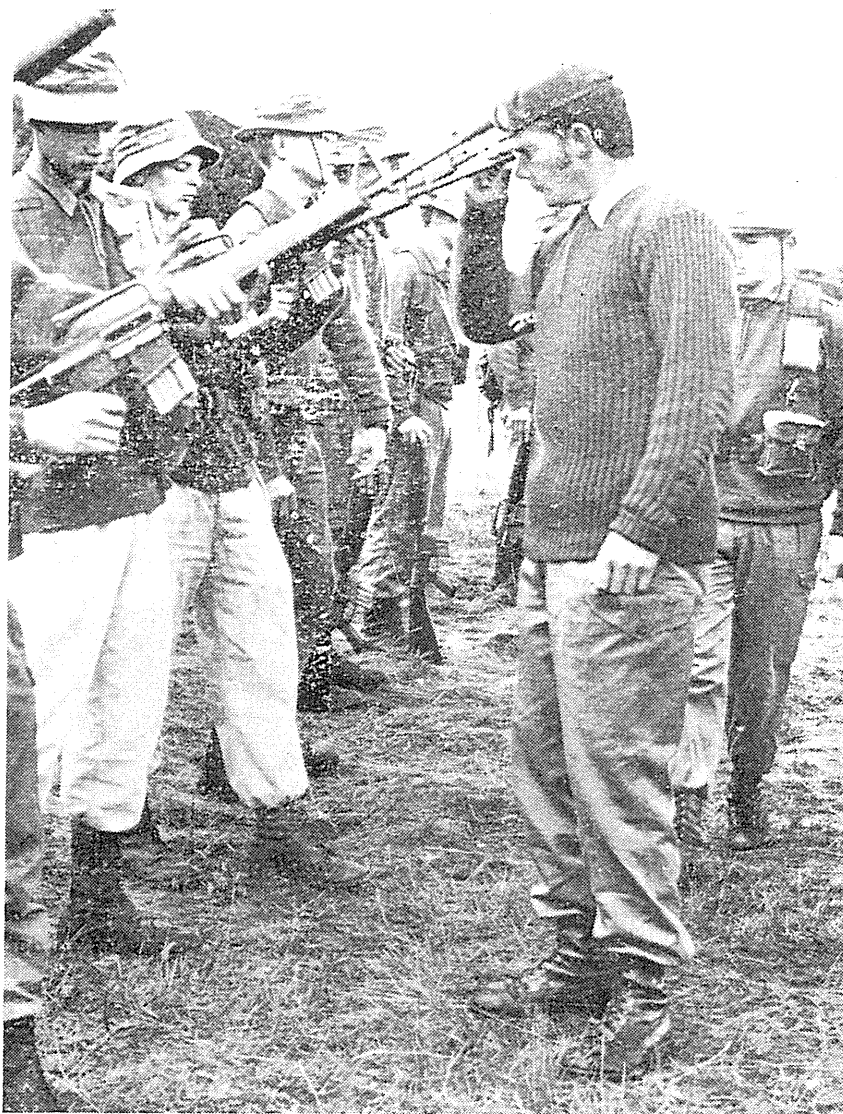
6. The Basic All Arms Instructors Courses (2). There are four courses which one has to pass to qualify as a Basic All Arms Instructor. They are:

- a) Methods of Instruction Course;
- b) Drill Instructors Course;
- c) Weapon Training — Map Reading — Fieldcraft Instructors Course;
- d) Field Training Instructors Course.

A partial pass can be obtained provided the student passes the Methods of Instruction Course.

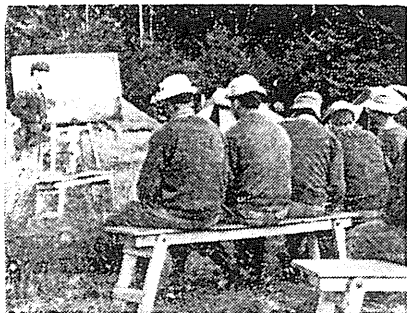

RF Cadet Training at the School of Armour

The School of Armour has the responsibility of trade training all members of the Royal New Zealand Armoured Corps in those skills peculiar to the armoured soldier. It is one of the units of the Army Schools and is located in Waikuru.

The courses at the School of Armour attended by Regular Force Cadets during the past 12 months have included a Machine Gun Course, a Driver M113 Course and a Signaller Royal New Zealand Armoured Corps Course.

The M113 is the main armoured fighting vehicle in service in the New Zealand Army at present. It is manufactured in the USA and is a highly mobile armoured personnel carrier. It is amphibious, giving it the capability of swimming across rivers and other water obstacles and is also air-portable in the C-130 Hercules aircraft. On the Driver M113 Course the student is taught to drive this vehicle over all types of terrain by day and by night and also to service and maintain the vehicle in fighting condition. There is a wide range of radios fitted to these vehicles. The Signallers Course teaches the student to operate and maintain these radios, giving the Armoured Corps the high standard of communications necessary on the mobile battlefield. The Machine Gun Course teaches the students to fire and maintain the range of machine guns fitted to New Zealand's armoured fighting vehicles.

The Regular Force Cadets who attend courses at the School of Armour have all been selected to graduate into the Royal New Zealand Armoured Corps. They attend these courses while still cadets, so when they graduate and arrive at their new unit they are proficient in one or more of the armoured crewman's skills and can immediately take their places as fully fledged working members of a cavalry

troop or an armoured personnel carrier squadron.

THE SCHOOL OF MILITARY ENGINEERING

Although located in Linton Military Camp, the School of Military Engineering is yet another training unit which members of the RF Cadet School attend to further their education in the field of Military Engineering.

Subjects catered for by the School of Military Engineering include:

a) Promotion course for RNZE officers from Lieutenant to Major;

b) Field Engineering courses covering bridging, quarrying, demolitions, camouflage, concreting and small motors;

c) Plant courses such as plant maintenance, plant recovery, plant recon and management, plant transportation, roads and airfields, medium and light drilling rigs, motorised grader, crane and excavators, wheeled tractors, metal crushing operating, pile driving and compaction plant.

Facilities available at the School of Military Engineering are numerous and varied, from a boating and rafting lagoon to a plant operating and demolition range. A recent innovation at SME is a wet and dry bridging gap. The SME also has the normal lecture room, tutorial, theatre facilities as most other Army School units. All these facilities are located within Linton Camp and needless to say, they are designed to produce the best and most realistic settings for all types of training.

For some years RF Cadets

have been attending courses conducted at SME and it is gratifying to note their results have been of a reasonably high standard.

Only recently, SME conducted two groups of RF Cadets through practical exercises in aspects of Military Engineering.

Present at SME are twenty-four Fijian students who are completing a year's training in various construction aspects, who, on their return to Fiji will form the nucleus of a Regional Development Unit to assist in the upgrading and improving of communal facilities in the outlying villages throughout Fiji.

The School of Military Engineering has at present a staff of 37 and of the 37, 13 are ex RF Cadets.

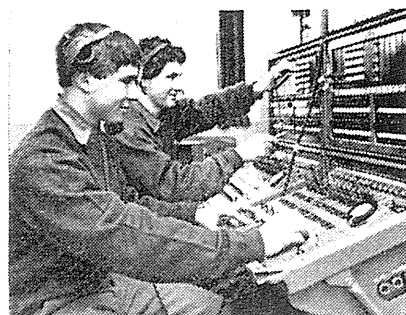
SCHOOL OF SIGNALS

The School of Signals is responsible for training technical and non technical personnel of RNZ Signals, Regular Force, RF Cadets, Territorial Force and NZWRAC. It comprises a Tactics and Operating (Tac Op) Wing and a Technical Training (Tech) Wing. The two wings are called upon to conduct Equipment Specialisation and Familiarisation courses, Regimental Signals courses as well as Star classification courses in all RNZ Signals trades. The school is also responsible for running the Army Training Group Communications Centre.

This course introduces the Signaller-RF Cadet to the communications technician trade. On completion of the course, those attaining the required standard may qualify as 2 Star Tradesmen and are capable of servicing selected radio equipment, setting up teleprinter and telegraph systems and have also been given instruction on radio theory to the level of second year Radio

The tradesman may return the following year to undertake the 3 Star course which is designed to teach the servicing of all Field Force communications equipment.

After having completed a One Star course, then having passed a ten week Teletypewriter Operating course, which teaches an operator to touch type at 45 words per minute, a Telegraph Communication Centre operator then progresses to the RF OR Telegraph Communication Centre Operator Two Star.

Cadets Ripia DRR and Gray AA attended this course, which enables them to operate as detachment members in a field force or static communication

centre. The equipment used on this course is the latest available to RNZ Signals and includes complete communication centres mounted inside shelters for transportation by land, sea or air.

At the completion of the RF OR One Star, Cadet Lindsay attended the Teletypewriter Operating to further his skill as a Clerk AA. On attaining 25 wpm he then joined the staff in the School of Signals Orderly Room to further his knowledge of clerical duties, whilst awaiting his clerk course.

The 1975 training year has been a very busy one for the instructors of both wings and for the RF Cadets attending courses at the School of Signals. For those RF Cadets graduating and taking their places in RNZ Signals units throughout New Zealand this year, the staff of the School of Signals extend their best wishes.

SCHOOL OF INFANTRY

The year 1974-75 has been a very quiet one from the point of view of RF Cadets' participation on courses held at the School of Infantry.

A total of two courses were attended at the school and they were the RF Section Commanders' and TF/RF Anti Tank Course. 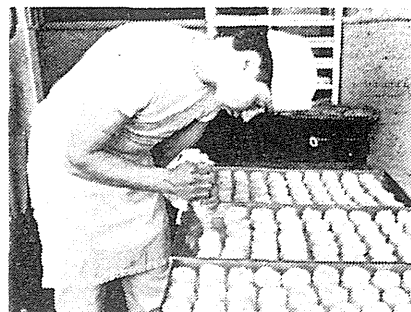
RNZASC SCHOOL TRAINING NOTES

In past years the Royal New Zealand Army Service Corps School has trained RF Cadets as drivers, storemen clerks, apprentice chefs and apprentice supervisory stewards.

For some reason known only to the wisest of men, no young men wanted to become drivers of trucks, cars and Landrovers this year. For the same reason, also, no young men wanted to become storemen clerks in the RNZASC and consequently, our

training of cadets has been confined to the catering fields. Here we have trained 27 first year apprentice chefs and stewards in the basics of their trades. Next year, these tradesmen will return to the Catering School and sit the first City and Guilds Certificate for the catering industry. To this end, all the first year tradesmen are involved in "on the job" training in kitchens throughout Waiouru Camp learning the intricate requirements of their trades.

Ten second year apprentice chefs who have already gained the first City and Guilds Certi-



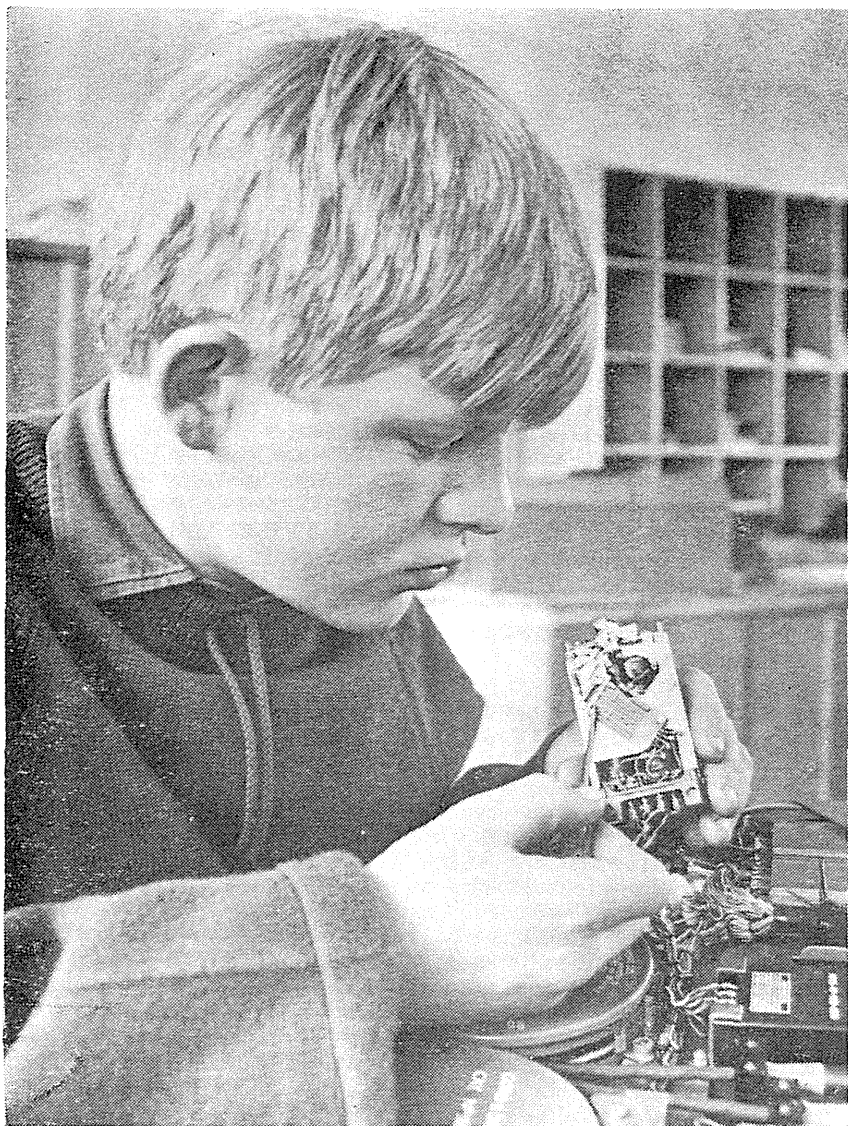

ficate, are also being trained on the job, in preparation for the second certificate, which they will sit next year.

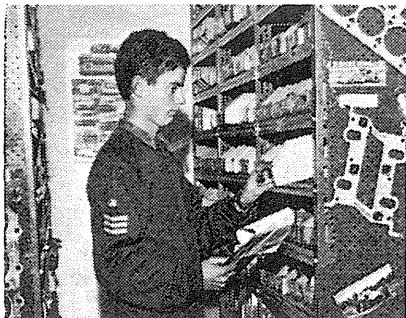
Cdt Saunders MJ examining the intricacies of an electronic component.

RNZA ORDNANCE CORPS 1975

Broadly, the role of the Royal New Zealand Army Ordnance Corps is the procurement, receipt, issue, storage and maintenance of virtually all stores and equipment used by today's Army. To enable the Corps to perform this role, expertise in a number of trades is required. Currently, the following trades are available to RF Cadets:

Automotive Parts and Accessories Merchandising Storeman Clerk RNZAOC Ammunition Technician.

Automotive Parts and Accessories Merchandising is an indentured apprenticeship and embraces all aspects of an Automotive Parts Department and Warehouse in a civilian organisation, with examinations being conducted by the New Zealand Trades Certification Board. An apprentice in this trade also

undergoes trade training in the Army trade of Storeman Clerk RNZAOC, thus broadening his knowledge to cover the more specialised fields of military stores accounting and warehousing aspects, which are based on both a manual and computerised system. However, if a RF Cadet so desires he may undertake the trade of Storeman Clerk RNZAOC on its own, which, although not an indentured apprenticeship, offers excellent opportunities both within and outside the Army.

The other trade available is that of an Ammunition Technician, which entails the handling, testing, storage, repair, disposal and modification of all ammunition in use within the Army plus safe rendering of the various types of Improvised Explosive Devices.

After the completion of Basic and Advanced soldier training this year, trade training commenced with Cdt Havill R (a second year cadet) and Cdts Jackson IT and Jensen PR (both first year cadets). At various times throughout the year we were joined by Cdt Ssgt McIntosh SF and Cdt Holland PE who continued their trade training in between the various phases of the Instructors' course. The remainder of the RNZAOC RF Cadets were engaged on the various modules of Military Education conducted throughout the year by Training and Education Wing.

The practical training of Storeman Clerks and Ammunition Technicians is done by 2 Central Ordnance Depot and Ammunition Area Waiouru.

During the year Cdt Havill R was attached to a civilian Automotive Parts firm and gained the distinction of being placed top student on the stage one block course conducted by the Central Institute of Technology, Petone. Other cadets attended various courses of instruction at the RNZAOC School Trentham

and returned with very satisfying results.

Finally, our thanks go to those who have made 1975 a successful year and we wish those RF Cadets graduating into the RNZAOC all the very best for their careers in their chosen trades.

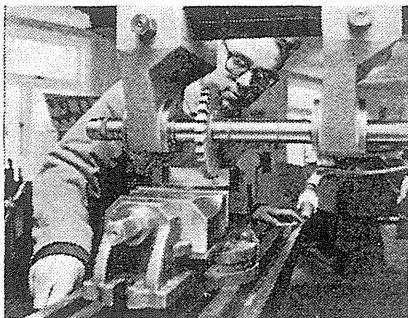
The present RNZAOC Instructor attached to the RF Cadet School is Sgt McLean MJ, an ex cadet (Crump Class) of 1967.

RNZEME SCHOOL

The role of the school in relation to the Regular Force Cadet is "The Conducting of Regular Force Cadet Apprentice Training". To this end we have this year with us 41 cadets attending classes, 35 studying first qualifying and six studying second qualifying examinations towards Trade Certificate Board qualifications in their respective trades. We also have 15 cadets attending Military Education and University Entrance courses who will come to us next year to start trade training.

Apart from attending trade classes, cadets at the school attend a Basic Corps Course and a Recovery Course to supplement their training.

On graduating from Cadet School ex cadets return from time to time to attend one or more of the 13 corps courses connected with their trades. The number of courses that are run each year is approximately 90, so it can be seen that there is a wealth of knowledge at this school.

DO OUR CONTRACTIONS BOTHER YOU?

The Army, like any large and important organisation — like the United Nations — has developed its own system of short forms of address and labelling. This system generally based on the initial letters, is often quite incomprehensible to anyone outside the service and so a glossary is presented below to which you may refer in cases of bewilderment.

Firstly, the organisation of the Army itself can cause confusion. The service is divided into Corps, each with its own function, badges and history. In all cases the titles of the Corps are prefixed with RNZ, signifying Royal New Zealand whatever it is. (Only those Corps which are directly connected with RF Cadet School are dealt with below.)

RNZA	Artillery	The 'big guns' of the outfit.
RNZAC	Armoured Corps	The "Tankies".
RNZE	Engineers	Construction and demolition.
RNZSigs	Signals	Communications experts.
RNZIR	Infantry Regiment	The "feet".
RNZASC	Army Service Corps	Cooks, drivers, etc.
RNZAMC	Army Medical Corps	Doctors, medical and nursing orderlies.
RNZAOC	Army Ordnance Corps	Bulk supplies.

(You can see that there is value in contractions.)

Secondly, the rank structure of the Army can cause some contractional confusion. Distinction is made obvious by the position of the insignia denoting rank, an officer wearing his in a sequence of stars, with or without a crown on the shoulder, while the non-commissioned officer (NCO) wears indication of rank on the arm.

Here are the names of the NCOs in ascending order of seniority.

Lieutenant General Sir Leonard Thornton, KCB, CBE

Lieutenant General Sir Leonard Thornton was born in Christchurch in 1916. He attended Christchurch Boys' High School from 1930 until 1933, when he left to enter the Royal Military College of Australia. He graduated from the college at the end of 1937 and was awarded the King's Medal as the outstanding graduate of his year.

During the Second World War he served abroad from 1940 until 1946 with units of the New Zealand Artillery, also holding various staff appointments in the Second New Zealand Division. He was appointed to command the 5th Field Regiment in 1943, and was serving as Commander of the Divisional Artillery in the rank of Brigadier when the war in Europe ended in 1945. He was awarded the OBE in 1945 and twice Mentioned in Despatches.

After the Second World War he held various appointments in

New Zealand and also served as Senior Army Liaison Officer in London. In 1951 he graduated from the Imperial Defence College and subsequently served first as Quartermaster-General of the Army in New Zealand, and later as Adjutant-General; during this period he was awarded the CBE.

In 1958, Sir Leonard was appointed for a two year term as Chief of the Military Planning Offices of SEATO in Bangkok. From this post Sir Leonard returned to the appointment of Chief of the General Staff and General Officer Commanding the New Zealand Division.

Sir Leonard was awarded the CB in the New Year's Honours List of 1961-62 and in the 1967 Queen's Birthday Honours he was made a Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath.

On 1 April 1965, General Thornton was appointed Chief of Defence Staff (Designate). On 1 July 1965 he assumed the appointment of Chief of Defence Staff and New Zealand Military Adviser to SEATO and at the same time was promoted to Lieutenant General. He continued to hold this appointment until October 1971 when he retired from the Army.

Between January 1972 and March 1974 General Thornton was the New Zealand Ambassador to the Republic of South Vietnam.

GRADUATION 1975

Once again, Waiouru gave several people near heart attacks with the weather. December 12 dawned cold and overcast, with a hint of rain. However, by ten o'clock the cloud had broken and by lunchtime we could not have had better weather. (Our thanks go to the Padres for their efforts.)

By 1350 hours, the cadets had marched on and they and a large number of guests and wellwishers were waiting expectantly. Col Harding, Commander, ATG Waiouru and Brig Kennedy, Commander, Home Command, each received a salute and then General Sir Leonard Thornton, KCB, CBE, class patron, arrived and received a general salute. Berets were presented to those graduating and General Thornton then congratulated each graduate and wished him well in his career in the Regular Force. At the end of the parade the cadets who were returning and the NZ Army Band put on an entertaining display.

At afternoon tea, General Thornton chatted informally with the guests and then the prize giving commenced with the OC's review of the year, in which among other things he listed all the activities and interests open to cadets. Then General Thornton spoke to the cadets. He congratulated them on their drill and bearing and commented that when he had seen them ("his" class) earlier in the year, they had only been boys; at graduation, he said, they were a body of fine young men.

He told the assembly that he was proud to have been a Regular Force Cadet School class patron and reminded the cadets that there was a very close relationship between character and courage. "Men of character in times of peace," he said, "are the men of courage in time of war."

Lady Thornton presented the prizes and the ceremony ended at 1630 hours.

Officer Commanding's Review of 1975

(As delivered at the
Prize Giving Ceremony
on 12 Dec 1975)

Lieutenant-General Sir Leonard and Lady Thornton, distinguished visitors, ladies and gentlemen, it gives me much pleasure to welcome you all to the Graduation Ceremonies of the Regular Force Cadet School.

Before asking General Thornton to address you and Lady Thornton to present the prizes, I would like to review the activities of the school during 1975. However, before doing so, it is appropriate to recall the aim of our training during this year; it was to prepare the cadets for their future careers in the Regular Army.

In January of this year the school roll stood at 204, made up of 78 cadets returning for their second year of training and 126 cadets of the new class, Thornton Class. During the year 16 have left us, taking their discharge because of medical

reasons or at their own request. Today 130 cadets graduate, leaving 58 who will return to us next year. The 1976 class, named Morrison Class, will number 103, making a roll of 161 cadets for 1976.

During the year the staff strength has averaged 30 and there have been a number of new faces. In May, Maj Wilson left on a posting to 1 RNZIR in Singapore, leaving behind a number of sound training innovations, the benefits of which we are now reaping. We have received two new company commanders, Captain Williams to B Coy and Lieutenant Howard to A Coy and several other instructional and administrative staff.

Overall, we are lucky that we continue to receive staff of as high a calibre as we do and I wish to take this opportunity to thank them all for their sterling work during the year. In particular, I would like to thank them for the long hours they spend out of official working time coaching sports teams, organising recreational activities and seeing to the welfare of cadets. I genuinely appreciate their dedication as I do the tolerance their wives and fami-

lies display towards the demands the school makes upon their family life.

As you are aware, this year we have changed our approach to academic work. Instead of having cadets sit School Certificate we have concentrated upon broadening the scope of the education they received at their previous schools. We have done this by teaching them subjects which will make them more aware of what is going on in the world around them, teach them to communicate with people more effectively and fit them more specifically for their future roles as soldiers and citizens of New Zealand. There is no doubt that this course has been effective and we are now seeing some pleasing changes in the cadets who underwent it. A lot of the credit for the success of this course must go to Major Duncan, the Chief Education Instructor, and his team of Education Instructors; the setting up of the course provided them with a challenge which they admirably met.

On the military side of training, the year started with Thornton Class undergoing training in basic soldiering skills and the returning cadets in skills of a more advanced nature. Both these training courses were successful and I must thank the Regular Force Depot and School of Infantry for the assistance they gave us over that period.

For the first time, this year we have conducted our own Instructors' Course, this course being run in parallel with the Education Course I mentioned earlier. The cadets who attended the Instructors' Course have, I believe, gained much from it, not only in a broadening of their military skills, but also in the development of their maturity and self-confidence. The background provided by this course will, I am sure, stand them in good stead during the remainder of their military careers. Once again, much of the credit for the success of this course must go to Sergeant-Major Horsfall and his instructors.

A number of cadets have also attended courses at other Army

Schools. These courses have taught them specific skills and knowledge required for their future trades. It is worth noting that on many of these courses, cadets are competing with experienced regular soldiers who have a number of years' service behind them; it is much to the credit of the cadets that they do well in such company.

At this stage I would like to congratulate Cadets Trengrove and Haughey who attended a Regular Officers Selection Board during the year. They were accepted for officer training and will be going to Portsea in Australia within the next 12 months. I wish them well there.

The cadets undergoing apprentice trade training have put in a lot of hard work this year and have just finished their trade examinations. We look forward to seeing the results and hope we can better the 97% pass rate achieved in 1974.

I would like to mention at this stage that the Apprentice Wing which is responsible for training carpenter apprentices, has been granted the status of a Technical Institute by the Education Department. This in itself reflects the high standards achieved by the instructors and students there. These students have this year built two houses in our housing area as part of their practical training and will next year build three.

The school has continued to participate in a full sporting programme. I regard sport as an important adjunct to cadet life because of the fitness, team spirit, sporting attitudes and hardiness it develops in young men and generally speaking our teams have been fairly successful. We now have quite a number of tournaments we play annually with schools in this area and further afield, which we will continue to promote next year.

A number of cadets have individually been successful in making places in regional and army sports teams. In particular I would like to mention Cadet McCormack, who at the age of 16, has made the combined

services basketball team; I am sure you will agree that this is a first rate effort.

Recreational activities have continued on most weekends during the year. Canoeing now has a very strong hold within the school, despite the cold waters around Waiouru and cadets have successfully competed in inter-club events throughout the North Island. Deerstalking, goat shooting, climbing, skiing and tramping continue to be popular activities. Last August we had a group climb over the Southern Alps, which was a successful adventure training exercise; we will be repeating this venture next May.

The school celebrated Anzac Day this year by attending the Citizens' Service in Taupo. The school has been granted the privilege of the Freedom of the Borough of Taupo and after the service we exercised it by marching through the town with bayonets fixed, colour flying and drums beating. I would like to thank His Worship the Mayor of Taupo, Mr Currie, who is with us today, for the kind hospitality he and his borough extended to can repeat the ceremony next could repeat the ceremony next Anzac Day.

While on the subject of hospitality from the surrounding

district, I would also like to thank His Worship the Mayor of Taihape, Mr Munro, for the continued welcome extended to cadets by his borough, and also Councillor Mrs Anstruther and Councillor Kimpton for the hospitality of Turangi and the surrounding area.

Ladies and gentlemen, in conclusion I would like to say that I am confident we have met the aim I mentioned earlier and have maintained the standards set by the school in previous years. Hopefully we have exceeded these standards, but only time can tell us that after we have seen how these young men here have progressed in the units they are being posted to today.

Also in conclusion, I would like to thank the other army schools, Headquarters The Army Schools and Headquarters Army Training Group for the help and encouragement they have given us and for the patient way in which they have met some of our more outrageous demands.

Finally, on behalf of the cadets of Thornton Class and the staff, may I thank General Sir Leonard and Lady Thornton for the support they have given us and for the interest they have taken in the school. We are very pleased to have you both with us today and I now ask you, Sir, if you would be so kind as to address us.

B COMPANY NOTES

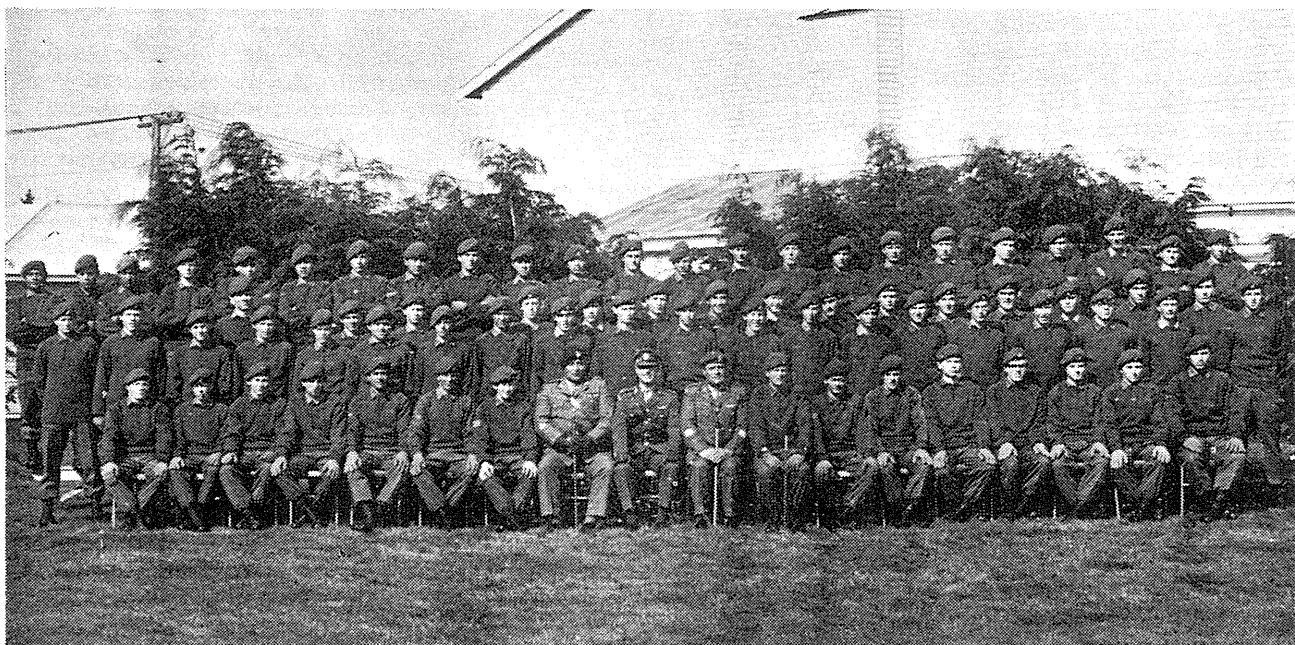

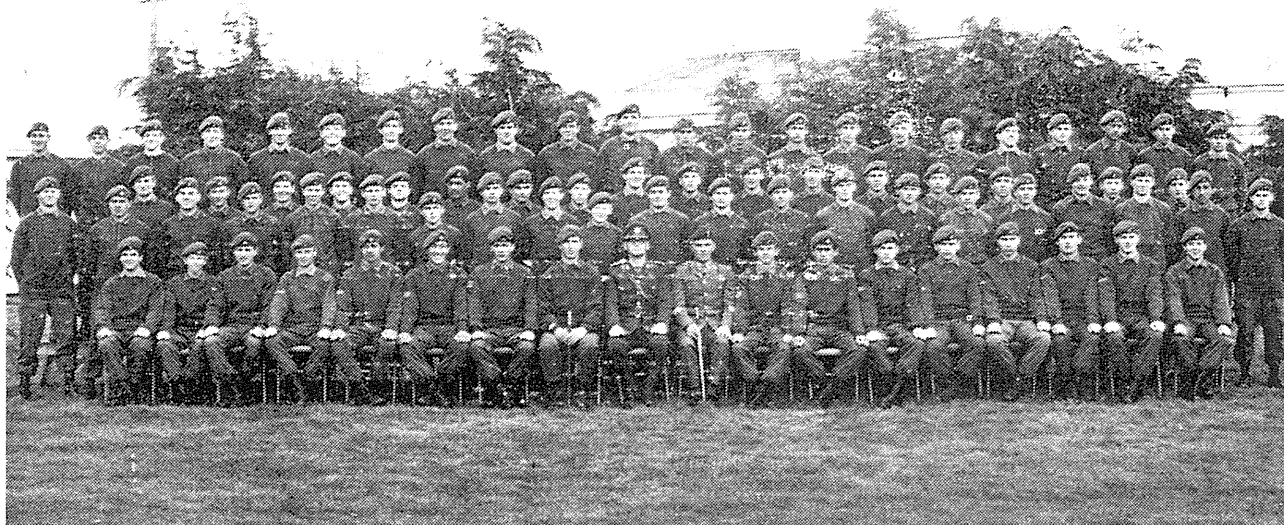

RECREATION TRIPS

A film show was given at the Tongariro Information Centre, followed by an explanation of the power scheme. An extensive guided tour of the scheme, lasting over three hours, was undertaken. Points of interest were as follows: Waikato Falls, Poutu Canal, McDonnell's Redoubt, Lake Rotoaira, Wairehu Aqueduct and the Tokaanu Power Station.

For many cadets, the highlight of the day was a swim in the hot pools at Tokaanu. We then drove over the Te Ponanga Saddle Road, stopping for a while to visit Lake Rotopounamu. A brief visit to the Chateau followed; refreshments were taken at National Park.

On Saturday 28 June Cadet Cpl McKenzie AM, Cadets Mangnu RW, Wilson WG, Trengrove GS, Lindsay AJ, Kilkelly K, Matheson MJ and Captain Bruton were dropped off the Desert Road by Sgt Drabble, at the start of the Waihohonu Track.

Heavy snow had fallen but the weather was ideal for a tramping weekend. We walked to the Waihohonu Hut for lunch and then to Oturere Hut, just east of Ngauruhoe, for the overnight stay.

On Sunday we walked to the Emerald Lakes, up and around the smoking sulphurous Red Crater and on to the summit of Mt Tongariro. At this stage one or two cadets were wishing they had ice axes, crampons, etc. However, we chose an easy snow face as a route down off Mt Tongariro. Then it was just a matter of a slow, tired trudge to the Mangatepopo Hut to be picked up by Sgt Drabble.

3 PLATOON ACTIVITIES

The first weekend was to Raurimu/National Park area, where we stayed at the Youth Hostel and spent an interesting (if wet) weekend at the Ketetahi hot springs, the Chateau Tongariro and the Mangatepopo Valley, where we saw evidence of the damage done by a snow and mud slide (lahar) a month or so before. A 30 foot high wall of mud and slush had roared down the valley scouring out vegetation and passing only 40 feet in front of the new hut!

Our second trip was to Rotorua. Due to a minibus with a coronary, we spent the Friday night in Tokaanu (the southern end of Lake Taupo) and carried on the next day. We spent the Saturday night in a couple of motel units in Rotorua and had a soak for an hour or two in the hot baths. The next day we attempted to go up Mt Tarawera in our Landrover (borrowed from ASC School) and we got there — or rather Capt Charles and a few cadets did, with the rest of us pushing the Landrover where necessary. A slightly dented Landrover eventually came off Tarawera and we returned to Waiouru.

We also had three shooting trips to Waipuna (at the back of Raetihi) where a total of 52 goats were shot. This pleased the farmer and also enabled us to get in some shooting practice on live targets.

No doubt the perk of the year was enjoyed by the Formal Education (University Entrance) Section of the Platoon when they were "volunteered" to put up tentage for the Officers' Winter Ball in return for as many bottles of drink (non-alcoholic!) as they could carry and a full a la carte meal in the Officers' Mess, being waited on hand and foot by the mess stewards.

EXERCISE "MAD MOUNTAINEER"

In the late second term a small group of officers and cadets attempted the Three Pass Trip from the Upper Waimakariri to Hokitika. The group comprised Capt Charles (Cadet School), Lt Parsons (EME School), Lt Woodcock (Education Section), Staff Sgt Sussmilch (Workshops), Cdt Cpl McKenzie AM, Cadets Bensemann KI and Pickering RF and Mr Alan Olliver (Nod) from Christchurch.

The food had been arranged by Capt Charles and we rapidly decided to send him on a chefs' course, especially since he and Nod also did most of the cooking. One day on dried food is good, two are bearable, but three days or more on dried potato, onions, peas, noodles, apricots and milk powder is a terrifying experience.

Our tramp up the Waimakariri at night was uneventful, except for a high fatality rate among the eggs. We got to the first hut (the Forest Service Anti-Crow) at 11.10 p.m., only to find that it was inhabited by deerstalkers. Upon hearing our plans, they expressed doubts as to our sanity and left us in no doubt as to where they would like us to go, so we walked on to the next hut.

The next morning we woke up to find snow on the ground and a force five gale blowing through the one inch gap under

the door. We carried on up the riverbed in very cold conditions to the new Carrington Hilton Hut, one of the most luxurious huts we had ever seen, which thoroughly deserved its name.

It continued to snow and the next day we were hut-bound in poor weather, which allowed Capt Charles and Nod to try out some of their more fiendish recipes. Staff Sussmilch also concocted an experimental bacon bone soup.

The next day we set off for Park Morpeth Hut in the Wilberforce, v.a the Harman Pass (4350') and the Whitehorn Pass (5750'). We got to the top of the Harman (on the Main Divide) and faced a gale gusting up to fifty knots blowing ice and snow, accompanied by poor visibility and temperatures well below zero, ideal for hypothermia (exposure). We reached Carrington without incident, had a brew and then walked out to Anti-Crow Hut. The next day we walked out to the road, got picked up by an Army vehicle from Grey-mouth and taken over Arthur's Pass down to the Taipo River, twenty miles up from Kumara. We walked in to Seven Mile Creek, a tributary of the Taipo (meaning "devil" or "weta") and set ourselves up in the Forest Service Hut.

We spent a pleasant couple of nights here, looking at the river and surrounding areas, known both as "Geoffrey's Playground" and "Nod Country", as Capt Charles and Allan Olliver had

Cadet Nuku SP.

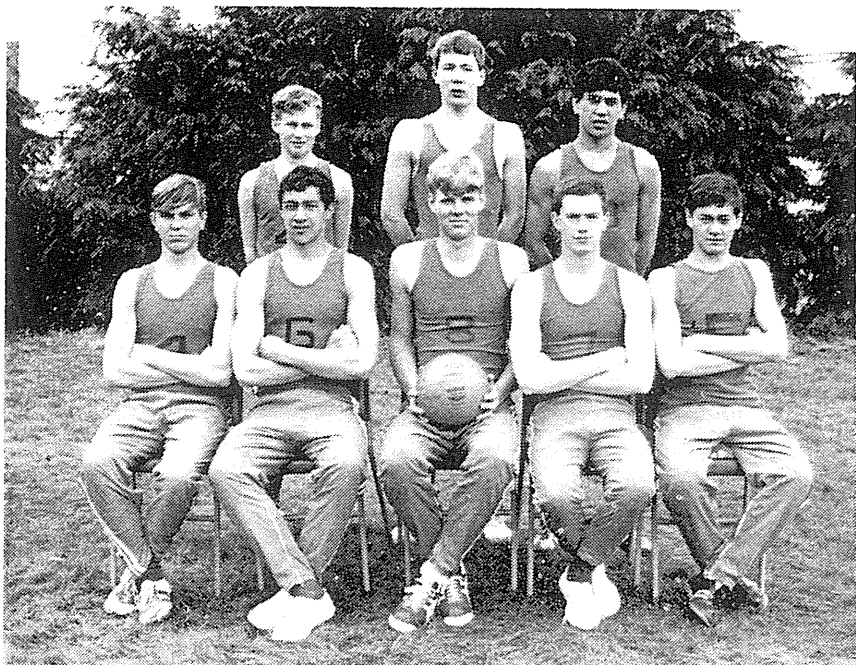
Cadet McCormack was also selected for the Army team to play in the Combined Services tournament and he also made the selection to play in the Combined Services team.

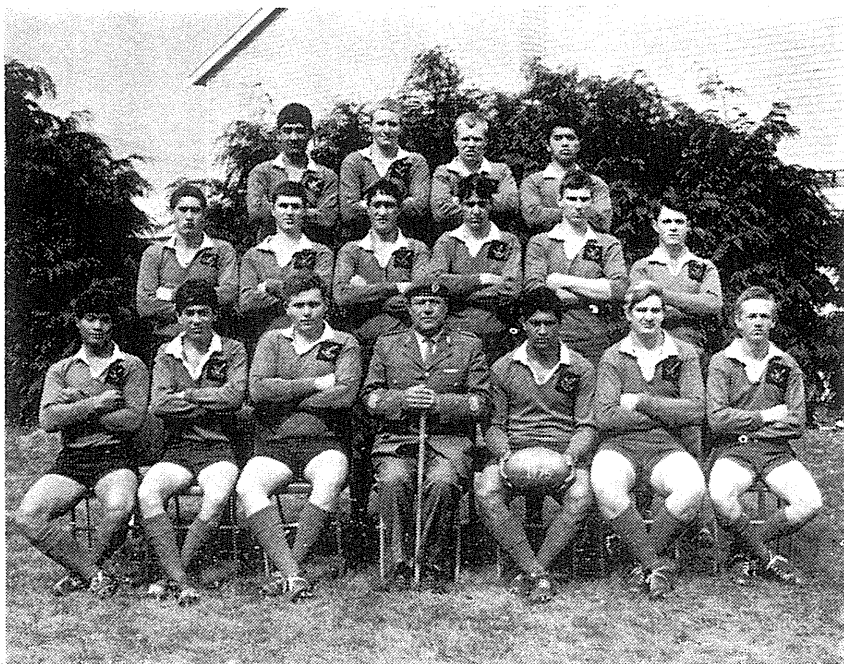

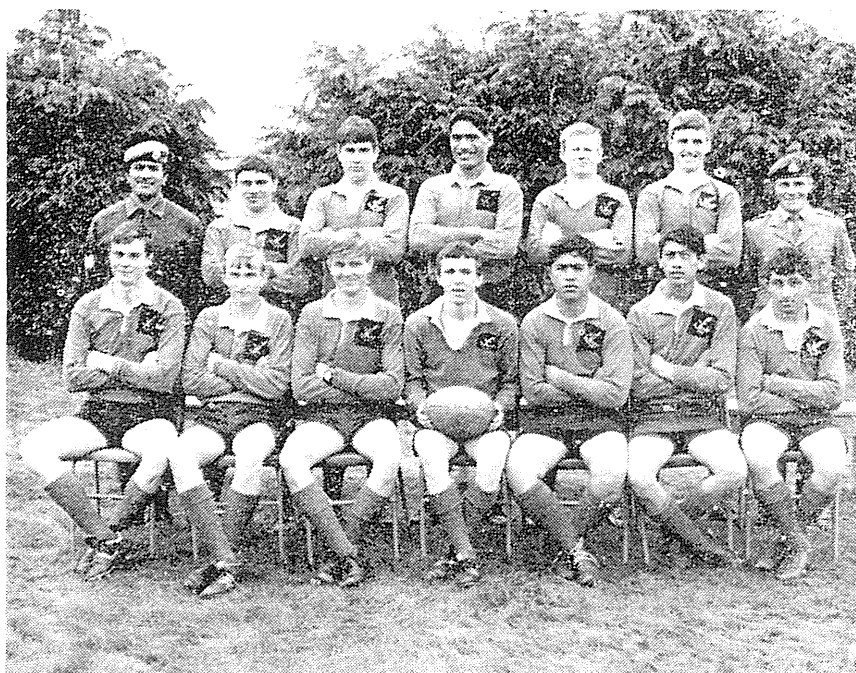

Despite this year's team being slightly outclassed, there is no doubt the team did not lack enthusiasm.

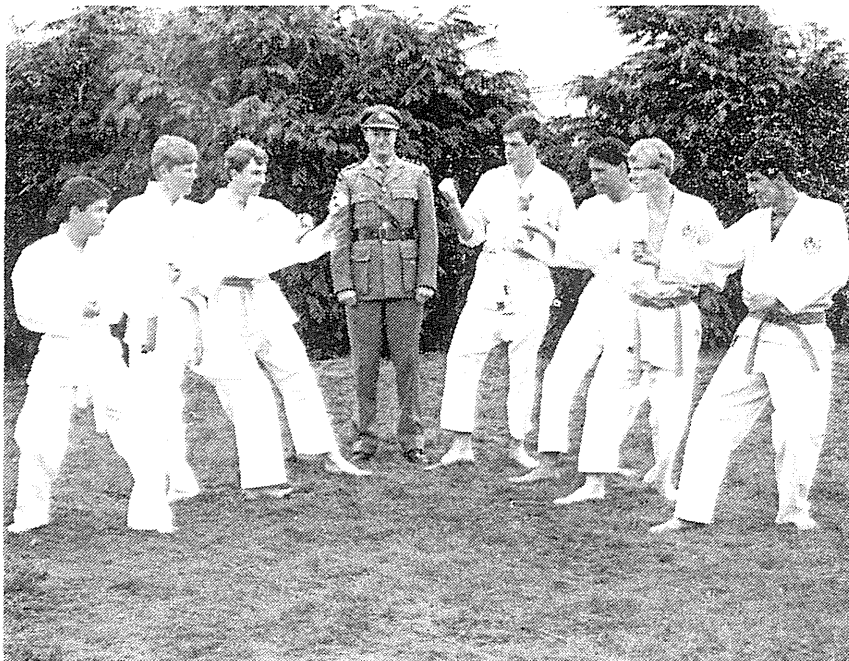

As of October 75 we have the use of two club 7.62 rifles as well as two target rifles owned by Capt Williams.

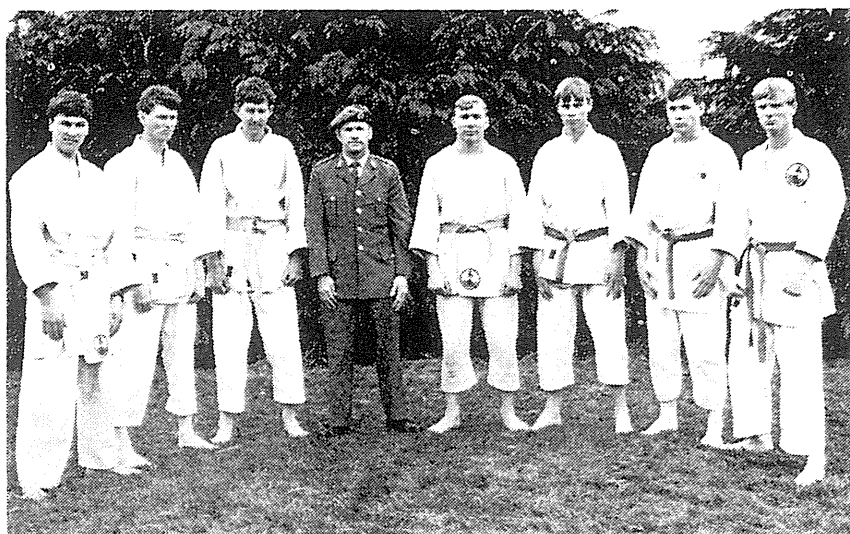
Ammunition is a sore point, costing 15 cents a round, but with the purchase of reloading equipment it is hoped it will go down to 10 cents or less.

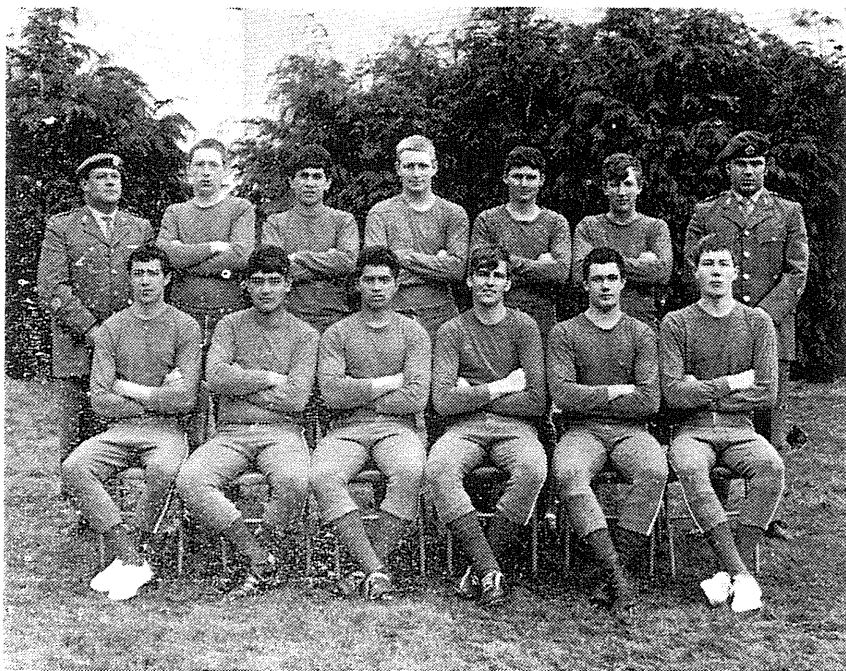

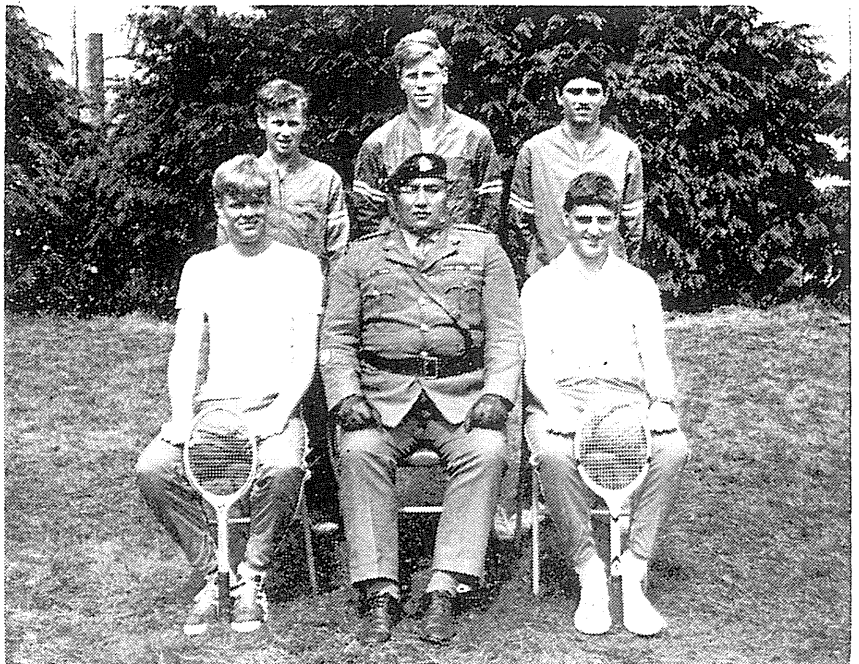
CADETS vs POLICE CADETS 18/19 OCT 75

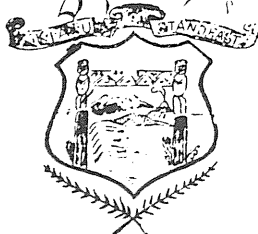
